OUR NATION'S BIRTHDAY, JULY 4TH, 1776

Our second president, John Adams, poured out his very soul in support of the Declaration of Independence before the document was signed. We quote herewith: "But whatever may be our fate, be assured that this Declaration will stand. It may cost treasure, and it may cost blood, but it will stand, and it will richly compensate for both. Through the thick gloom of the present, I see the brightness of the future, as the sun in heaven. We shall make this a glorious, an immortal day. When we are in our graves, our children will honor it. They will celebrate it with thanksgiving, with festivity, with bonfires and illuminations. On its annual return, they will shed tears, copious, gushing tears, not of subjection and slavery, not of agony and distress, but of exultation, of gratitude and joy. Sir, before God, I believe the hour is come. My judgment approves this measure, and my whole heart is in it. All that I have, and all that I am, and all that I hope, in this life, I am now ready to stake upon it. And I leave off as I began, that, live or die, survive or perish, I am for the Declaration. It is my living sentiment, and by the blessing of God it shall be my dying sentiment.

"Independence now, and independence forever!" There is not a real American who does not thrill at the story of how colonial leaders affixed their signatures to the Declaration of Independence -- the document which gave birth to our mighty nation. Let us stimulate a greater spirit of patriotism, and thereby deal telling blows to those in America who seek to undermine our constitution.

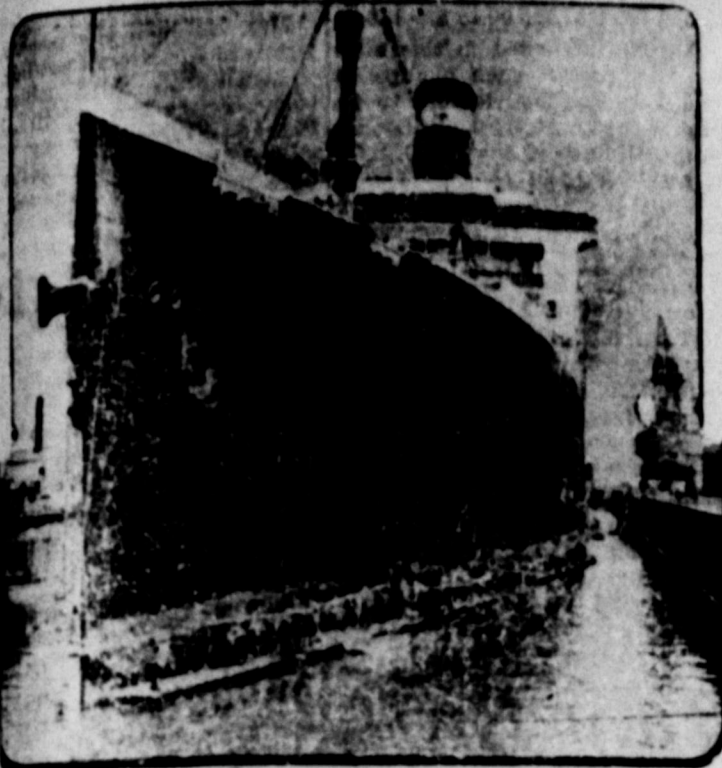

**Shipment Of Texas Livestock Declines Sharply In May**

AUSTIN, Texas, July 4.—Shipments of livestock from Texas to the Fort Worth market and interstate points suffered a drastic decline in May in comparison with the same month last year, according to Dr. F. A. Buechel, assistant director and statistician in the Bureau of Business Research of The University of Texas. Total shipments of all classes of livestock were 5,306 cars, against 7,834 cars a year ago, a drop of 32 per cent. All classes of livestock shared in the decline. Shipments of cattle for the two periods were, respectively: 3,509 and 4,831 cars; calves, 490 and 1,037 cars; hogs, 351 and 835 cars; and sheep 956 and 1,051 cars. For the year to date combined shipments of all classes of livestock to the Fort Worth market and interstate points totaled 24,059 cars, compared with 25,760 cars during the corresponding period last year.

Individual markets showed marked changes in the number of Texas livestock received in May this year, compared with the same month a year ago. Less than half as many Texas hogs reached the Fort Worth market, and the number of sheep fell off 17 per cent. Los Angeles received about one-fifth as many cattle and half as many hogs as a year ago. Sharp declines characterized shipments of cattle and calves to the grazing land of Kansas and Oklahoma. To the former state Texas shipped only about half as many cattle and one-fourth as many calves; and to the latter about three-fourths as many cattle and a third as many calves as in May last year. More cattle but fewer calves were shipped to Colorado than a year ago; 9,621 head of sheep were shipped from Texas to Colorado whereas none was shipped in May last year.

**Half Million See Chevrolet Assembly At World's Fair**

First month's production of Chevrolet cars at the Chicago World's Fair, General Motors building assembly line totaled 468 units, according to information released by Dudley Fraser, assembly line manager.

By actual count, 646,107 people have visited the exhibit to watch the building of Chevrolet cars, an increase over the first 30 days last year.

Retail sales of Chevrolet cars in the General Motors building are materially higher than last year also, it was reported.

The Chevrolet World's Fair assembly line employs 175 workmen selected by merit from the Janesville, Kansas City, Norwood and Flint assembly plants. They work six hours a day, six days a week, according to the NRA automotive code. The line operates from 1:30 in the afternoon till 9:30 at night, except Sunday.

FFF—Fingers, Flies Food Common Sources Of Many Diseases

AUSTIN, Texas, July 4.—The Texas State Department of Health has joined the Government and other organizations in the use of letters to designate phases of their work, according to Dr. John W. Brown, State Health Officer. The letters used at this time are F F F and they stand for fingers, flies, and food—the three most common methods of transmitting intestinal diseases.

The three F's are generally responsible for the spread of typhoid fever, diarrhea, dysentery, and enteritis. Drinking water is considered a food and, as it is used by all ages, great care should be exercised to assure one that their supply is pure. If uncertain the water should be boiled before used for drinking purposes. Surface water and shallow wells are always to be suspected unless proven otherwise. Your city or county health officer will be glad to advise you on the proper method to use in chlorinating your water supply.

It is during hot weather when the most complaints are received on account of diarrhea and dysentery, and parents should do their utmost to prevent it. The chief causes include impure milk, water contaminated foods or wrong diet. If diarrhea develops the feeding should be stopped or greatly diminished and a physician called. Cathartics should not be given unless the doctor prescribes them.

The three F's are the three sources of danger to the baby. Flies carry disease germs to the baby and its food. Fingers and hands that are not thoroughly washed before preparing the babies food are likely to be germ carriers also. All milk and water intended for the baby should be boiled for five minutes and then carefully covered and kept in a cool place until used.

Don't Wait for the Ball, Step Up and Meet It!

The late John McGraw was not only one of the greatest baseball strategists the game has ever seen, he was also quite a philosopher and an astute observer of human nature. Somebody once asked him the difference between a great major league batting star and the bush league hitter. "THE BIG LEAGUER STEPS FORWARD TO MEET THE BALL, and the bush leaguer WAITS UNTIL THE BALL GETS TO HIM," was McGraw's answer.

It seems to me that McGraw's definition of a big leaguer applies very much to selling merchandise. Those of us who are waiting for the ball (business) to get to us are going to be disappointed. Any business which starts our way is likely to be intercepted by some big leaguer who "steps forward to meet it."

Now that business is rather definitely on the upgrade, we are confidently looking forward to better sales and a more profitable operation. But there is one fly in the ointment for some of us: Have we lost sales, lost ground and lost business generally, ENTIRELY because of unfavorable conditions?

This much is certain: we'll have to meet the upturn at least that wasn't really the fault of conditions at all. It was our own fault.

Now the thing for us to do is take a little time out to decide how much of our past losses and misfortunes were due to conditions and how much were due to the fact that we wanted to lay back and wait for the ball instead of stepping into it.

This much is certain: we'll have to meet the upturn at least half-way if we expect to capitalize its full possibilities. Let's remember what John McGraw said about the DIFFERENCE between a BIG LEAGUER and a BUSH LEAGUER.

### Over Half Million Cattle Purchased In Drouth Areas

More than a half-million cattle had been purchased in the drought stricken states of the west, at the close of business Thursday, June 28, the Agricultural Adjustment Administration announced today, and more than 60,000 had been ordered shipped in to southern states to be grazed and eventually processed under Federal Surplus Relief Corporation supervision.

Seven states contributed to the 513,045 cattle purchased to date, and sales by states were: Arizona 744; Minnesota, 70,269; North Dakota, 522,610; Oklahoma, 175; South Dakota, 103,900; Texas, 9,781; Wisconsin, 5,566. These cattle came from 45,365 farms in the seven states, and represented a little less than half the total inventory of cattle on these farms, which was 1,284,000.

Total payments on these purchases at the end of business June 28 amounted to \$677,381, of which \$253,835 was for benefit payments and \$443,546 for purchase payments. Vouchers for the balance are being prepared. More than 5,700 separate vouchers have been issued.

Federal officials in the Northwest have received instruction to ship immediately 63,780 head of cattle into seven Southern States, where they will be grazed for a time and then slaughtered and processed for distribution to needy families.

Further orders for shipments into these and other states are expected within a few days. The consignments already ordered total by states: Alabama, 2,200; Arkansas, 20,000; Georgia, 15,625; Oklahoma, 5,000; South Carolina, 10,500; Tennessee, 10,130; Virginia, 525.
