Local race on the Democratic ballot is the runoff between incumbent R. L. Scott and H.E. Newsom for County Commissioner, Precinct One.

Also on the Democratic ballot is the runoff for State Senator, District 31. On the ballot are

## In Profile

# Enthusiastic, Friendly, Bright; Meet Toni Eagle

The cheerful voice answers the telephone--'Chamber of Commerce. This is Toni.' And, when you hear that bright, pert voice, your day begins to look better!

She's Toni Eagle, who has been manager of the Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture for nearly four years. She's also enthusiastic, a true Muleshoe booster, and ready to help in any way she can. She's a 'spark plug' in boosting Muleshoe and its people.

Born in Amherst, Toni Eagle grew up in Sudan and graduated from Sudan High School in 1973. Shortly after graduating, she married Weldon Eagle, who is an employee of Energas.

Toni came to the CoFC in a sort of a roundabout way. They moved to Earth, and for three years, Toni drove from Earth to Muleshoe every day where she was employed. She spent approximately one year at *Muleshoe Journal/Bailey County Journals* as society reporter before becoming a physical education aide at DeShazo Elementary School for 10 years.

Toni Eagle became a big

'booster' of Muleshoe and was vocal in her support of her adopted community. She talked to other people about the assets of Muleshoe, and wrote letters to the editor, reminding people of the 'great community' where they lived and worked.

Four years ago, when then CoFC Manager John Gulley decided to return to teaching, Toni was approached about becoming the CoFC manager.

This was partially due to her emphatic and enthusiastic approach to the city.

After some thought, soul-searching, and discussion, she decided to make the change.

'It wasn't easy,' said Toni, 'I loved my kids at school, and loved what I was doing.'

'But, I needed a new challenge. I had set up a P.E. program at DeShazo, and just ran it day to day. Following the same lesson plans. There was no more challenge there.'

At first, Toni was wondering just what she had gotten herself into. She took over the reins of the Chamber just before the annual Fourth of July Celebration. It meant long hours, a lot of agony, and wondering if

everything could be pulled together prior to the big, all-day celebration -- it was -- and went off beautifully.

Toni pulled off a major coup the following June by bringing George Strait to Muleshoe to perform. Strait had just been named Entertainer of the Year nationally, and the Bailey County Civic Center was filled to overflowing, as people poured in from all over the area. This made the largest crowd, ever, for the Bailey County Civic Center.

Other 'name' entertainers have also been contracted to come to Muleshoe, although none is ever expected to 'top' the George Strait show.

Straightforward, plain-spoken Toni Eagle sometimes 'rubs people the wrong way' and gets in 'hot water' from those who are not accustomed to a direct approach.

Always looking as though she stepped from the fashion window of a classy store, she is blessed with the ability to make her clothing, and choose accessories that always make her stand out in a crowd -- and look the part she plays -- a known

representative for the small city she loves.

Toni Eagle stands firm in her beliefs, and doesn't waver when she believes she is right -- and that at times lands her in 'hot water' with some people. Nonetheless, each and every aim of the cheerful manager of the CoFC is always headed in the same direction -- to do something to boost the image of Muleshoe and its people.

In order to do her chosen profession more efficiently, this will be the fourth year for Toni to attend the Institute for Organization Management.

Each June, she goes to Dallas for a week to attend the sessions.

And, just in case you think it is a 'shoo-in' to attend the classes, well, think again. In order to attend, a study packet is sent to each applicant. After study, there is an entrance exam. If you fail the entrance exam -- you're out -- it's that simple.

CoFC managers from all over the United States attend the yearly sessions, says Toni, and

Louise Allen and Novella Price served refreshments to 18 members.

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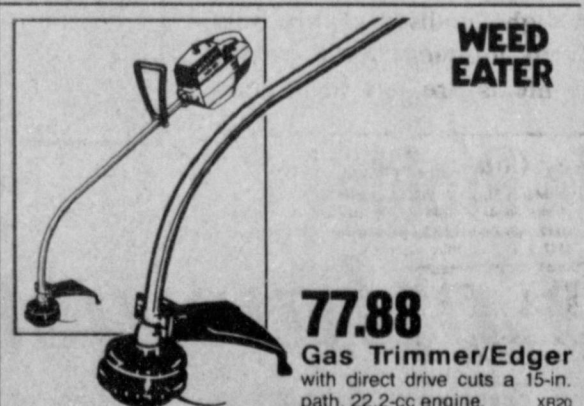

Jackson is a 1980, graduate of Deming High School.



exists." By using modern state of the art x-ray equipment, breast cancers can be found when they are about the size of a grain of rice and well before the cancer can be felt.

A woman who is diagnosed with breast cancer at this early stage has a 90-97 percent survival rate. However, a woman who is not diagnosed until a lump can be felt has approximately a 50 percent survival rate in five years.

In an effort to find cancers at the earliest possible stage and prevent unnecessary deaths, a mobile breast cancer detection unit will be made available to local women on April 14 in Muleshoe.

The mobile unit will be parked at West Plains Medical Center parking lot. Appointments may be made by calling 272-4524 (ask for Barbara).

Other upcoming tournaments include the Annual Kickoff Classic to be held April 9-10. This will be a three-man lowball scramble.

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
