Enthusiastic, Friendly, Bright; Meet Toni Eagle

The cheerful voice answers the telephone-- 'Chamber of Commerce. This is Toni." And, when you hear that bright, pert voice, your day begins to look

She's Toni Eagle, who has been manager of the Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture for nearly four years. She's also enthusiastic, a true Muleshoe booster, and ready to help in any way she can. She's a 'spark plug' in boosting Muleshoe and its people.

Born in Amherst, Toni Eagle grew up in Sudan and graduated from Sudan High School in 1973. Shortly after graduating, she married Weldon Eagle, who is an emplopyee of Energas.

Toni came to the CofC in a sort of a roundabout way.

They moved to Earth, and for three years, Toni drove from Earth to Muleshoe every day where she was employed. She spent approximately one year at Muleshoe Journal/Bailey County Journals as society reporter before becoming a physical education aide at DeShazo Elementary School for 10 years. Toni Eagle became a big 'booster' of Muleshoe and was vocal in her support of her adopted community. She talked to other people about the assets of Muleshoe, and wrote letters to the editor, reminding people of the 'great community' where they lived and worked.
