The two teams let up from their sirtight one and two-score games Saturday when both let loose a barrage of hits to give the customers plenty of action through the nine innings. Texon opened the fireworks in the first frame with two scores and the Giants in their half of the same inning push ed over five runs with three walks one error and four bunched hits. The Oilers were hitting freely in succeeding frames for two runs in the second, one in the fifth and two in the sixth. In their half of the sixth, however, the Giants barged one ahead with three more runs, but the defending champions evened it in the seventh and

BUSINESS

AUSTIN, Sept. 18-The legislature, with Gov. Allred's message recommending regulation of liquor traffic as the first major problem to be attacked, plunged Permian Basin League, has sent this week, after brief organization in the following all-star team and routine, into this troublesome question. Current opinion is that the law adopted will eliminate the old the post." fashioned custom of standing at the bar with one foot on the decorative brass rail. Constitutional ban on the "open saloon" will eliminate standup drinking. Probably liquor will be sold by the drink only in hotels, cafes and other bona fide food-serving establishments. A rather high license fee, designed to raise substantial revenue, while still not permitting bootleggers to thrive other provision.

Next for consideration will be method of compensating fee officers, to vitalize the constitutional amendment abolishing the fee system. And third on the governor's program is the old age pension amendment. This matter contains more political possibilities, and likewise more legislative possibilities than all the others combined. To finance the pensions the whole question of state reven-.923 ue and taxation will be opened up. and sales tax advocates are preparing to stage a vigorous drive to push thru their plan. They will meet opposition from Gov. Allred, who has said: "There are plenty of other ways to raise revenue." He will no doubt urge some of the 17 new sources of taxation he proposed at the regular session, practically all of which failed of passage. Legislators here report more interest among the home folks in old-age pensions than in any other subject before the solons.

President Roosevelt has given American business a "breathing spell" nationally, and following the same line of thought, Gov. All red has virtually assured the state's billion-dollar oil industry a legislative breathing spell so far as the special session is concerned. Up to last Saturday, the governor declared he had received not a single request to submit oil legislation of any kind, and he plainly said he "was giving no consideration" to submitting new oil laws. His statement answered rumors and propaganda circulated by those with whom the wish is father to the thought. The governor takes the attitude that the railroad commission and the attorney general are doing a reasonably good job of controlling oil production, and East Texas oil men attending the last proration hearing here let it be known plainly they are tired of being made a political football every few months by those whose interests are served thru keeping a continual state of real or threatened chaos in the oil business.

The Oil States Compact, written by Allred and Col. E. O. Thompson, rail commission chairman, adopted by most oil producing states and ratified by congress, went into effect last week at the Oklahoma City meeting. It declares for "conservation of oil to prevent physical waste" and specifically declares against 'stab lization, price-fixing or regimentation to promote monoply." It marked virtually complete victory for Allred and Thompson in their long fight against federal bureaucratic control of Texas oil. The legislature, when it gets into the revenue question, may seek to increase oil taxes, but so far as the governor is concerned, he probably will send up no new oil legislation this session.

Texans are about to witness a substantial blow at depression that will put many thousands of workers on payrolls immediately. as the state highway department prepares to let highway improvement contracts on the largest scale ever recorded for a similar

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period of time. Nearly \$38,000,000 of work is scheduled to be contracted between Sept. 24 and Dec. 15. Regulations call for completion of this great program by July I next year. It took from May when the \$38,000,000 state and federal funds was made available. until now to get the program start ed. 

Condition Deplorable

Conditions were equally or more deplorable in Texas. This is proved by the translation of a letter from the Bexar Archives in the library of The University of Texas written on May 22, 1814, by the Governor of Texas to the Commandant General, as follows:

"The misery to which this province is now unfortunately reduced-and this state of affairs is well known to you from many sources and an analysis of its cause would be almost officiousforces me to delineate most hurriedly the calamitous situation which is injuriously affecting the unfortunate inhabitants of this province. They are hopelessly lost in their misery. They have been weakened by their past misfortunes. They are complaining most piteously over the lack of sustenance for themselves and their fam ilies. They are lamenting over the crisis and weeping bitterly over their fate-especially when they remember the terrible misery which lies before them. Their fields will yield but little more than they are compelled to have for their daily sustenance. Under these critical circumstances, the regiment under my charge is forced to live entirely on meat, with no possibility itself of even a tortilla. So their misery has reached its highest possible point. I, there fore, hope that you will be convinced that the small amount of supplies received from Alferez Aresmendi will suffice only for bare subsistence for the time already indicated to you in detail; and I trust that you will be forced to use the remedy of violence, a redress absolutely necessary un-



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
