

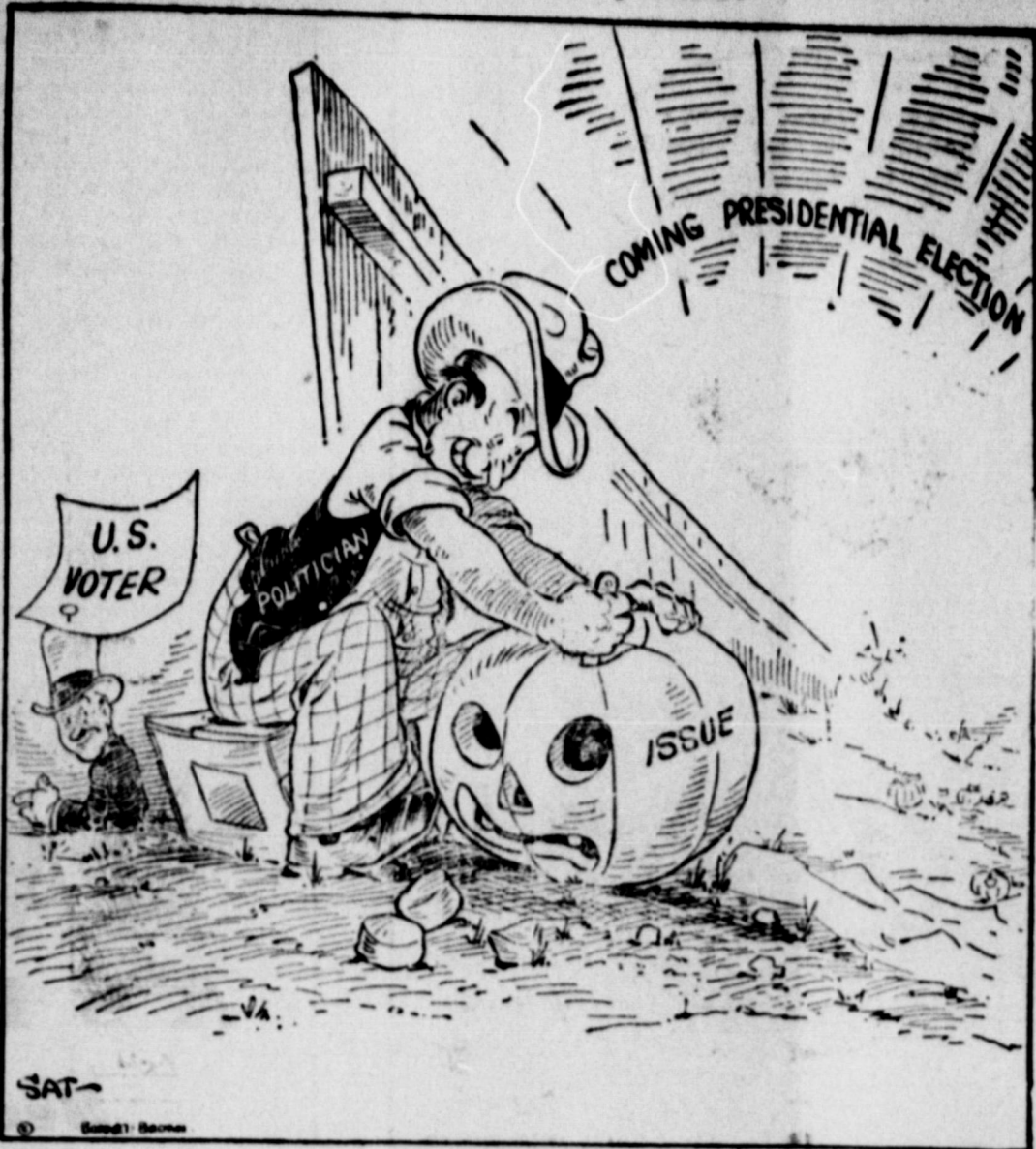
Ferguson Dema Provide Mementum to Bullington Drive

LLAS, Oct. 26—With two wide non-partisan organizations opposing the candidacy of Miriam A. Ferguson for governor, the campaign in behalf of Bullington has been given tremendous impetus during the week, according to Cato Sells, Chairman of the League of Ferguson Democrats. Mr. Sells, for years a leader in the Democratic Party, says that "thou of Texas voters who have before scratched a Democratic ticket will cast their vote for Bullington."

Roosevelt-Garner-Bullington, with Dr. Webb Walker as its state chairman, has extended the reciprocal operation of the League of Ferguson Democrats. In a telegram to Dr. Walker, Mr. Sells said, in part: "There is good reason to believe that the organization is being effected by the group of you are chairman. Texas Must Be Saved From Ferguson Says Sterling In Urging Democrats To Rally To Support Of Bullington

EDITOR'S NOTE— Following is a statement prepared by Gov. Ross S. Sterling and released to the press this week:

There is but one thing left for Texans who love their State and Democrats who love their party to do; and that is to throw the whole weight of their influence and their votes behind Orville Bullington for Governor.

Texas Democrats cannot render the Democratic Party a better service than by smashing Fergusonism with their votes at the November election, and I predict that this is what they will do by a substantial majority.

As a life long Democrat I rejoice in the glowing prospects of the election of a Democratic President and a Vice-President of the United States; but the Democratic banner must not be tarnished with the slime of Fergusonism. It would make the democracy of the nation hang their heads in shame for the Democratic hosts of Grand Old Texas to be led by Jim Ferguson when Roosevelt and Garner are inaugurated in Washington next March.

I feel it my duty to the people of Texas, in the crisis which confronts them, to leave nothing undone and make any sacrifice within my power to prevent the return of Fergusonism to the control of our state government.

Two years ago I was nominated Governor by more than 88,000 majority; and I have served the people of Texas with absolute fidelity and to the best of my ability and at enormous personal sacrifice. When I became Governor I was well-to-do and now I am returned to the ranks of the poor from which I sprang but I have no regrets. To serve the people of Texas even at such a sacrifice has been a glorious privilege.

I have been a candidate for Governor again this year, because I was convinced that it was my duty to the people of Texas. During my two years in the Governor's office at Austin and four years before that as Chairman of the State Highway Commission, I have had opportunities which few others have had to study Fergusonism at close range and to appreciate and understand this terrible menace to the people of Texas. When the Legislature is in session, and when it is adjourned, Jim Ferguson operates out of Austin and all his pirate gang make this their headquarters; and I have known the desperate organized effort that was going to be made to elect him Governor in his wife's name this year; and I have felt that as a candidate for a second term I could probably make a stronger race than any other anti-Ferguson candidate that might be chosen out of the vicissitudes of a campaign with the large number of candidates

that would have been in the field if I had not run. Besides, my business training and experience, as applied to the Governor's office, convince me that a Governor who serves one term owes it to the people at least to offer for a second term; for a Governor who serves honestly and faithfully during his first term preeminently fits himself for valuable service to the people in his second term.

Thus believing it to be my duty I submitted my candidacy to the people in the Democratic primaries this year; and I have no doubt whatever that of the lawful votes cast in the run-off primary I received a majority of many thousands.

So believing, I had no doubt that it was my duty to the people of Texas and to the cause of good government to take the necessary steps provided by law to secure a review and a recount in the courts of the result as certified by the Chairman and the Secretary of the State Democratic Convention; and I appealed to the people for their support and financial assistance in seeking this review, and I am grateful for their generous and hearty response to my appeal. I received more votes in the run-off primary this year than I received two years ago when I was nominated by over 88,000 majority and I have never had the slightest doubt that a recount of the ballots cast in the run-off primary would establish my legal right to the nomination for Governor beyond all question and I have hoped that such a recount would be ordered by the court, so that the correct result could be ascertained and declared by the court in ample time for the name of the nominee to be printed on the official ballot. Certainly, no one ought to object to a recount of the ballots in an election in order that mistakes and frauds and illegalities may be corrected and the true result ascertained.

But a condition and not a theory confronted the people of Texas at this time. Jim Ferguson and his lawyers and henchmen have been determined that there should be no investigation of the run-off primary election and no recount of the ballots and they have done everything possible, by filibustering methods of delay and otherwise, to make such a recount impossible.

Under these circumstances my duty is clear and I am determined to do all that I can to consolidate the forces opposed to Fergusonism and render its return to power impossible.

There can be no doubt that the old crowd which fattened off of the people and the State Highway fund and the State Treasury are in high feather and are licking their chops over the prospect of

again getting access to the public trough. The leaders in the old American Road Company gang and the old Hoffman Construction Company gang and all the other smaller outfits have been and still are in the fight for Ferguson this year up to their necks.

If Jim Ferguson should again become Governor in his wife's name he will urge upon the Legislature and use all the power of the Governor's office to pass a bill creating a new highway commission, in place of the present highway commission, which he will appoint and in this way secure absolute control of the millions of dollars in the state highway fund for the next two years.

It will be found that he will urge and if possible force through another bill creating a commission to be appointed by the Governor to take over the work of the present Railroad Commission and control the output of oil by the Texas oil fields and thus put under his control every oil producer big and little doing business in the State.

And he will endeavor to pass various other measures adding to the power of the Governor's office and to his own profit.

If the people of Texas could understand the situation as it really exists they would know that the menace of Fergusonism threatens them with greater damage than they have ever been confronted with before; and they would agree with me that absolutely nothing must be left undone to prevent its return to power.

The issue is plain and it is the issue of common sense and responsible government as must be saved from Fergusonism.

Recent odors wafted over Texas indicate that Doc's boys are, at present, using Austin as their base of operations.

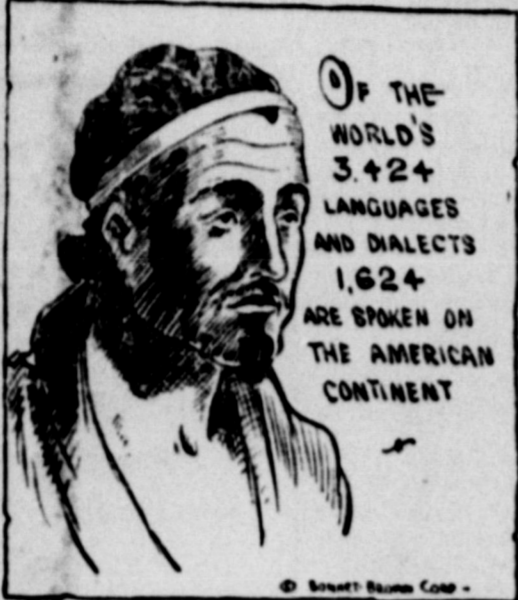

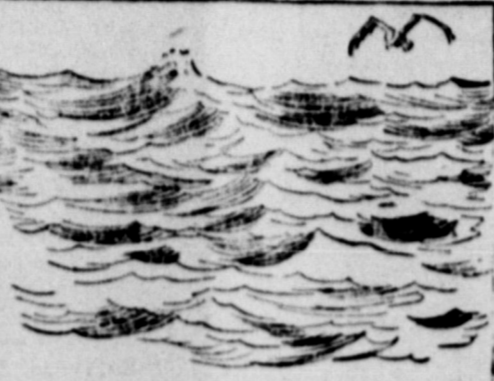

Texas Wool Industry

By W. E. TALBOT

Editor's Note—This is the seventh of a series of articles dealing with the possibilities of the wool industry in Texas. Colonel Talbot, managing director of the Southwest Industrial Development Bureau, is an acknowledged authority on the subject of industrialization for Texas.

Today we are shipping our wool "in the grease" to New England, paying freight rates on approximately 40 per cent of dirt and grease. Here the cloth is manufactured and the three units of men's clothing and overcoats and women's suits are shipped back to us. Under normal conditions for every dollar we get for wool we pay \$8 for the finished product, which loss is reflected in salaries and labor among our own people.

We have been told that wool cloth could not be manufactured in the South because of climatic conditions; that we do not have skilled workers, and that we could not create styles that would sell. I was told that I was just a plain and fancy darn fool when I sug-

gested that it could be done in Texas. Of course, the man who made the remark was an Eastern manufacturer. So I accepted it as a challenge and went about to ascertain whether or not it could be done. In a short time we had two concerns making 700 suits a week and there were sold from twenty to thirty-five a day. We have today in Texas as cheap power as is obtainable in any State in the Union. In addition to this, there are oil, gas and lignite. We have long, light, working days; adequate transportation; intelligent labor, and last but not least, a market in Texas of 6,000,000 and in our actual trade territory, of 12,000,000. In other words, the only thing lacking to make a success of this industry has been initiative.

In addition to it all, we produce the raw material itself, and economic management has shown that success, under present conditions, can be achieved only by those manufacturing plants close to the source of raw material.
