The geophysical survey unit of he Humble Oil and Refining Company, which has completed compilation in the vicinity of Rankin recently, has moved to Osons and established an office in the Smith No. 2 building while the survey unit carries on operations near here during the next

The Humble party is accompanied here by the drilling crew of R. B. Miles, of Big Spring. which has the drilling contract for the local Humble survey party. The compilation work is under the supervision of Party Chief W. R Feather. There are sixteen members on the survey staff and fifteen connected with drilling

Lon Ogg and Stanley Allen are office men for the local party. Equipment of the survey and drilling party had been moved in and operations were started the first of the week about twenty miles northwest of here.

New Ford V-8 For 1936 On Display Here

Local Agency Receives New Model; Many Refinements Noted

New Ford V-8 cars for 1936 are now on display at Ford dealers throughout the country. The first of the new model Fords was displayed here Saturday at the show rooms of the Stevens Motor Co., local Ford dealers. It is a standard Tudor sedan.

Body lines which strike a new note in conservative streamlining, a new treatment of the interiors and three important refinements in chassis engineering summarize the principal improvements of the new Ford V-8. The other is an improved transmission using quiet belical gears-formerly used only in second and high speeds-in all forward speeds and reverse.

With its vertical slots and more accentuated "Vee," as well as its smoothly rounded lower edge which blends with the streamlined curve of the inner portion of the fenders, the grille contributes a new note of

Fenders are streamlined, a wide inward flare giving them an imposing appearance. Louvres are of new design. Horns are now recessed in the fender aprons back of small round grilles beneath the streamlined headlamps.

The welded steel body is low and wide, with flowing rear quarter lines. Finish is a Ford-develop. ed baked enamel. There are five body colors, Washington blue, gray Vineyard green, Cordoba tan gunmetal and black, of which the first two are new, De luxe body types are available in any of the five colors, with fenders matching and wheels of new design in a harmonizing color. 



Largest Watch In World, Made By Big Lake Man, Displayed

The world's largest watch, "The Jumbo Masterviece," weighing 125 pounds, is the creation of T. L. Miller, Big Lake jeweler, who formerly operated a watch and jewelry shop in Ozona. The mammoth timepiece will be on display at the Kryer Jewelry Store, 9 West Beauregard, San Angelo, Friday and Saturday, according to the maker in a letter to the Stockman

The Big Lake and McCamey is well known ip jeweler, v this section, built the unique watch in a machine shop while in Seattle, Wash., during the past summer. The movement in the watch is 14 by 1812 inches. The balance wheel measures 1114 inches in diameter and the net weight of the movement is 35 pounds. Complete in the case, the huge watch weighs 125 pounds The watch maker spent 720 actual working hours on the novelty mechanism, beginning work with raw materials. The hairspring is six inches in diameter and required about 16 hours in making. The jewels are made of jasper and agate.

From 1915 to 1925 Mr. Miller was in the jewelry business in Sonora and during that time be did watch repairing and jewelry business in Ozona in the Smith Drug Store.
