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## State May Place Highway Markers

### Gilchrist Advises Lion Committee To Submit Desired Wording

A committee from the Ozona Lions Club, headed by Rev. J. H. Meredith, which has been at work for the last several months seeking erection of suitable markers at places of historic interest along the Old Spanish Trail through this county, received considerable encouragement recently in a letter from Gibb Gilchrist, state highway engineer, who proffered the services of the department in bringing about a realization of the project.

Mr. Gilchrist wrote the committee to offer his co-operation in erecting the markers and asked that legends which the club wished to appear on the markers be submitted to him, promising to investigate the possibilities of having the state highway department erect the markers.

A marker to be placed at the crossing of the highway over the Pecos River, one at old Fort Lancaster, one nearest Howard Wells and one on the north road at the site of an historic Indian fight, one of the last in this section, were designated by the committee. The marker at the Pecos River will recite that Cabeza de Vaca crossed the Pecos River near that spot in the sixteenth century. At Howard Wells, the legend will recite some of the massacres and other events of historic interest connected with this locality, and some of the history of Old Fort Lancaster will be included in the marker at that spot.

## Auto License Plates Ready

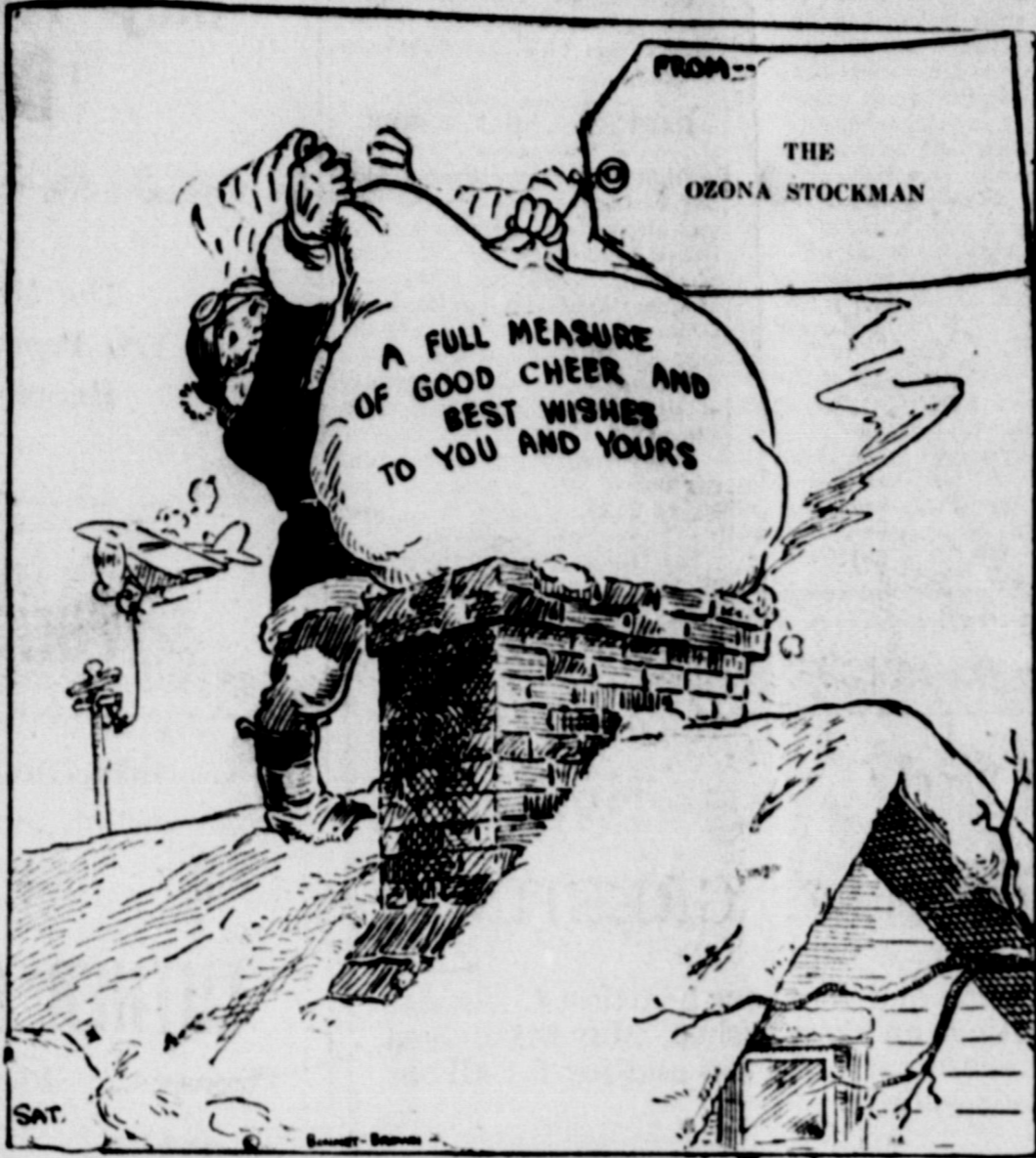
### Sale Will Not Begin, However, Until Jan. 1, Sheriff Says

## Ingham Suffers Fractured Leg

### Rancher And County Commissioner Hurt In Fall Of Horse

B. B. Ingham, rancher along the Pecos River in this county and county commissioner of precinct 1, suffered a double fracture of his left leg Saturday afternoon when a horse he was riding on the ranch slipped on an ice-coated rock and fell with him.

Mr. Ingham was rushed to Ozona following the accident and the broken bones were set by Dr. F. T. McIntire after X-Ray pictures had been made showing the extent of the injuries. The leg was placed in a cast and reports from his bedside this morning indicated that Mr. Ingham was resting well.

The small bone was fractured just above the ankle and the large or shin bone about four inches above. Both were diagonal fractures. Mr. Ingham was riding his horse down the side of a hill and did not notice the ice covered rock in time to prevent the horse from stepping on it. In the fall, the leg was pinned between the horse and the rock.

## 16 Gridsters Get Sweaters For 1932

### Buddy Moore Awarded Lions Cup As Most Valuable Player

Sixteen members of the 1932 Ozona High School football squad were awarded sweaters and letters at a special program in the High School auditorium Tuesday morning.

Following the award of the letters by Coach Ted White, Hugh Childress, Jr., president of the Ozona Lions Club, presented the handsome silver loving cup offered by the club to the most valuable player on this year's squad. Buddy Moore, captain and end, a three-year veteran of the Lions grid aggregation, was declared the first winner of the Lions Club trophy, which is to be awarded each year for the next five years.

### Chosen By Secret Group

Moore was selected by vote of a secret committee, chosen by a committee named by the club. Members of the secret committee are known only to the club committee which appointed them and membership of the secret committee is unknown to members themselves. Individual ballots were filed with the club committee and the tabulation of these were made by the committee to decide the winner.

The winner of the cup was chosen several weeks ago in order to allow time for engraving the name on the cup, but the selection had been kept secret until the award Tuesday morning. The cup will be awarded each year for five years and the name of the winner and the year of his choice engraved on the trophy. The cup will remain the property of the school at the conclusion of that time.

The 1932 sweaters are a radical departure from the usual color scheme of purple and gold. The new sweaters are a beautiful blue with a big white "O" in the center of the breast and "service stripes" of white on the sleeves. They are of the slip-over style and are made of pure wool in heavy weight.

## Mexican Boy Hurt In Auto Accident

### Hector Vargas, 8, Suffered Brain Concussion In Crash

Hector Vargas, 8-year-old son of Santiago Vargas, local Mexican was seriously injured Wednesday afternoon when he was thrown from a small truck following a collision between the truck and a Lincoln sedan driven by W. T. Dick, an official of the Superior Oil Company of Los Angeles and Dallas.

The accident occurred near the dump ground on the Ozona-Sonora road. Mr. Dick, according to his version of the accident, did not see the small truck, driven by Antonio Cardona, another Mexican lad, back out from the dump ground and into the highway. The big car crashed into the side of the small truck, throwing the younger Mexican boy, who was riding in the pick-up body, to the ground. Neither car turned over, but the small truck was badly damaged, according to reports.

Young Vargas was brought to town by Mr. Dick and taken to the office of Dr. F. T. McIntire, who took X-Ray pictures to determine the extent of the lad's injuries. A deep gash on the back of his head and a slight concussion of the brain resulted from the accident. The boy was taken to his home following treatment and at last reports was resting well. Cardona was badly shaken by the impact but was not seriously injured.

Mr. Dick has been here several days in the interest of leasing for oil development in this county for his company. Ed Bean was in the car with him at the time of the accident.

## Strangled Dog Is Revived By Prone Pressure Method

Training given by his company in artificial resuscitation methods for use in case of electrocution stood V. Vanzandt, local manager for the West Texas Utilities Company, in good stead Tuesday night in reviving a valuable dog, owned by L. A. Young, which had been strangled by falling from the rear of a small truck on the return trip from an evening's coon hunt.

Mr. Vanzandt and Mr. Young had been coon hunting with two of Mr. Young's hounds. The dogs were tied in the back of the truck on the return and one of them jumped or fell from the truck and hung by his neck. When the animal's plight was finally discovered by the two men, the dog was apparently dead.

The prone pressure method of resuscitation, valuable in restoring human life in case of drowning, suffocation or electrocution was applied by Mr. Vanzandt to the strangled dog and after about ten minutes of application of artificial respiration, the dog began to breathe normally and in a few minutes more was on his feet, completely revived.

Mr. Vanzandt says that he will be glad to demonstrate and teach this method of resuscitation to anybody interested in learning it.

## Aged Sheffield Man Dies Wed.

J. M. Holmes, 85, pioneer rancher in the Sheffield area, died shortly after midnight Tuesday night in a San Angelo hospital.

## Texas Wool Industry

Editor's Note—This is the thirteenth of a series of articles dealing with the possibilities of the wool industry in Texas. Colonel Talbot, managing director of the Southwest Industrial Development Bureau, is an acknowledged authority on the subject of industrialization for Texas.

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If we are going to bring back normal conditions, there are five words beginning with "C" that we must have constantly in mind. They are Confidence, Cash, Credit, Co-operation and Consumption.

Everyone in Texas today, whether he raises wool or not, is directly interested in the rehabilitation of these growers and increased opportunity for employment of our people. Here is an opportunity to start this industry going, and, as I said in a previous article, it would not cost you a cent. You are going to buy a wool suit this fall, maybe two of them. If you will write me that you are going

to buy a Texas wool suit, I can segregate all these orders by towns, and hand these orders to the merchant in your home town; then, in turn, take an order from him for so many wool suits, this order to be turned over to our cutting plants, and these will in turn give us orders for the cloth. This in turn gives us an opportunity to go to these cities most concerned and give them a growing concern with orders and retail distribution complete up through the retail merchants of this State, with customers for their products. This plan costs you nothing, as you are going to buy these commodities anyway. Won't you fill out this coupon and mail to me?

Remember, Uncle Sam put 100 cents in a dollar when he made it, and if we will put common sense in the spending of our dollar we can help our own people help themselves, which will reflect in buying power to purchase the products that we ourselves have to sell.

### U. of T. Discontinues Scholarship Awards To Honor Graduates

AUSTIN, TEXAS, Dec. 21—Exemptions of fees granted to certain students of The University of Texas because of their high standing as valedictorians and salutatorians in high school and for the achievement of other honors and distinctions will be eliminated henceforth as the result of a policy adopted by the Board of Regents at their last meeting in Austin. No student will be exempted from college fees except those expressly exempt by the statutes of the State; namely, veterans of the World War, and veterans of the Spanish American War.

Other State-supported higher educational institutions of Texas already have taken or will take the same action. A resolution favoring such action was passed at a meeting of Texas senior college presidents in March, 1932. The University has recently conducted an inquiry into this practice in other state universities west of the Alleghenies. As a result of that inquiry, it appeared that not half of the states have any extensive fee exemption systems and that far less than a third have

systems in any wise resembling the one that has prevailed in Texas.

The University of Texas Regents scholarships include those given to the valedictorian of the senior class of each accredited Texas high school, to the valedictorian of the graduating class of each first class junior college, to Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, and Camp Fire Girls satisfying certain requirements, to students making high averages in correspondence work, and to winners of literary events in the Interscholastic League.

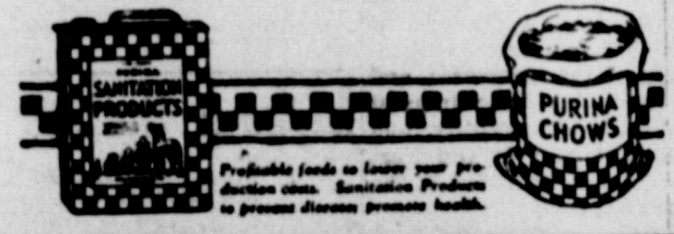

## School Libraries Necessary Part Of Any School, Says Local Librarian In Fine Paper On "Library And Its Uses"

EDITOR'S NOTE: Following is a paper written by Miss Lucille Williamson, teacher in the Ozona Schools, and read at a recent Parent-Teacher Association meeting:

Education of today is primarily concerned with preparing boys and girls to take their place as worthy citizens in the community. It is therefore necessary to teach them how to think for themselves. We no longer tell them what to think by memorizing text books. Today we advise them to seek information from many sources—books, periodicals, and the like—to compare these, reach conclusions, and report their findings and opinions to their teachers and classmates.

We believe in pupil activity. Group education is a thing of the past. Our standard is individual development. We search for traits, talents and interests of the individual. This method of teaching means that one textbook is not enough. The boy who is interested in becoming a forest ranger cannot satisfy his desire to know about the life of a forest ranger from the material given in a civics book. The librarian has to place every resource at her command within his reach before he is satisfied. This brings us to the fundamental reason for the stress that is being laid upon school libraries of today. The modern method of instruction requires many teaching tools, of which books and other printed matter are the most used.

To be quickly available to pupils and teachers, books, periodicals, pamphlets, bulletins, and clippings must be classified, catalogued arranged on the shelves, and provided with a system of records. Such a collection properly organized become the book laboratory of the school. To serve its purpose adequately the school library should measure up to the standards as stated in the following definition: "The high school library is a carefully selected collection of books, periodicals, pamphlets, clippings and illustrative material, chosen to meet the needs of the average high school student, organized according to modern library methods by a trained librarian who is interested in boys and girls." A visit to a modern school building reveals even to a casual observer that the school library ranks with the shops, laboratories, and gymnasium as an architectural and instructional feature of the present educational plan.

### Surpass Requirements

The opportunity of the school library to translate library service into the objectives of education and life calls for thoughtful and definite organization and care. In order to give you a survey of the Ozona High School Library, I shall mention some of the principal requirements as set forth by the Southern Association of Schools and Colleges and the degree to which we meet these requirements. Each school which has an enrollment of 100 or less students in high school should have 500 well selected books, exclusive of government documents and textbooks, to meet the needs for references, supplementary reading and cultural and inspirational reading. In the 1930-31 report we see that 2,500 books are listed in our high school library and 1,350 in the elementary grades and junior high school class room libraries. These books are selected from the state approved lists. Also one good general newspaper in addition to the local one, and a well selected list of from 5 to 10 periodicals suitable for students' use are required. At the present time our library is provided with 2 daily newspapers and 10 monthly periodicals.

The teacher-librarian is required to have at least six semester hours training in library science. She should devote definite periods each day to service in the library. We have eight hours training in library science and the librarian devotes one definite period to work in the library and gives service at other times during the day when assistance to students is necessary. The library is open every period during the school day. Student assistants are in the library every period to manage routine affairs. These assistants are organized into a Library Council and carry out nearly every activity of the librarian herself. They act as reading advisors to fellow students, charge and discharge books loaned, arrange books on shelves, keep a check on magazines and make book cards. In brief, they serve as the library staff under the unobtrusive eye of

travel, biography, legend, hero stories, and romance for the older pupils. The collection should be large enough to furnish each pupil with a continuous means of mental development during his eight years in school.

### Books Necessary Tools

Library books are a good investment. They bring large dividends. They arouse new interests, open new visions, enlarge the horizon, stimulate imagination and foster ambition. They may become a deciding factor in the choice of a vocation, and in the ethical and moral guidance of boys and girls. They are necessary tools in the school room. Rightfully chosen and properly used, they help to make better citizens of boys and girls. Organized for quick and ready reference, they multiply the efficiency of every teacher.

Most of our high school libraries have far too few books other than those to supplement the studies pursued in school. While this is a very proper function of a high school library it is not its greatest one. The formation and direction of the reading habit is the chief function of the school library. Whether a pupil knows a little less or a little more of a given subject is not a matter of supreme importance but it is a matter of the utmost importance that he shall leave school with a desire to continue to learn and a knowledge of how to study any subject that may interest him in the future. Training to use books intelligently contributes more to this end than anything else that the library can do for young people.

It can not be repeated too often that books for the school library should be very carefully chosen. They should be usable. It is more
