#### Stanolind Expected To Drill Plug For Final Test

Pressure will be released and reparations started to drill plug from Stanolind Oil and Gas Comsany et al, No. 1 J. S. Todd, Crockett County test seeking production from the Ordivican, on Tednesday or Thursday.

Seven-inch casing was set and remented during the middle of the ast week at 7,006 feet, where the irst member of the Ordivican was acountered.

Ellenberger lime, from which veral cores were taken carrying a oder of gas and oil, was topped at 7,247 feet and the hole is now ottomed at 7,357 feet.

Elevation of 2,660 feet, making top of Ellenberger 4,587 feet below sea level.

Deep wells in the Big Lake pool of Reagan County, 30 miles northrest of Stanolind et al., No. 1 fold have produced more than 14,000,000 barrels of high gravity oil from the Ellenberger lime.

Big Lake Oil Company No. C-1 University, a producer deepened to a new record depth for Texas at 9.562 feet, which started work of unloading for a test, was shut down for Christmas. Operators reumed work Tuesday, but no test of production had been completed. Continental Oil Company No. A-1-23 Todd, one of the two new hallow tests in Crockett County started by that company since coring of formation carrying odors of oil and gas in Stanolind et al. No. 1 Todd, was reported drilling Tuesday below 405 feet. The test is in section 23, block WX, G., C. & S. F. #### **Wool Firm Sells** 2,500,000 Pounds

#### Price Average Reported 131/2 Cents; Higher Prices Seen

The Wool Growers Central Storage Company of San Angelo Monday sold to C. D. Stokes, wool buyer for Winslow and Company of Boston, about 2,500,000 pounds of 12 months wool at a price average of around 131/2 cents, according to reports. The top price was around 14 cents.

The price average for the big sale was approximately 4 cents above the Spring price.
