## Conduits For Gas Mains Laid Here

### Franchise Holders Lay Pipes Under Paving For System

Ozona seemed a step nearer installation of a natural gas distributing system late last week when a crew of workmen installed six-inch casings as conduits under the streets which are being surfaced under the highway building program.

The conduits were installed before completion of the streets to carry the gas mains under the paving and thus saving expensive repairs to the paved streets.

The work was done under the direction of Harve Loomis of Baird, H. H. Shaw of Baird and M. G. Williams of Gorman, holders franchise from the County Commissioners Court granting permission for installing a natural gas distributing system here.

These men announced recently that the installation of the gas system for Ozona would be completed by late summer. Placing of these conduits under the streets, however, is the first visible move that has been made in that direction.

## Crockett Births Lead Deaths 3-1

### Stork Visits Number 56 While Deaths Total 17

The stork had a better than three-to-one advantage over the reaper in Crockett County during the year 1932, according to figures compiled by the Bureau of Vital Statistics of the State Department of Health at Austin.

There was, however, a slump of 10 in births over the previous year, while recorded deaths climbed up by two. There was a total of 56 births registered in this county in 1932, against 17 deaths. For the previous year the figures were 66 births and 15 deaths and for the year 1930, 55 births and 16 deaths.

Texas being the only state in the Union whose records of vital statistics are not recognized by the Federal Census Bureau, the only state in the Union outside the registration area, efforts are being made by the state bureau to have this state included in the area. The Federal government has been requested and has agreed to make a test of the thoroughness of registration of births and death for 1932 and that test is now under way. If registration is found to be over 90 per cent of births and deaths occurring, Texas will be admitted to the registration area. Justices of the peace are the local registrars of vital statistics under Texas law.

## DYNAMITE DAMAGES

A broken window glass in the local office of the West Texas Utilities Company, a broken glass in a gasoline pump at the Magnolia Filling Station and slight damage to an automobile belonging to Richard Miller resulted from the explosion of a charge of dynamite set in front of the filling station Tuesday to blow out the concrete foundation of a street light standard to make way for the curb and gutter along the street.

## Junior Woman's Club Holds Final Session Of Club Year Tues.

The Ozona Junior Woman's Club will hold its final session of the present club year next Tuesday afternoon at the High School building. The meeting is listed in the club year book for May 1, but this was an error, according to the president, Mrs. Clinton Glover.

Reports of officers and committees on the year's work of the club will be heard at this session and new officers elected in January, will be installed in readiness to take up the club program next fall. This meeting marks the close of the first year's work of the Junior Club, organization having been perfected last year under the sponsorship of the senior club.

## 20-Cent Wool And Rain Bring Smiles

### Spirit Of Optimism Rules West In Rising Markets

With 20-cent wool and a rising market, scattered showers over the ranch area and with an excellent promise of bountiful rains before the range begins to suffer from drought, West Texas ranchmen are wearing a broad smile of satisfaction these days, for the ranch business is beginning to pay off again after being all too long on the other side of the ledger.

Wool sales of 20 cents and better have been common the last few days and even better prices are seen as a possible outgrowth of inflationary moves and exhausted mill stocks.

Crockett County ranchmen are in the midst of the shearing season, with truck after truck, loaded with the 1933 clip leaving out for warehouses to be sold on the bullish market. Soon the jingle of silver may be heard again in the ranch area as the new clip is sold.

## Movement Started Here For Marking Spots Of Historical Interest In Texas Gains State-Wide Interest

A movement for marking spots of historical interest along the principal highways of Texas, which had its inception in Ozona, is rapidly gaining momentum throughout the state and promises soon to become a state-wide movement.

Rev. J. H. Meredith, father of the plan and head of a highway marking committee named by the Ozona Lions Club, has been named highway marking "Commissioner" representing the Texas Society, Sons of the American Revolution, and has the active backing of that organization in the work.

Efforts are now being made to secure the co-operation and interest of the Texas Chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution, the Texas Historical Society and other organizations in fostering a state-wide plan to mark all points of historical interest in the state along state highways.

## COUNTY LETS CONTRACT FOR STREET WORK

### Paving From Curb To Curb Along Highways Provided

#### NO. 27 IS DELAYED

### Error In Bid Causes Hitch In Contract For Broadway

Paving of Powell Avenue from the north edge of town to its intersection with Broadway, the Old Spanish Trail, from curb to curb was provided in a contract awarded by the County Commissioners Court in session here this week to Colglazier & Hoff, Inc., contractors on the first 15-mile section of the Ozona-Barnhart road, Highway 163.

Broadway, the street traversed by Highway 27, the Old Spanish Trail, through town, will also be paved from curb to curb, but the court had not completed the award of contract for this work at the conclusion of the special session yesterday. Cage Brothers Construction Company had been awarded the contract for paving work on this street, but were allowed to withdraw their bid upon the plea that certain phases of the work had been overlooked in their bid.

The street traversed by Highway 163, the main business street of the city, will be paved completely, including caliche base and asphalt surfacing, as provided in state highway contracts. Whether or not the east and west highway and street will be topped with asphalt surfacing has not yet been definitely decided. Present contracts on the state and federal highway do not provide for asphalt surfacing, but state highway officials have promised that efforts will be made to hard-surface the highway through the city out of maintenance funds.

In the event the state surfaces its part through the city, the county will also let contracts for the completed work. In case it is found impossible for the state to hard-surface the stretch of highway through town, the department plans to oil the caliche to prevent dust and keep the road in condition until surfacing contracts can be let. Contracts will be let as soon as possible by the county for caliche course on the street from curb to curb, the surfacing to depend on what action the state highway department takes.

Curb and gutters have been completed on the north street along the highway and the work is almost completed along Highway 27 through the city. This work was contracted by the county, materials to be furnished by the county.

Crockett County ranchmen now engaged in shearing are urged to select their choice fleeces for entry in the annual wool show to be held in connection with the seventh annual Crockett County Rodeo, Race Meet and Stock Show to be held here July 3, 4 and 5.

The wool show is an outstanding feature of the annual July celebration here and many entries have been received every year in this department. Ribbons are offered winners in both the twelve-months and eight-months fleece classes.

Every governmental official or board that handles public money should publish at regular intervals an accounting of it, showing where and how each dollar is spent. This is a fundamental principle of democratic government.

WILL MAN SURVIVE?

John H. Ruckman in an article in the Household Magazine for March 1, 1933, said: "Is it true that man is the only animal which starves to death because there is too much food? Can it be that human beings will freeze this winter because there are too many coal mines, and too many miners' and that women and children are shelterless because there is an 'over-production' of lumber, cement, and brick? No sane being can for a moment accept such reasoning."

Yet it makes one stop and wonder. Through research it has been proved that it is the unsocial animals that have become extinct. Those which failed to co-operate are the ones that have died out.

Today we have America, which is supposed to be made up of intelligent beings. Yet these people, with all their intelligence and superiority over lower animals, continue to be selfish and look out only for self. We are individualistic. We are running over with prejudices. We continue unfair policies toward other nations.

Will man, the higher animal, by following in the footsteps of the unsocial animals, receive a like fate?

LITERATURE FOR THE BLIND

Although people are constantly reminded that they should consider themselves privileged when they have normal health, they seldom realize the actual benefits and opportunities that are open to them. The reading public has always taken literature for granted. Perhaps, some years ago there was a rather meager output of good literature, but in such case there is always something else to read that one has failed to read for some reason or other. The blind are not so fortunate in having all types of literature accessible.

The American Braille Press, however, has done much for the blind in the past ten years. According to William Nelson Cromwell, president and founder of the organization, the American Braille Press has produced approximately 50,000,000 pages of braille literature that has been published and distributed in more than forty countries. Three monthly braille magazines in English are also published in French, Italian, Polish, Roumanian, Serbian, Spanish and Flemish. The magazines and music are sent directly to individuals, but the books are sent chiefly to libraries, schools and other institutions for the blind. The United States Post-office Department, by not charging postage for braille literature, has made it possible for a great number of blind persons to have the advantages of this service.

Although the blind are handicapped in that they can not read all the newest books as rapidly as they come out, they do have the assurance that whatever books are selected to be made in the braille are worthy of being read. The American Braille Press has done a great service for the blind.
