

THE UTILITY AS A MERCHANDISER

Movements are again on foot in a sizable number of states for legislation preventing utility companies from selling gas and electric appliances.

The principal arguments behind such efforts are that the small local store is unable to meet the competition of the large utilities, and that if the utility is forbidden merchandising, the business will all go to the local dealer




