200 EXPECTED HERE FOR PTA DIST. MEETING

"Safeguarding Childhood" Is Theme Of Conference

MEET IN SPRING

Representatives From 24 Counties To Be Present

Between 150 and 200 visitors are expected to be in Ozona for the annual Sixth District Conference of the Texas Congress of Parents and Teachers to be held here the last of March or early April, the dates to be determined later by state officials. Plans for the meeting were formulated tentatively at an executive committee meeting last Friday in San Angelo.

Mrs. Albert Kay of Ozona, fourth vice president of the district, attended the executive committee meeting, going over plans for the spring convocation here and getting details for use of the local Parent-Teacher Association in entertaining the visitors.

"Safeguarding Childhood Through This Crisis" has been chosen as the theme for the meeting here. A better understanding of Parent-Teacher work as an educational movement being the prime objective, the principal addresses will be devoted to some phase of parent education and related subjects the committee decided. The tentative program plans also call for conferences, classes, open forum and a question box to be conducted by state leaders.

Dist. Pres. Coming Feb. 20

A registration fee of 50 cents for each delegate will be charged upon registration at the conference, it was decided. This will assist the hostess city in entertaining the visitors and to help pay expenses of speakers.

Deep Well Tests At 7,735 Feet

Swabbing Under Way On Todd Well In Hard Lime

Swabbing was under way yesterday for a second test of the Stanolind Oil and Gas Company and others No. 1 Todd deep well on the J. S. Todd ranch in Crockett County at a total depth of 7,735 feet, reports here indicated.

Drillers at the well reported here yesterday afternoon that the hole would probably be unloaded by sometime today and the well tested for production at that depth.

Drill pipe was pulled from the well Monday at 7,735 feet in lime, reported extremely hard formation. The hole was previously tested at 7,357 feet with no show of oil or gas.

Stanolind and others' No. 2 Todd, on the same unit block, was down to 235 feet where it was fishing for a bit early in the week.

Continental Oil Company's No. A-1-26, which came in a producer last week at a total depth of 1,548 feet, pumped 126 barrels in 24 hours early this week on a test. Additional storage is being erected.

Continental's No. A-1-23 apparently missed the pay from which No. A-1-26 is producing, drilling the first of the week below the production level. Contract is 2,000 feet or less.

R. C. Chambers and others No. 1 Hoover, on the A. C. Hoover ranch in this county, was shot with 60 quarts last Friday night but reports were not available here as to what results were obtained after the well was cased out.

Joe Pierce Buys 8 Hereford Bulls

Fine Registered Animals Bought At Auction In Denver

Eight fine one and two-year-old registered Hereford bulls from some of the finest herds in the northwestern and middle western states were purchased from the auction ring at the Western Stock Show in Denver, Colo., last week by Mr. and Mrs. Joe Pierce of Ozona. The animals were unloaded at Barnhart yesterday and taken to Mr. Pierce's upper ranch, between here and Barnhart, to be added to his herd of fine registered Hereford cattle.

Mr. and Mrs. Pierce reported selling brisk in the Denver auction. Prices advanced each day of the sale, they said, animals selling at from \$25 to \$50 a head higher the day after the sale close than they were quoted during the sale. Price averages were good throughout the sale, they declared.

Two of the eight bulls brought back to be added to the Crockett County registered herd on the Pierce ranch were bought by Mrs. Pierce. One was from the Tausig ranch at Parshall, Colo. This animal won second place in his class at the Denver registered Hereford show. The other was from the Jenny Wren Company herd at Lawrence, Kans.

Two of the bulls were from the Foster Farms at Rexford, Kans., and one each from the Wyoming Hereford Ranch at Cheyenne, Wyo., the Hazlett Herd of Eldorado, Kans., the J. S. Miller Ranch of Parshall, Colo., and the LaMont Hereford Ranch of Larkspur, Colo.

Mexican Child To Blind Institute

Field Agent For State School Takes Application Here

An eight-year-old Mexican girl, living in the Mexican suburb of Ozona, may be admitted to the Texas State School for the Blind at Austin if her application, taken Tuesday by W. C. Tenney, field agent for the School for the Blind, who was here in the interest of caring for the blind child, is accepted by school officials.

Mr. Tenney goes all over the state investigating conditions of blind children with a view to gaining entrance for them in the state school. Few persons here knew of the Mexican child's plight until the agent's arrival. Her application was taken by Mr. Tenney and the case will be investigated by officials of the school to determine whether or not she should be admitted.

Ozona High School To Be Represented In Play Tournament

A group of students interested in dramatic art will represent Ozona High School in the interscholastic League one-act play tournament to be held sometime this spring, it was announced this week by Supt. John L. Bishop. Work has already been started in the school looking toward entering this competition and the play will be selected in the next few weeks.

Schools have their choice of a list of approved plays, farce comedies being the only type play that is barred. Mrs. A. W. Jones, teacher of dramatic art and expression, will direct the play upon which the Ozona High team will rely in district competition.

The district one-act play tournament will be held in Ballinger in the spring. The exact date of the tournament has not been announced, but it is understood that the meet will be held earlier than the district interscholastic League meet in San Angelo in April.

Lions Compete In 2 More Tourneys

Go To McCamey Meet This Week-End And Big Lake Next

The Ozona High School basketball squad will again enter in tournament competition with teams from this section of the state in meets both this week-end and the next.

Friday and Saturday of this week the Lions will go to McCamey, where they will step into fast company in the annual Trans-Pecos Invitational Basketball Tournament in the McCamey High School gymnasium. Twelve teams have already entered this tourney with several others expected to enter the competition. Trophies and prizes valued at more than \$100 are offered winners in the meet.

Teams that have so far accepted invitations to the McCamey tournament include Rankin, Big Spring, Big Lake, Iraan, Fort Stockton, Odessa, Crane, Barnhart, Ozona, Sherwood, Sanderson and Toyab, and the McCamey Badgers will be in there fighting to keep some of the bacon at home. San Angelo, Alpine and Christoval are also expected to enter. Big Spring, Big Lake and McCamey are reported favorites to win the tourney.

The following Friday and Saturday, February 3 and 4, the locals will go to Big Lake where they will enter the annual tournament there. Big Lake took first honors in the local tournament week before last, with the Lions as runners-up. Coach Ted White's charges are pointing for the Owls and hope to run them a better race on their own roost.

Tuesday Last Day For Tax Payments

Taxes, Auto Registrations Coming In Slowly Here

Next Tuesday, January 31, is the last day for payment of property and poll taxes and for registration of automobiles and trucks without penalty. After the last day of January, a penalty of 10 per cent applies on property taxes, interest charges to be applicable after April.

Property taxes and auto registrations are unusually slow this year, according to reports from Tom Casbeer, county treasurer and deputy collector under Sheriff W. S. Willis. Only about 30 per cent of property taxes payable here have been collected up to date, Mr. Casbeer reported, and automobile registrations are far under the same date last year. A total of 190 passenger cars and 65 commercial vehicles had been registered up to this morning.

STREET WORK RELEASES \$45 DAILY HERE

Average 20 Men a Day Get Employment From RFC Funds

GRAVEL STREETS

Grading, Drainage Of Muddy Stretches Being Attempted

An average of approximately \$45 a day is being released in Ozona and an average of 20 men daily are finding employment in street graving work being done with the January and February allotment of funds from the Reconstruction Finance Corporation.

A committee named by the Ozona Lions Club, which organization is handling administration of the R.F.C. funds here, is in charge of the street work, designating what in the committee's opinions are the streets most in need of attention and directing the work of surfacing them.

Crews were put to work Friday and have been working all this week on the north and south street two blocks west of Powell Avenue, a street which is expected to be in use as a detour when construction work starts on the paving of Powell Avenue as an extension of the Ozona-Barnhart highway.

The total allotment for January and February for unemployment relief here was \$1700. It is the plan of the committee to stretch this amount over the period from now until March 1 and to get as many of the muddest streets of the town surfaced as possible with the available funds.

Payment for labor on the street work is being made with vouchers good in payment for dry goods, groceries, drugs and other necessities at local stores. Merchants may cash the vouchers at the office of the county clerk.

The Ozona Parent-Teacher Association held its monthly meeting January 16, at 7:30 o'clock in the high school auditorium. This meeting was scheduled in the evening so that the fathers might attend. A large crowd was present. Mrs. Ira Carson, president, gave a welcome address. She pledged the support of the association for every school activity and urged continued interest of the fathers and mothers in the educational work of the community. L. G. Rape, in his address, by concrete examples showed parents the need of child employment in the home and elsewhere, for which the child should be given compensation. He further urged that children receive instructions concerning the financial duties in the home and thereby impose upon the family budget. Cash, taken from an allowance should relieve the parents of the duty of "charge it, please."

C. S. Denham, in a discussion of modern methods of high school education, emphasized the seven objectives of education—Health, command of the fundamental processes, worthy home membership, vocation, citizenship, worthy use of leisure time, and ethical character. He stated that the knowledge aim no longer dominates instruction. The newer type of course of study used in the modern high school lays stress on the child to be taught. Viewed from the angle of child welfare the school becomes a new institution.
