10 TOWNS IN OZONA TRACK EVENTS SAT.

2nd Annual Meet To Be Staged At Fair Grounds Here

STARTS AT 10 A. M.

Preliminaries To Be Run In Morning; Finals In Afternoon

The second annual invitation and field meet, sponsored by the Athletic Department of the Ozona High School, will be held here next Saturday at the fair grounds park. It was announced by Ted M. White, athletic coach.

Towns are expected to participate in the events, invitations having been sent to teams at Sherwood, Mertzon, Barnhart, Big Lake, Iraan, Rocksprings, Junction, Eldorado and Sonora. The local meet will be in the nature of a work-out in preparation for the district meet in San Angelo in April and a good representation is expected here from the neighboring towns.

The meet will get under way at 10 o'clock Saturday morning with the running off of preliminary events. Finals will start at 1:30 Saturday afternoon. Coach White announced. The meet will be divided into Junior and Senior sections. Senior events slated for the day include the 120-yard high hurdles, 100-yard dash, 880-yard run, 440-yard dash, 220-yard low hurdles, mile run, 220-yard dash, mile relay, pole vault, shot put, discus throw, high jump and broad jump.

The junior events include high jump, broad jump, 50-yard dash, 100-yard dash, 440-yard relay and pull-up. Ribbons will be awarded winners of first, second, third and fourth places in each event. To defray expenses of the meet, an admission charge of 10 and 25 cents will be made for entrance for the afternoon events. No admission charge will be made for the preliminaries Saturday morning.

Coach White's track squad gave a good account of itself at the invitation meet in Big Lake last week-end, taking a close third place, with Big Lake far out into the lead and McCamey in second place only one point ahead of Ozona.

One Shot, Another Is Cut In Affray

Mexican Gets Bullet In Mouth; Other Is Held For Assault

One Mexican received a bullet in the mouth which dislodged a number of teeth and shattered the lower jaw bone, and another in his arm, while another Mexican was badly cut on right forearm with a knife and faces a charge of assault with intent to murder in justice court as a result of an affray in the Mexican section of the town Tuesday night.

Pedro Serda was struck by two bullets from a gun in the hands of Cipriano Salinas after the latter had been slashed with a knife by Serda, according to testimony at the preliminary hearing for Salinas in Justice Bryan McDonald's court Wednesday morning. Serda underwent an operation at the office of Dr. F. T. McIntire to repair damage done by the bullet which crashed into his lower jaw and another which shattered his arm.

Salinas' part in the affray came about as a result of his attempt at acting peace-maker in a fight between Serda and a Mexican woman, he told the court. According to his version, Serda went to a house where Salinas and the other Mexican were and Serda and the latter became embroiled in a fight. Salinas stopped the fight and Serda left, returning in fifteen minutes, he declared. Upon his return, Serda called Salinas out of the house and attacked the latter with a knife, which he had concealed in a handkerchief wrapped around his hand. Salinas said. Salinas drew his pistol and started firing, he said, shooting four times. The Mexican declared he "kept shooting until Serda stopped coming toward me."

Salinas was released under \$250 bond. No charges had been filed yesterday against Serda.

Road Paving Reaches City

Sewer Pipes Laid In Preparation For Surfacing Here

Road construction work on highways into Ozona had reached the edge of the city on the north the first of this week and is less than a mile out on the road to the east.

The Colglazier and Hoff Construction Co., contractors on the first fifteen-mile stretch of the Barnhart road out of Ozona, were preparing to apply caliche to the road bed to the edge of the town section on the north this week and expect to do some work on the street before the end of the week.

In preparation for the paving of Powell Avenue from the north edge of town to its intersection with Highway 27 at the Flowers Grocery corner, the county had more than 50 men at work all day Monday laying sewer connections from the main in the middle of that street to the property lines to avoid tearing up the pavement at some future date. Over 200 feet of sewer tile to make seven connections were laid during the day by the big crew. The crew was mustered from among those employed in street graveling work being done with R.F.C. funds and from a crew employed by the Ozona Water Works in laying a larger main along that street. The work had to be completed Monday, making it necessary to get every available man to work on the project.

Every governmental official or board that handles public money should publish at regular intervals an accounting of it, showing where and how each dollar is spent. This is a fundamental principle of democratic government.

EATING US ALIVE

The publisher of the Chicago Tribune recently made an address over the radio carrying the vivid title of "Tax Eaters, Tax Eating and Tax Eaten."

The first, of course, consists of government officials, the second of government and its activities—and the third, of the poor taxpayers. The suggestion is not so far-fetched as it may seem. We're reaching a point where the tax eaters are about to swallow everything we've got.

Keep that title in mind when you meditate upon government. It describes a situation which you, as a voter and a taxpayer, have allowed to develop—and which you must do your part in putting an end to, unless you and all your possessions are to be entirely digested by the bureaucrat.

AN INTEREST IN BOOKS

It is a familiar statement which says that there is never anything quite so bad that it does not have a bit of good in it. Thus, though many people undoubtedly think the depression is all wrong, there are a few points for the other view. A survey has been taken of libraries in Chicago recently which reveals the fact that libraries, especially rental libraries, have not noticed a slack in business. There has been an increase in the number of rental libraries, until at present they can be found in all the neighborhood stores, gift shops, and a few grocery stores. The enormous increase in rental library service is partly accounted for by the fact that the Chicago Public Library has not bought any new books for distribution since 1931.

It is interesting to note that American people are taking more interest in books. The 1920's were so full of gala affairs that the normal person usually omitted reading. The survey also reveals that the choice of books tends to be those of a serious, reflective nature. The latest novels seem to be the most popular, but books of biography, mystery stories, adventure and travel do not run far behind. The libraries report that they have many energetic readers who come to the library two and three times a week for more material.

Thus, if the "depression" does create a more serious people who can spend a few hours in peace by their own firesides it would certainly perform one good deed, especially if the readers follow Sir Francis Bacon's famous hint: "Some books are to be tasted, others to be swallowed, and some few to be chewed and digested."

school system, constitute the major items in an economy program intended to extend beyond the period of the present emergency.

Public school reorganization is provided in Senate bill No. 387, reported favorably to the Senate. Its principal feature is that it makes the county the unit for administrative purposes. Existing districts will continue to function so far as taxes, bond issues, etc., are concerned. Administration of schools would be vested in a county board of seven trustees, elected by popular vote for terms of six years, and a county superintendent, elected by the trustees.

This county board would exercise the functions now required of district trustees. District school taxes would continue to be levied, collected and expended, as at present. Bond issues would remain as obligations of the districts. There would be no pooling of finances or of outstanding bond issues.

Essentially the measure is one for county unit administration and is intended to co-ordinate and reduce the cost of supervision and administration of the public schools. At present there are approximately 7800 school districts in Texas, with 28,000 trustees, employing 46,000 teachers and expending \$80,000,000 of the taxpayers' money.

That there is unavoidable waste in a business of such magnitude that is as loosely organized as the public school system of Texas can not be doubted. Savings as a result of co-ordinated administration would be considerable. It is claimed that salaries of teachers could be increased and better schools would result from the adoption of this bill. Most of the saving would accrue from elimination of much needless cost of supervision as a result of the duplication of staffs in the vast majority of the 7800 school districts. The measure contemplates a greater portion of school funds shall go into the actual business

of teaching and less of it to non-teaching attaches and employees.

In addition, the change would provide for more uniform school privileges for all children in the State.

Analyses of school finances, together with the machinery of administration, furnish convincing evidence that what Texas needs is wise expenditure of money already available rather than an increase in financial support. Texas ranks well among states of the union in support of schools and value of property. Based on income Texas is almost exactly where she should be in these respects, being ninth in earnings, ninth in school expenditures and eighth in school property value. Yet, in attendance, teachers' salaries, literacy and other standards of measurement she ranks from 35th to 42nd among the States of the Union.

Romantic History Of County Traced

Crockett County was the subject of the discussion for the Ozona Junior Woman's Club, March 23, which was held in the High School auditorium.

Mrs. Alvin Harrell was leader. Misses Norene Allison and Patti Raiza gave a piano duet.

C. S. Denham gave a most interesting and well developed discussion on "The Romantic History of Crockett County." The past summer, Mr. Denham completed a thesis for a Master's Degree at Texas Technological College on "Social and Economic Development in Crockett County" and was able to give first hand information on the points of his talk.

By the use of a map placed on an electric slide, he discussed the topography of Crockett County and located various land marks on it. He also exhibited a picture of Fort Lancaster which was taken just before its evacuation, which was secured from the U. S. War Department. Then, by specific sources the development and settlement of the county was traced.

Early social events in the county gave an amusing touch in the form of pranks, serenades, stage coach service and newspapers of the pioneer day in Crockett County.

Mr. Denham's discussion gave evidence of the fact that the laying of the corner stones of Crockett County was a good task that incurred many hardships and dangers. He paid special tribute to Judge Charles E. Davidson, W.
