## Program Of Music, Songs, Dancing And Speaking Arranged For Roosevelt Birthday Celebration Here Tuesday

An entertainment program consisting of music, including chorus and vocal solo numbers and instrumental music, interpretive, clog and tap dancing numbers and an address on a topic of timely interest will be presented at the High School Auditorium Tuesday evening of next week.

The occasion is the 52nd birthday of President Franklin D. Roosevelt, January 30, when cities and towns all over the nation will stage balls and other entertainments, the proceeds from which are to be turned over to the President for an endowment for the Warm Springs (Ga.) Foundation as a national center for the development of methods of treatment of infantile paralysis.

The speaker for the evening will be E. E. (Pat) Murphy, well known San Angelo attorney and a candidate for Congressman from this district at the last election. ## Student Grades Above Average

### Lowest Percentage Of Failures In Years At Mid-Term

The lowest percentage of failures was recorded in the Ozona High School at the close of the mid-term examinations last week, according to a check-up made this week by John L. Bishop, superintendent. The percentage of failures also set a record in the grade school, the check-up showed.

Out of a total of 403 grades given, there were only three failures, or a percentage of only .75 of one per cent. No failures were recorded among the freshmen, junior and senior classes.

In the junior high the percentage of failures was only 2.5, out of a total of 1143 grades given. The average or normal percentage of failures in both the high and grade schools is around 7 per cent, Mr. Bishop said.

Not only was the percentage of actual failures low, but the average of all grades was unusually high, indicating more interest on the part of students and better results in school work. This type of work being done in the local school accounts for the fact that Ozona High School students who were freshmen at the University of Texas last year placed the local school in third place for the entire state in the relative standing of quantity and quality of work done by the freshmen groups from the various high schools of the state.

## Barton Retires From Hdwe. Firm

### Interest Sold To Findlatters; Wilkinson New Manager

Announcement is made this week of the sale by W. D. Barton of his interest in the Ozona Hardware Company of this city to his partners in the business, John and J. Mart Findlatter of San Angelo.

The Ozona Hardware was established a little over seven years ago with Mr. Barton in the post of manager, the Findlatters, operators of the Findlatter Hardware Co. of San Angelo, being interested in the business.

Mr. Barton, assisted by his son, John Barton, has operated the business successfully this seven years, but failing health has forced him to retire from its active management and the deal was completed last week for the purchase of his interest in the business by his partners.

M. Wilkinson, who was formerly employed by the Findlatter company in San Angelo, and later with the Lowe Hardware Co. of Rankin, will continue the operation of the local store as manager for the Findlatters. Mr. Wilkinson is already here getting a line-up on the stock and needs of the firm preparatory to taking over the store on February 1. Mrs. Wilkinson is here with her husband to make their home here.

## Schools Purchase Baggett Residence

### Home To Be Made Into Teacherage In 1935; To Close Street

The Crockett County school board has purchased on behalf of the schools the J. M. Baggett residence just east of the high and grade school buildings, it was learned here this week. The deal was closed a few days ago whereby the schools acquired the home and lot as an extension of the school property.

It is understood that under terms of the sale, Mr. Baggett is to give possession of the property at the end of the 1935 school year. The home will be used for a teacher's home, it is learned.

The board plans to close the short street crossing the school grounds between the two buildings and to connect the campus of the two schools with a continuous curb. Construction of a high wire fence along the front street edge of the campus as a safety measure is understood to be another goal of the board in the school campus development program.

## Child Suffers Unusual Injury

### Fracture Inside Knee Joint To Necessitate Operation

Word was received by relatives at 10 o'clock this morning that an operation had just been completed to repair the broken bone in the knee joint of Betty Grimmer, suffered last week in a fall from her bicycle here. The operating surgeon declared the condition of the injured joint much worse than he had anticipated but is confident that it will heal without difficulty. The operation was performed at the Carrell-Driver-Girard Clinic in Dallas.

Betty Grimmer, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. J. Grimmer is in Dallas for an operation, which will probably be performed today, to repair a broken piece of bone in the knee joint. The injury was suffered last Thursday when she fell from her bicycle. Mr. and Mrs. Grimmer are with her.

The fracture was one of the most unusual in medical history, according to local physicians. The knuckle on one of the bones inside the knee joint was chipped off in some manner, the broken piece lying loose in the joint. Medical books contained no record of such an unusual fracture and a bone specialist in Dallas, who will perform the operation, declared that he had never seen one similar to it.

It will be necessary to open the knee joint and peg the broken sliver in place so that it will heal without impairing free action of the joint.

## 21 Teams Invited To Basket Tourney

### 100 Visitors Expected For Two-Day Meet Feb. 9 and 10

Invitations have been sent out to twenty-one schools in this area to send their basketball teams to Ozona to participate in the third annual invitation basketball tournament to be staged in the High School gymnasium here Friday and Saturday, February 9 and 10. It was announced this week by school officials.

It is expected that 100 or more visitors will flock to Ozona for the two-day meet. Two silver loving cups are being offered by the local athletic department to winners in the tourney and some stiff competition is expected to be entered in the events.

Coach Ted White's basketball crew has failed to hit its stride so far this season, as the results of a series of games over the week end will attest. The locals were able to take Mertzon Friday evening by a comfortable margin but in successive encounters Saturday afternoon with Comstock, Eldorado and the Eldorado second stringers, they were counted out. The girls were more successful however, beating the Eldorado lassies by a lop-sided score and taking the Comstock girls by a comfortable margin.

**Basketball Plenty**  
In the Friday and Saturday series, the town girls dropped one to the high school girls, and an independent crew from Mertzon tackled the Ozona High School faculty and were soundly beaten by the teachers. Comstock boys beat the Barnhart boys in a match Saturday afternoon. Visitors from Eldorado proved themselves two points superior to local talent in three successive games, the Eldorado second string beating the local second stringers by two points, the first string trouncing the locals by a like margin and the Eldorado faculty trimming the Ozona faculty, again by that two point margin.

The locals will play in a tournament at McCamey this week-end.

## CO. OFFICIALS ANNOUNCE FOR RE-ELECTION

### Sheriff, Clerk And Treasurer Seek Another Term

### NO CONTESTS YET

### Political Horizon Still Offers No Cloud For "Ins"

County politics got under way for the 1934 imbroglio here this week when three incumbents of county offices announced their candidacy for re-election, subject to action of the Democratic primaries next summer.

Sheriff W. S. Willis authorized The Stockman to announce his candidacy for re-election to another term as sheriff and tax collector of Crockett County. Mr. Willis is now serving his third term in the sheriff's office. He was unopposed for the office two years ago.

An honest and diligent administration of the duties of his office is promised by Sheriff Willis if the voters again see fit to place him in office. The duties of his office will be expanded during the coming term by the addition of the tax assessor's function, a recent constitutional amendment combining the offices.

"I am grateful for the privilege of serving the people of Crockett County and I will appreciate the vote and support of all in the coming election," Mr. Willis said.

### Russell Is Candidate

George Russell, county and district clerk, announced his candidacy for a fourth term in that office, subject to action of the Democratic primaries.

A thorough knowledge of the many duties of the clerk's office, based on several years experience as deputy under Tom Nolen before ascending to the office himself, and a record of faithful and competent service the past six years are facts upon which Mr. Russell is basing his candidacy for another term in the clerk's office. A continuation of the policies of fair dealing, faithful service, accurate and neat recording of all county records and strict attention to duty is promised by Mr. Russell if elected to the office again this year.

### Casbeer a Veteran

The third incumbent to announce for re-election is Tom Casbeer, county treasurer. Mr. Casbeer is the second oldest county official, in point of service, in Crockett County. County Judge Charles E. Davidson being the only other official who has a longer record of service.

Mr. Casbeer is now completing his fourteenth consecutive term as Crockett County treasurer, twenty eight years of continuous public service. In the more than a quarter century of biennial vote chasing, the veteran treasurer has faced only four opponents for the position he holds.

Mr. Casbeer expressed his appreciation for the support given him in past years and the confidence placed in him as evidenced by the successive elections that have placed him in the treasurer's office for more than a quarter century.

Just in case those future historians neglect their duty, we hasten to seize the opportunity here and now to cast a few bouquets and laurel wreaths at the fellow who is too busy to know or care about praise, who is only hoping he can scheme a way to make ends meet, while he devotes forty and twice forty hours a week to the process.

SMALL TOWNS

A Washington correspondent calls attention to the problem of making the NRA fit small businesses without causing them to blow up and fade out. In a moment of impatience, General Hugh S. Johnson, industrial administrator, is quoted as saying that an employer who can't pay \$14 to \$15 per week and maintain hours prescribed by the code, is too un-economic and inefficient to keep in the industrial picture. In handling his big task, however, General Johnson should remember that all over this broad land are comparatively small towns, kept alive by comparatively small businesses. The trade volume does not make possible large overhead, nor are the expenses of an employe

so great as those of one in a large center. An employe in a rural community earns less and an employe requires less. The small town serves the convenience of a considerable area, and its perpetuation, with its small institutions as little impaired as possible, will be a source of material aid to future farm values. The small town has had a vital part in pushing back the frontier, in developing the country, and in preserving the best in civilization, and the machinery of recovery should be handled in a way to save its business

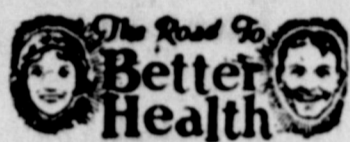

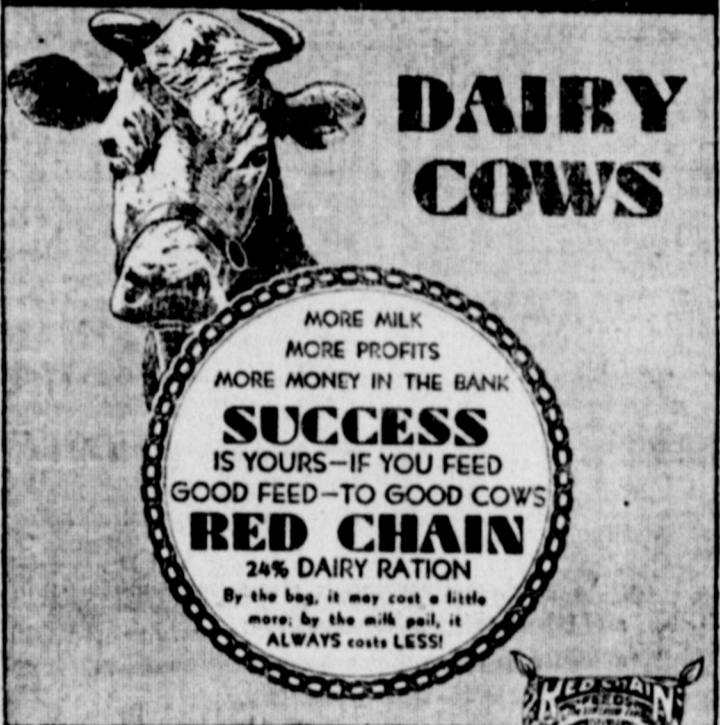

CAUSES OF HEADACHES

One of the most common of human pains is headache. Like other pains, it is one of nature's methods of calling attention to the fact that something is wrong. It is a symptom that may arise from any one or more of several causes.

Sometimes the conditions under which headache occurs give a hint as to the possible cause. For example, the attack may come on after using the eyes in close work. In that case there is probably some disorder of the eyes which is causing eye-strain. Properly fitted glasses, and care to avoid abusing the eyes, would then be the remedy. Or, the headache may occur when one is fatigued, either in mind or body. Sufficient rest would then be the remedy. And prevention would consist in avoid-

ing physical and mental activity to the extent of fatigue.

Poisons in System

The presence of various poisons in the system may cause headache. These poisons may be introduced into the system from without. Alcohol, tobacco and lead are examples. Or, the poisoning may result from failure of the system to properly eliminate waste products. This type of poisoning is likely to occur in disease of the kidneys and in constipation.

The complete list of diseases which may cause headache is a long one. Bright's disease, arteriosclerosis, pelvic disorders, digestive disorders, anemia, functional and organic nervous disturbances,

fevers and various infections, and diseases of the ear, nose and throat are among the possible causes.

To find the cause in any individual case is not always an easy matter. But this is the first step in seeking a permanent cure. A careful physician examination may reveal the underlying disease or disorder. If no such disease or disorder is discovered, a careful investigation of the habits may reveal the cause.

The point is that anyone who is subject to frequent headaches should not be satisfied to obtain mere temporary relief by taking some pain-killing drug. The cause should be carefully

searched for, and removed whenever this is possible.

### 11 Deaths Result Every Day In Texas From Tuberculosis

AUSTIN, TEX., Jan. 24—Dr. John W. Brown, State Health Officer, stated that slightly more than eleven Texans die each day from tuberculosis. In other words, over four thousand persons died of this disease last year.

In these days of economic stress when the seeds of disease are being sown in the bodies of undernourished children, the prevention of tuberculosis is more necessary than ever. Tuberculosis formerly held first place as a cause of death; it now ranks third in Texas, while for the country as a whole it ranks seventh. Pneumonia was the only communicable disease that caused more deaths last year than did tuberculosis.

Tuberculosis has been known for centuries and constant search for a specific cure has been the goal of doctors for many years. However, no medicine, yet discovered, will cure this disease. The treatment consists of rest, proper food, fresh air, and proper medical supervision.

The greatest loss of life from this disease is between the ages of 20 to 40 years, and its economic cost to families and the State is enormous. Tuberculosis can be arrested if found in its early stages, therefore, the State Department of Health urges that every one not feeling up to par should go to the family physician for a complete physical examination. In this way early beginnings of tuberculosis or other disease may be discovered in their early curable stage.

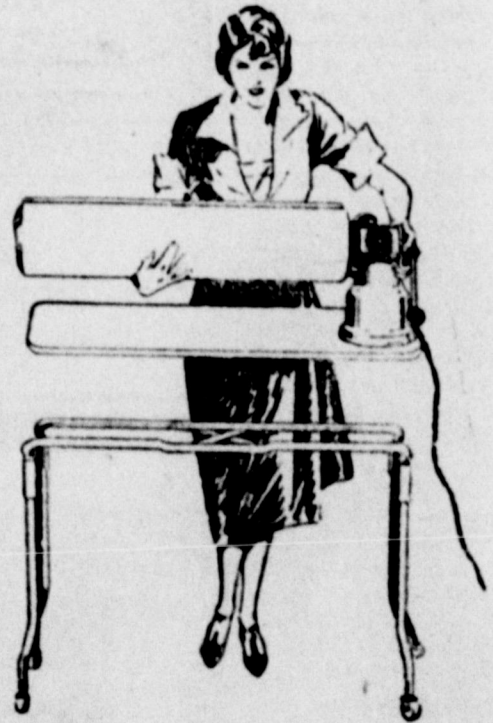

HOUSEHOLD HINTS

**Keep Coffee Hot and Save Extra Work**  
In homes where there are late sleepers it is a nuisance to keep coffee hot. A Thermos bottle can be used by pouring the coffee into it before the late member may help himself.

Method: Clean and prepare shrimps. Clean and prepare mushrooms. Make a white sauce using as proportions 1 heaping table-

spoon of butter, 1 heaping tablespoon of flour, 1 pint (2 cups of milk), Seasoning. Melt butter, add flour and seasoning. Mix well.  
Add the milk slowly and stir constantly until it thickens. Then add shrimps and mushrooms. By making this in a double boiler this can be made ahead of time and kept warm in double boiler. Canned shrimps and mushrooms can be used. Serve in heart-shaped cases.

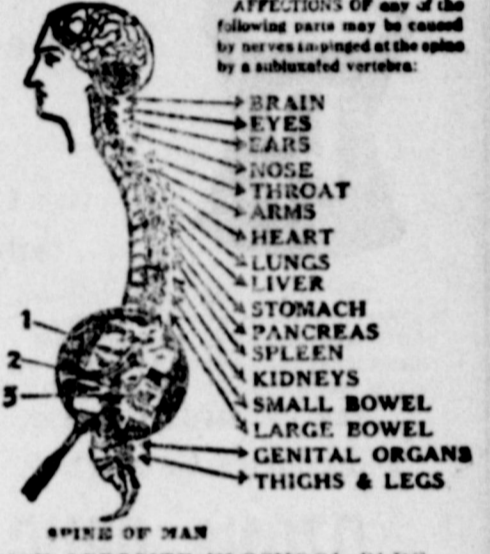
