

He's the fellow who has to dig up the newer and higher wage scale cash, so that the pay envelopes will still be available on Saturday night. He's the man who must answer "I will" to the president, and, in order to get that precious eagle emblem think and work and worry as never before.

In some future day when, we all hope, historians will look back upon the summer of 1933 and record it as the period of a new emanci pation of the American people: when they will tell the story of a nation united to destroy dat of debbil Depression; when they will write of a leadership that was courageous and confident and determined, at that future day we hope the Presentts and Gibbonees of the era will find time for at least a paragraph about the usually unsung, unhonored and unwept hero of it all-the boss. Just in case those future historians nerlect their duty, we hastes to seiz the opportunity here and now to cast a few bouquets and lourd wreaths at the fellow who is too bursy to know or care about praise, who is only hoping he can scheme a way to make ends meet, while he devotes forty and twice forty hours a week to the process. -Chronicle, Toledo, Ia.





11 Deaths Result Every Day In Texas From Tuberculosis

AUSTIN, TEX., Jan. 24-Dr. John W. Brown, State Health Officer, stated that slightly more than eleven Texans die each day from tuberculosis. In other words, over four thousand persons died of this disease last year.

In these days of economic stress when the seeds of disease are being sown in the bodies of undernourished children, the prevention of tuberculosis is more necessary than ever. Tuberculosis formerly held first place as a cause of death; it now ranks third in Texas, while for the country as a whole it ranks seventh. Pneumonia was the only communicable disease that caused more deaths last year than did tuberculosis.

Tuberculosis has been known for centuries and constant search for a specific cure has been the goal of doctors for many years. However, no medicine, yet discovered, will cure this disease. The treatment consists of rest, proper food, fresh air, and proper medical supervision.

The greatest loss of life from this disease is between the ages of 20 to 40 years, and its economic cost to families and the State is enormous. Tuberculosis can be arrested if found in its early stages, therefore, the State Department of Health urges that every one not feeling up to par should go to the family physician for a complete physical examination. In this way early beginnings of tuberculosis or other disease may be discovered in their early curable stage.
