30.000 Pounds Bring Top Price; Quarter Million Lbs. Sold

Twenty-seven cents a pound as the top price paid for 30,000 nds of choice wool by L. M. urphy, buyer for Eisemann Bros the sealed bid sale conducted pesday by the Sonora Wool and hair Company at Sonora.

Approximately a quarter milen pounds of wool was sold in sale at an average price of 64 cents a pound. The lowest rice accepted was 251/2 cents. The Sonora warehouse still has

pproximately a million pounds of ool remaining on hand and exects more to be added. The pool old in Tuesday's sale included st of the smaller clips, none of he large clips on hand going in he disposal. Three clips were inuded in the lot for which Mury paid the top price of 27 cents Roy E. Aldwell, member of the ales committee of the Sonora ol firm, announced following e sale that it was not likely that nother sealed bid sale would be eld this season. The wool resaining on hand likely will be dissed of in individual deals.

Quail Is Mother To Three Baby Chicks On Jake Young Ranch

A quail who is mothering three baby chicks was the unusual discovery made recently by Jake Young on his ranch east of town. The strange combination was sighted in a pasture near the ranch house, Mr. Young said.

Whether or not the quail hatched the hen eggs herself or took charge of the brood of a hen is not known. There are no other chickens on the ranch the same age as these. Jake said, which would tend to discount the theory that the chicks were stolen from a hen's brood. The quail either hatched the eggs herself or the quail and hen had their nests in close proximity to each other and the quail took charge of the chicks as soon as they were hatched and left with them.

The quail is due for a big surprise, Jake opines, when she attempts to teach her youngsters how to fly and how to yodel the familiar quail call.

State Supervisor Praises Schools

Local H.E. Department Described As Above The Average

The Home Economics department of the Ozona High School was described as "far above the average" in equipment and in accomplishments of its course of study in a report to the State Department of Education made by Miss Slbyl Thomas, vocational home economics supervisor for the state department, who made an inspection of the Ozona school during the last week of the term just closed.

The supervisor's report was received from the department a few days ago by Supt. John L. Bishop. Miss Thomas gave unstinted praise to the operation and equipment of the department and also complimented the operation of the entire school, which she visited and inspected unofficially.

Only three minor recommendaions for the improvement of the H. E. department was made by the supervisor and these have or will be observed at the re-opening of school, Mr. Bishop said. The recommendations had to do with installation of a shelf in a cloak room, a set of envelopes for filing systems and a minor change in the order of teaching of clothing and food topics for next year.


