THE FORGOTTEN LAND

In West Texas there are seventeen counties that comprise the "forgotten land." It is a country that somebody thought would always be valueless. Hence it was deeded to the State University. It is the land known as a barren plains country, a land of cactus, greasewood, the yucca plant and rolling sands.

It was a land where man found life hard where only half a dozen ranchmen lived to the county. It was the land of last romance, that land through which wind the alkali waters of the Pecos. In this forgotten land, cities and towns were unknown. Even late as ten years ago, some of the counties now boasting a population of twenty to thirty thousand people, had a population of two and three hundred. Crane county, with its present population of around five or six thousand people, ten years ago was unorganized as a county and had a total population of less than fifty persons.

Nobody wanted this "forgotten land." The University had no use for it, but by leasing the wide sections of land to local ranchmen, a steady income was provided to the University, and yet, the rancher could lease cheaper than to pay taxes on the property. As originally planned, this system of giving to the University about half the land in the area, worked out very well to all concerned.

Then came a change. Land-hungry people drifted westward. Irrigated farms, and dry farmers invaded this land, where the more timid had feared to tread. They prospered. Broad sections of ranches were cut up into small tracts, and two, three and half a dozen families lived where formerly there was only one. Even the very elements seemed to favor this forgotten land, for the rainfall increased, and the landscape became beautiful in the spring time with a riot of wild flowers, of every hue and color. The former barren plains took on a verdure of green and fatted cows and sheep roamed this land of West Texas.

Counties became organized. Schools were established. It was the pride of these West Texans that their children, even though some times they journeyed far to school, they were provided with a school system equal to the best anywhere.

And then came oil. A mad rush followed. Thousands of people swarmed to this forgotten land, and cities and towns came into being. Wealth, hitherto unthought of came to the land owners. But behind the scene in all this new development, there remained one institution, silent, though with a keen eye of business management. That institution is the State University of Texas. Overnight, their great holdings comprising 2,325 and 3-4th sections of land, scattered about over an area of seventeen counties, became very valuable. No longer did they need lease this land to some friendly ranchman at ten cents an acre. It brought fabulous sums and a steady royalty of one-eighth of all wealth through oil and gas, that was produced.

Andrews, Ward, Crane, Upton, Reagan, Crockett, Pecos and Winkler counties are all producing oil in large quantities and have been for nearly ten years. These counties in this forgotten land make our State University

DO YOUR SHOES FIT?

The condition of the feet may bear an important relationship to one's health and efficiency. In an article in the Illinois Medical Journal, Dr. S. C. Woldenberg says that the foot-sore man, woman, or child either cannot, or is disinclined, to walk or exercise. And we know that a certain amount of exercise is necessary for the promotion and preservation of health.

Most foot troubles have one common cause. Bunions, corns, callouses, over-riding toes, hammer toes and in-growing toe-nails are produced by ill-fitting shoes. Very often these deformities are produced rather early in life—during childhood. The result is that among civilized people it is difficult to find many adults who have normal feet.

Dr. Woldenberg gives an idea of what a properly built shoe should be. Shoes for an adult should be at least one-half inch longer than the distance from the tip of the great toe to the heel. The inner border should be straight from the tip to the ball of the great toe. It is very important that the length of the shoe from the ball of the great toe to the heel should correspond to this length in the foot.

Rounded Toes Best

It may also be added that the toe of the shoe should be rounded, not pointed. Toes should never be crowded together. And the heels should not be so high as to alter the normal balance of the feet and legs, thereby causing faulty posture.

As feet are often deformed during childhood, it is very important that great care be exercised in the selection and fitting of shoes for children.

There is no good reason why a new shoe should be uncomfortable. It will not be if it is built to conform to the shape of the foot and is properly fitted. The painful process known as "breaking in" a new shoe usually means, according to Dr. Woldenberg, that the foot is being broken down.

By wearing only properly built and properly fitted shoes you can avoid most foot troubles. You can cure many of the milder degrees of foot deformities in the same way. Many a soldier got rid of his corns while in the army.

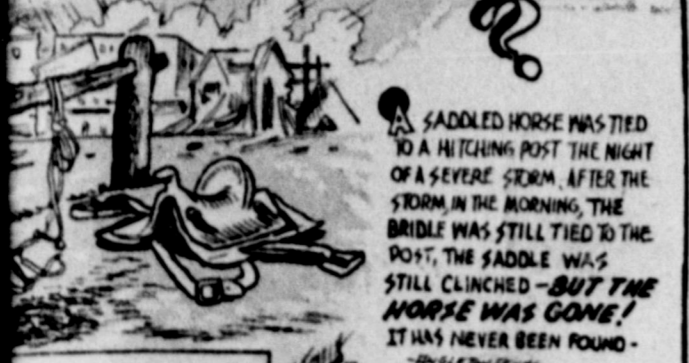

Retail Sales In Texas Increase 57 Percent In March

AUSTIN, Texas, April 25.—An increase of 57 per cent occurred in retail sales during March in 85 Texas establishments representing all parts of the State as compared with March, 1933, and 41 per cent gain was made over February of the current year, according to the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research. Dollar sales for the first three months of the year were 40 per cent above those of the corresponding period last year. The average increase in sales from February to March during the past seven years has been 25 per cent.

"Easter purchasing was done in March this year, whereas last year it came in April, and retail prices have increased in the neighborhood of 20 per cent, thus affecting dollar value of sales," the bureau's report said. "But after allowing for these factors, improvement in retail sales over last year has been substantial.

"Further evidence of improved purchasing power is shown by the fact that in March 37 per cent of outstanding accounts was collected while in March, 1933, 28 per cent was collected."

Summer Round-Up of School Children Sponsored By PTA's

AUSTIN, Texas, April 25.—The first round-up in the history of the State will be started in May when the Parent-Teacher Association of the State will join hands in an annual campaign, known as the Summer Round-Up of Children. This is a movement that has for its purpose to send to the entire grade of school children as free from remedial defects as possible.

Each local Parent-Teacher Association endeavors to have the parents who have children ready to begin school visit their family physician and dentist for the purpose of having a complete physical examination made of the children. They encourage the corrected. It is teaching the

parents the responsibility of having their children prepared physically for school life. At this time parents should have their children immunized against diphtheria and smallpox.

Children grow very rapidly during the first six years of life, and during this rapid growth, physical defects are apt to develop which may cause permanent damage if they are not corrected early. Poor posture in children is very often the result of faulty nutrition. Fatigue may also be a factor, and in some instances there may be actual disease of the bone.

Inability to see or hear well is a serious handicap for the child beginning school. He cannot progress as rapidly as one who sees and hears normally. As a result the child is frequently held back, not because they are mentally slow but because of defects. The Texas State Department of Health

Rattlers Becoming Scarce In W. Texas

The diamond back rattler, most vicious of the rattlesnake species, is fast losing its fight against civilization in this section.

This territory with its vast ranches and remote canyons and hills used to be infested with numerous rattlesnake dens and caves but today most of these canyon crevices are empty and silent.

The greatest factor in decimating these most feared reptiles has been by dynamiting the dens in which they hibernated during the winter months. Many of these caves contained 25 to 50 and in some instances as many as 100 rattlers.

The effective use of guns during the warm months by ranchmen and their employes has been another reason for the decline of this poison-fanged species. H. R. Morrell, local game warden, and one of the best rattlesnake hunters in this section, whose favorite pastime was to sit out in front of a rattlesnake den and shoot them as they came rattling out into the sunshine, reports that he will soon have to look for some other type of amusement.—Brady Standard.

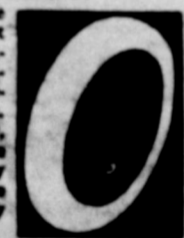

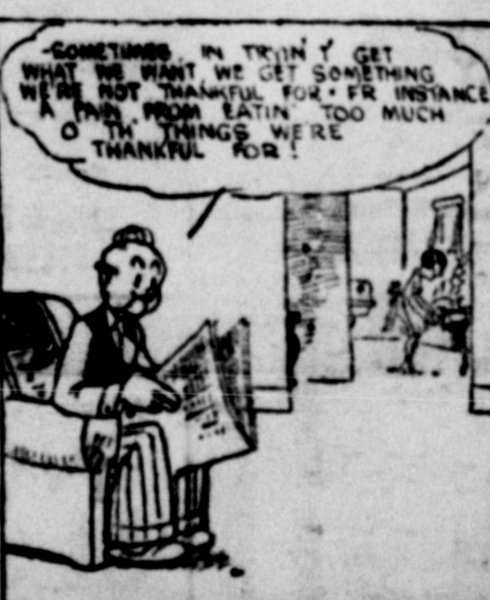
