General Rain of From 2 to 5 Inches Soaks Parched Ranges And Revives Optimistic Spirit Among Ranchers

The spirit of optimism, which had begun to wane as ranchers watched what little grass and weeds that were still alive parch and die, was revived again in the ranching areas of west Texas the first of the week when general rains, ranging from two to more than five inches of moisture soaked the country. The fall was the heaviest and most general in eighteen months. Some of the sections to the west and southwest of here that had had no rain of any consequence in many months, were soaked with heavy falls. Draws throughout the area covered were running full or out of banks as a result of the downpour. Water holes were filled, parched ranges were revived and the livestock industry has been started on its way back by the generous rain. The rainfall in Ozona registered 2 1/4 inches. It was heavier in some portions to the south and east of Ozona.

Girl Baseball Team In Game Here Draws Record Crowd

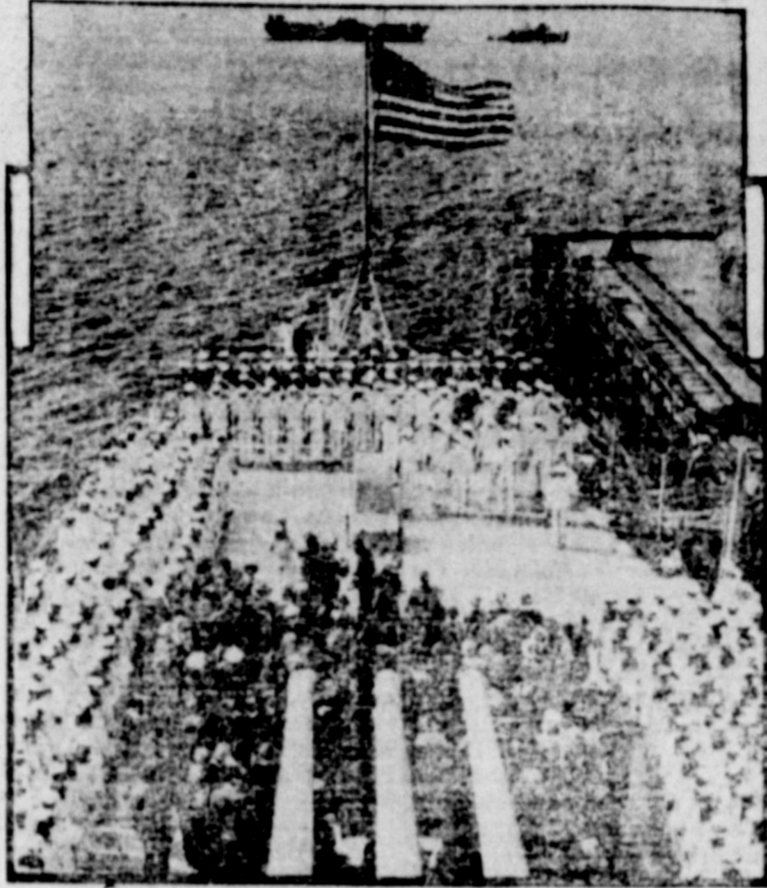

Larger Mosquito Crop Results In Malaria Increase

AUSTIN, Texas, June 6.—According to information reaching the Texas State Department of Health, the number of malaria cases is increasing; a sharp turn upward was noted for May. This is directly related to a parallel increase in the number of mosquitoes. The Malaria Unit reports that not for years have they noticed such large numbers of mosquitoes.

Probably one item that favors this increase is the mild winter and rainfall which leads to many temporary collections of water. Of course the breeding of mosquitoes is not limited to temporary water, but they are the ones that are often the cause of the increase of the mosquito population. They must have water to propagate.

Attention paid to the following and similar points will largely reduce the opportunities for mosquito breeding. Remove all trash from the back yard, including old cans, pails, bottles, and automobile tires or bodies. Clean up the premises.

Put new washers in leaky hydrants. Screen rain-water barrels or oil them regularly. Get some top-minnows and place them in lily pools and cisterns. Look over the roof gutters and drain-spouts and remove trash and straighten up any sagged portions. Change the water in flower vases frequently. If there are low spots in the yard where water stands for days after a rain, either fill or drain these places.

Giants Bounce Cocky Herders

Locals Win Exhibition Fray 6-3; Protested Game Scoreless

Although unable to overcome the heavy odds against them in the three-inning play-off of the protested league game, the Ozona Giants tightened the cinches and plastered the San Angelo Sheep Herders 6-3 in a 7-inning exhibition game here Sunday afternoon following the official play-off of the protested game.

The protested game started in the seventh inning with the Herders at bat, one out and the bases loaded, one score having already been counted in the inning. At this point in the original game a protest was lodged against an umpire's decision and the protest was upheld. Again the Giants held the Herders scoreless in this inning and for the balance of the game and were themselves unable to score, leaving the final count 5 to 3 in favor of the Herders. The original game ended 6-3.

The Giants took after Pitcher Peel in a big way in the first inning, nicking him for three runs in that frame. Lefty Bennett of Fort Stockton went in for the Herders in the fourth and walked the first four men to face him. Besides the score walked in by Bennett, a balk with a runner on third gave the locals another marker in that inning. A total of three was counted in the fourth inning.

One of the highlights of the game was a terrific three-base smash by Dorley, with one man on. Another was a double play effected by Dorley and Cox when three Herder runners on the bags piled up at third base when Andrews dropped the ball on the third strike on a batter. A few innings later almost the same mix-up was pulled by Giant runners.

CRIMINAL EGO

Corpus Christi Caller: Looming large in news of the day is the dispatch which tells of the fatal shooting of Clyde Barrow and his gun-toting sweetie near Black Lake, La., by a posse of Texas and Louisiana officers. Only a few short days ago Barrow, in a bombastic letter to an attorney, boasted that if "Hamilton had been as smart as he (Barrow) was that the officers would never have caught him."

His braggadocio was typical of the criminal mind. This lad, who aided by circumstances rose from a junkyard sneak thief to the doubtful dignity of a public enemy, considered himself in the light of a master mind. His tragic end proved the fallacy of his theory.

There is some strange kink in the criminal brain that affords these illusions of superiority. The Lookout has never met a crook who didn't feel that he was smarter than any honest man who ever wore shoe laces. Any success in their ventures against society only magnifies this feeling. In underworld parlance any respectable person is a "chump."

This ego and overconfidence are frequently the causes of an outlaw's downfall. They cause crooks to underestimate the intelligence of officers and the public at large. And they are the most important factors that contribute to the non-paying qualities of crime.

NEED OF THE TIME

Wayne (Nebraska) Herald: People who lived at the time of the founding of this Government, and those who lived through the trying period in the early years of the last century to see it preserved, could not have foreseen another critical juncture when all the forces of civilization would be engaged in a titanic struggle to reestablish economic order. This country's founders built on foundations that guaranteed individual rights not accorded in the old world, and encouraged exercise of individual initiative which gave spirit to the task of taming a wilderness. After nearly a century, if took armed conflict to keep the union together. Now we are in the coils of another major crisis—this time recovering from the effects of a war that was finished more than 15 years ago. If our forefathers could establish orderly society in the face of a foreign foe and of hostile Indians, if the North and South could be reunited after bitter sectional strife, we can, with developed resources and everything to do with, bring back prosperity on fundamental principles. Qualities inherited from courageous antecedents are certain to be reflected in stalwart mastery of present difficulties. We need fortitude and patience, and we may feel certain that out of the crucible of trial will come a stronger nation and an advanced civilization.

Chevrolet Leads In Registrations Again For April

Passenger car registrations for April place Chevrolet in the lead for the second consecutive month, according to Motor Statistics released by R. L. Polk and Company. Chevrolet registered 63,458 passenger cars during April or 38.2 per cent of price class. This April figure shows an increase of 12,662 units over the March registration figure when Chevrolet led the entire industry in passenger cars by registering 50,796 units or 38.3 per cent of price class.

Wool Consumption Smallest In Ten Years Crop Short

Domestic mill consumption of combing and clothing wool on a grease basis in the first quarter of this year was slightly smaller than in the same period last year and the smallest in any corresponding quarter in the last ten years, says the Bureau of Agricultural Economics in its current report on world wool prospects. Consumption of carpet wool in the first quarter of this year was the largest since 1930.

The outlook for the fall season in the domestic wool manufactur-

ing industry was still uncertain in the middle of May with many mills running on part time schedules, says the bureau. Manufactur-

ing activity decreased in the English wool industry in April and May and continued uncertainty is expected until trading with continental countries can be resumed on a more normal basis. Wool prices have declined in both domestic and foreign markets during recent weeks.

The outlook for foreign markets remains uncertain on account of continued prohibition of imports into Germany, labor difficulties in Belgium, and further restrictions on imports into Italy, says the bureau.

This year's wool clip in the United States, it is expected, will be slightly less than last year's. No reliable estimates of the coming clips in Southern Hemisphere countries are available, but apparent supplies of wool in Australia, New Zealand, Union of South Africa, Argentina, and Uruguay are reported to have been considerably less on April 1 than on that date last year and two years ago.

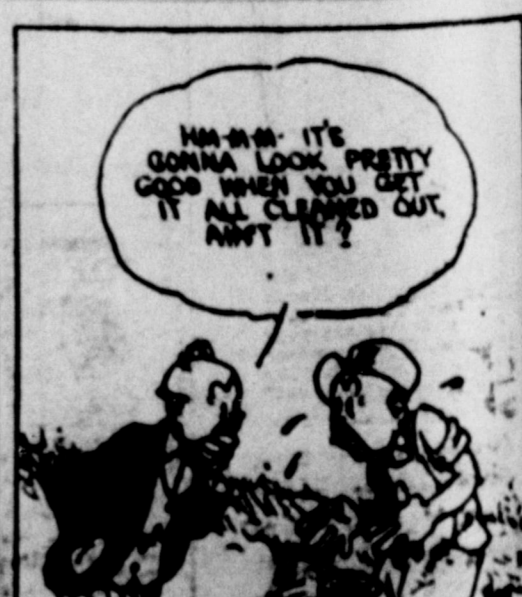

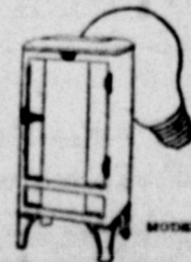

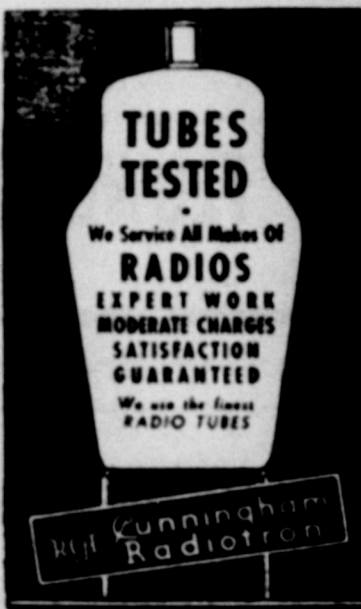
