



Warm Weather Is Dangerous Period For Appendicitis

AUSTIN, Tex., May 23,-This is the season of the year when more deaths are recorded for appendicitis than in cooler weather. A careful study by the State Department of Health brought out the fact that more appendicitis deaths occurred during the warm months In twelve months about six hundred and fifty persons died of this disease, many of whom would be alive today if they had not been delayed in calling a doctor.

There are two principal causes for these deaths; the first is delay in calling a doctor, and the second is the taking of strong purges when one has pains in the abdomen. When the appendix is in a diseased condition the taking of strong laxatives ofen results in the rupturing of this organ. Of the deaths mentioned, 588 of them had ruptured appendix and thirtyfive per cent were not operated

The removal of an appendix is now a very simple matter when done early or before the appendix becomes dangerous and ruptures, attack. In the case of abdominal pain that persists do not take a strong purge but call your physician as he will be able to tell you whether or not you have appendicitis and the method you should use in treatment.

## **DUST CLOUDS PROVE WIND** IS ROBBING RANGE LANDS

Overgrazed and Plowed Grassland mud-flows from Blamed for Much Present Loss Soil, Spread of Desert Areas

The dust cloud which recently swept over nearly half the United States originated largely on overgrazed semi-arid lands and on former cattle range land plowed for wheat near the eastern side of the Rocky Mountains, according to the Forest Service. Drought conditions extending eastward a-Mississippi permitted soil from Midwestern States to blow as far as the Atlantic Ocean, darkening the skies over the National Capital and other cities,

Permanent damage to land as well as current damage to crops will result from such dust clauds. says the Forest Service, pointing out that although the dust storm is a new phenomenon to the people in the East, it is becoming increasingly common over wide areas of the Great Plains. For several years reports of wheat crops being blown out of the ground and highway and street traffic becoming snarled in clouds of dust have been coming from those regions, despite the fact that the velocities of winds do not seem to have increased. Unless more conservative grazing is practiced on semi-arid land and unless greater care exercised in plowing up extensive areas for wheat production in regions subject to drought, desert conditions will begin, and once established. these lands can never be reclaim-

"It is a mistake to cut down or burn up forests or to plow up sods in regions where the elements tend to cause accelerated erosion. Radly managed grazing may be equally destructive of land fertility, and carries with it menace of floods as well as dust sterms. Within the last year or two, the country has also had examples of




