Sleeping Driver Killed, Brother Is Seriously Hurt When Car Overturns Twenty Miles West Of Sheffield

San Antonians Victims Of Early Morning Tragedy

William Gibson, 21, was killed and his brother, Dr. J. F. Gibson, both of San Antonio, was seriously injured when the car in which the two men were riding, a Ford V8, overturned on the highway twenty miles west of Sheffield in the early morning hours of Monday. It was supposed that William Gibson, driver of the car, fell asleep at the wheel while driving at high speed. Dr. Gibson said here that he was asleep at the time of the accident and did not know what happened, but supposed that his brother went to sleep while driving.

The younger of the two brothers died while enroute to Sheffield in the car of motorists from Menard who picked up the two injured men at 6:30 o'clock Monday morning. It was estimated that the accident occurred around 3 or 4 o'clock, the injured men lying on the roadside two hours or more before help arrived. Dr. Marvin Rape of Iraan was summoned to Sheffield and he and Jim Rooney, ranger, brought the injured man and the body of his younger brother to Ozona.

Dr. Gibson was treated in the office of Dr. H. B. Tandy here, where X-ray examination showed one arm broken. He also suffered two deep gashes on his head, but his injuries are not considered critical.

The body of William Gibson was prepared for shipment at the Joe Oberkamp Funeral Home, a San Antonio ambulance coming to take the body there for burial and to take the injured man there for further treatment. A brother of the two men, Dr. C. D. Gibson of Pecos, and the wife of the injured doctor, arrived here Monday night and accompanied the ambulance to San Antonio.

The two brothers passed through Ozona shortly after 1 o'clock Monday morning, according to garage attendants here. They were on their way to visit the brother in Pecos.

Denver Headquarters For Drouth Sheep & Goat Buying Project

Establishment of headquarters at Denver, Colo., for the sheep-buying project of the Drouth Relief Service for western states was announced today by the Agricultural Adjustment Administration. The program is designed to salvage and convert into meat for relief purposes, large numbers of sheep which are threatened with loss because of drouth.

The Denver office will be under supervision of Harry Petrie, of the Agricultural Adjustment Administration Cattle and Sheep Section, who will be assisted by Fred Beier, Allen E. Mechem and Walter J. Hunt, also of the Agricultural Adjustment Administration, will leave Monday for Denver to assist in administration of the program.

Contracts for sheep purchases are now being printed and it is anticipated that within a few days, possibly by the last of next week, the actual buying sheep will be started.

The Agricultural Adjustment Administration will pay \$2 each for ewes one year old or older. Angora goats also will be purchased under this program, at a price of \$1.40 each for animals one year old or older.

Animals which are suitable for use as food will be turned over to the Federal Surplus Relief Corporation to be slaughtered and processed for relief purposes, and is being done with drouth cattle now being purchased.

With a complete assortment of new tricks in his bag for the edification of rival coaches and players and for the thrill and entertainment of local fans, Coach Ted White of the Ozona High School Lions, expects to be back in Ozona in time to start his charges in practice next week in preparation for the opening of the 1934-35 gridiron season.

In a letter to Superintendent C. S. Denham, Coach White recounted some of the high lights of the coaches school which he attended at Lubbock this summer. Classes were held eleven hours a day for eleven days, the Ozona Coach wrote, and he took in the whole show save one lecture he was forced to miss. He particularly enjoyed the lectures by Crisler of Princeton and Kipke of Michigan, he said.

A game with the San Angelo Kittens has been tentatively matched for Monday, September 24, as the season opener here, Coach White said in his letter. The Kittens were unable to come for the week-end, but offered the Monday game, which was tentatively accepted. Except for two or three dates, the entire season's schedule has been worked out for the Lions.

Coach White declared that he would have his proteges on the practice field by Thursday of next week if nothing happens. "I have my whole offensive program worked out and am working on defensive now," he said in the letter.

High School Entrance Examination Set For Tuesday September 4

Entrance examinations for pupils seeking to enter for first year high school work in the Ozona High School from other elementary schools besides the Ozona system will be held at 2 o'clock Tuesday afternoon, September 4, in room 120 of the High School building, Supt. C. S. Denham announced this week.

Graduates of the elementary grades of the Ozona school system will not be required to take such entrance examinations, but all those coming from other school systems will be required to pass such an examination satisfactorily, the superintendent said.

It has long been the custom of local school officials to grant certificates of promotion to pupils completing the seventh grade of Ozona Public Schools. This certificate is given as a reward for achievement and as official evidence of advancement. The presentation of this certificate will entitle the pupil to enroll for high school work.

Graduates of other elementary schools, however, must submit to the examination. The committee on entrance examinations, to have charge of the examination of prospective pupils for the 1934-35 term is composed of Mr. Denham, M. M. Collins, principal of the grade school, Miss Mildred North and Guinn Carruthers.

Many New Textbook Adoptions Are Made Throughout Grades

Approximately 1,000 new text books, adopted by the free text book commission of Texas, for use in school systems over the state have been received by the local school for use this year.

A total of around 24 new adoptions of free text books have been made, effective with the opening of the 1934-35 school terms over the state. The new text books are for use in the various grades and in the high school, nearly every grade having at least one new text book for study this year.

Cattle Buying Curtailed Here

300 Head Accepted Weekly; 2 Days Week Allotted County

Although considerably curtailed on account of congested shipping and processing facilities over the nation, the government's cattle buying program continues in this county.

A shortage of appraisers and veterinarians has made it necessary for the team assigned to work in this county to divide time with neighboring counties. Under the present set-up the appraiser and vet are working two days a week in Crockett County, dividing time with Sutton and Kimble Counties.

Plans are understood to be taking shape rapidly for the opening of the sheep and goat buying program of the government. Forms for the contracts are being prepared and it is estimated by authorities that the buying will get under way by Sept. 1 if not sooner. A flat price of \$2 per head for ewes over 1 year old and \$1.40 a head for Angora goats over a year old has been set by the government.

Eppenauer Test On Owens Ranch Abandoned Dry

The Eppenauer Drilling Co., No. 1 J. W. Owens, wildcat test on the J. W. Owens ranch in this county, was abandoned and plugged as a duster late last week when sulphur water was struck at 1870 to 1875 feet. The total depth of the well was 1875 feet.

The test was spudded July 2, 1934. Oil showings were encountered at 1,545-58 feet and at 1,668-78 feet.

Tax Rate To Be 65c But There's No Cut From Last Year Rate

It was erroneously stated in last week's Stockman that the 65 cent county tax rate as set by the Commissioners Court was a reduction of 5 cents over last year's rate. The rate last year was 65 cents also.

The 5 cent levy made for road bonds last year and omitted this year was offset by a reduction of a like amount in the levy for another fund in last year's rate. This year the 5 cents was added to the other fund and the levy for road bonds omitted because sufficient funds are on hand to make up the necessary sinking fund.

ADD FIVE NEW TEACHERS TO OZONA STAFF

New Faces To Appear In Both Grade And High School

VACANCIES FILLED

Faculty Complete In Readiness For Opening Sept. 3

Five new teachers will be in service on the faculty of the Ozona High and Grade Schools during the coming 1934-35 term, opening Monday September 3. All vacancies in the teaching staff have been filled and assignment of work made in readiness for the opening of school, Supt. C. S. Denham announced this week.

Miss Elitabel Tillery of Lubbock will teach public school music in the local schools. Miss Tillery is a graduate of the music department of Texas Technological College at Lubbock, with special training in violin.

M. M. Collins of Abilene will act as principal of the local grade school and will teach arithmetic in the junior high grades. Mr. Collins is a graduate of Simmons University at Abilene, majoring in mathematics and history. He has had six years experience as a principal.

Mrs. White To Teach
Mrs. Ted White, wife of the athletic coach, is another addition to the teaching staff. Mrs. White will teach history and penmanship in the Junior high grades. She is a graduate of Daniel Baker College. Miss Myra Bishop will teach high school English this year. Miss Bishop is a graduate of Rice Institute at Houston, majoring in English, and has done graduate work in the University of Texas. She has taught English in the Itasca High School the past five years.

Clarence E. Nelson of Abilene has been elected principal of the Ozona High School. Mr. Nelson is a graduate of the Abilene Christian College, doing graduate work in the University of Texas in the field of mathematics. He was head coach of track and debate and assistant in football at Abilene High School. He holds the TIAA state record in the two-mile run, established in 1927.

Miss North Shifted
Another change in the line-up of the 1934-35 faculty will be the shifting of Miss Mildred North from the grade school to head of the commercial department of the High School. Miss North is a graduate of Baylor University with the degree of Bachelor of Business Administration.

Other teachers will remain the same as last year, with Miss Sophie Haug as kindergarten teacher, Miss Elizabeth Fussell, first grade; Miss Frances Northcutt, second grade; Miss Norene Allison, third grade; Mrs. C. S. Denham, fourth grade; Miss Aileen Hampton, reading and English in the junior high grades; Miss Ada Moss, home economics in the high school; Guinn Carruthers, chemistry, general science and manual training; Ted White, Spanish and physical training; and Mr. Denham, history.

In the Mexican school here, Mrs. Nell Smith and Miss Helen Chapman will be the teachers. Miss Vivian Gooden will teach in the Live Oak school and Misses Mildred Cook and Sarah Cook will be in charge of the Powell Field school.

CARS DAMAGED IN CRASH

Two men and two boys, tourists, escaped injury Monday night when their automobile crashed into one driven by a Mexican 15 miles west of Ozona. The Mexican was not injured but both cars were badly wrecked. The Mexican is said to have been driving without lights.

MR. FORD'S FORTUNE

Washington Post: Henry Ford
in an interview granted on the eve
of his seventy-first birthday as-
serted that "there is no Ford for-
tune." "A fortune to me," he says,
"is something a man hoards and
on which he lives in idleness. Money,
to me, is something that enables me
to get what I produce to you the way
a postage stamp gets a letter from me
to you."

Of course, anyone with an ele-
mentary knowledge of economic
processes knows that fortunes are
not gained by the kind of hoarding
which Mr. Ford despises, but by the
productive processes which he
himself has carried on with such
conspicuous success. A fortune
exists whenever an individual has
acquired ownership of large masses
of wealth, irrespective of the
uses to which that wealth is put.

Nevertheless, there is a deeper
significance to Mr. Ford's defini-
tion that should not be overlooked.
There is a great difference be-
tween the man of wealth who con-
sciously employs it to produce
goods that he believes to be need-
ed, and the rich man whose in-
vestments are scattered over a
wide variety of enterprises for
which he feels no responsibility.
The picture of a man who hoards
and lives in idleness is probably
Mr. Ford's way of describing a
person who has no personal con-
nection with the industries that
his wealth has helped to create.

The modern corporation is largely
responsible for the regime of
absentee ownership which often
encourages an attitude of irres-
ponsibility in the active heads
of industrial establishments. The
pride in achievement of the rich
man who is not only an owner,
but the active manager, of a great
industrial enterprise as a rule is
greater than that of the efficient
executive who acts merely as an
agent for others. Mr. Ford has
that pride in high degree, and un-
doubtedly regards his fortune as
a trust which he is devoting to
the service of the public that buys
his automobiles.

Judge and Mrs. Chas. E. David-

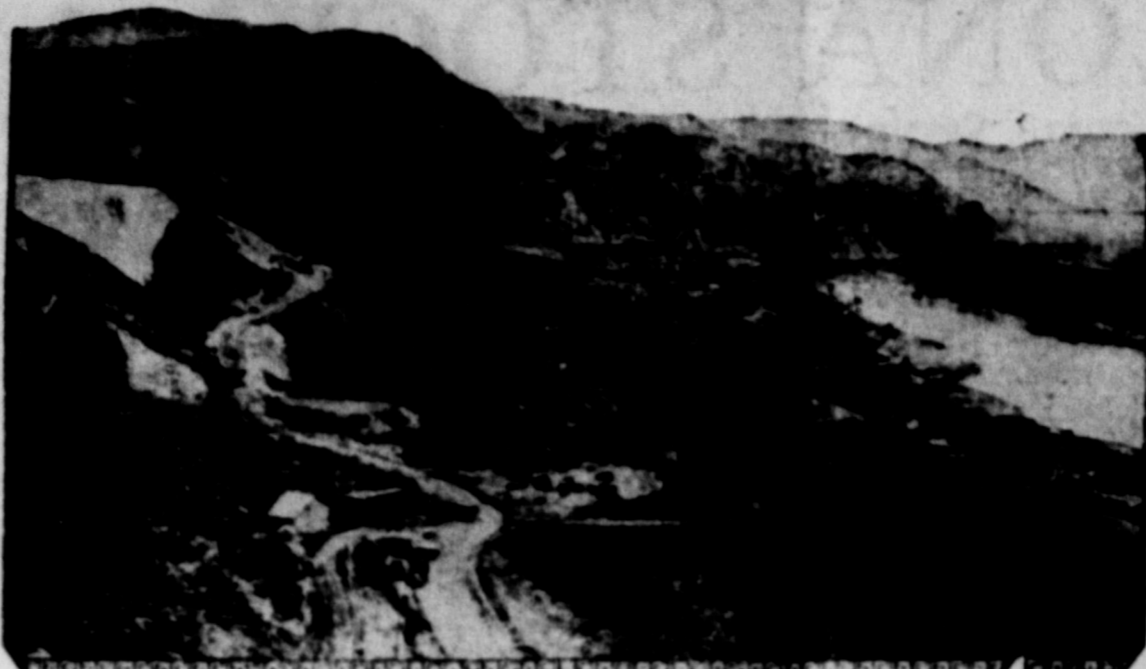

all the energy, ability and devo-
tion of which he is capable.

MORE POWER TO THEM

Texas Weekly: Another judge
is attempting to make newspaper
reporters divulge the source of
news by putting them in jail for
contempt. In Danville, Ky., a po-
lice court justice has brought two
young newspaper reporters before
him three times and asked them
to tell from whom they obtained
advance information that a hang-
ing in effigy was to be staged
ridiculing a member of the State
Legislature. Each time the report-
ers refused to answer and each
time the judge held them in con-
tempt of court. The first time he
fined them \$10 each and the sec-
ond and third times he sentenced
them to a jail term of hours. On
Wednesday he remarked: "Well,
boys, if this is to be an endurance
contest, I can stand it. You un-
derstand that this is a challenge
to the court." At last accounts the
boys were still in jail.

It is an unwritten law of the
newspaper profession not to di-
vulge the source of information
when to do so would violate a
trust. Laymen and the learned
gentlemen who preside over our
courts, including our justice
courts, sometimes seem to have
difficulty in understanding this
and attempt to compel newspaper
men to violate this unwritten law.
They very seldom succeed, but ev-
ery now and then we hear of some
new attempt, in spite of the futi-
lity which repeated failure ought
to demonstrate. These two report-
ers mean no contempt of the court
They have no intention of chal-

lenging the court. They are simply
living up to their ideals of their
duty to their profession as they
conceive it.

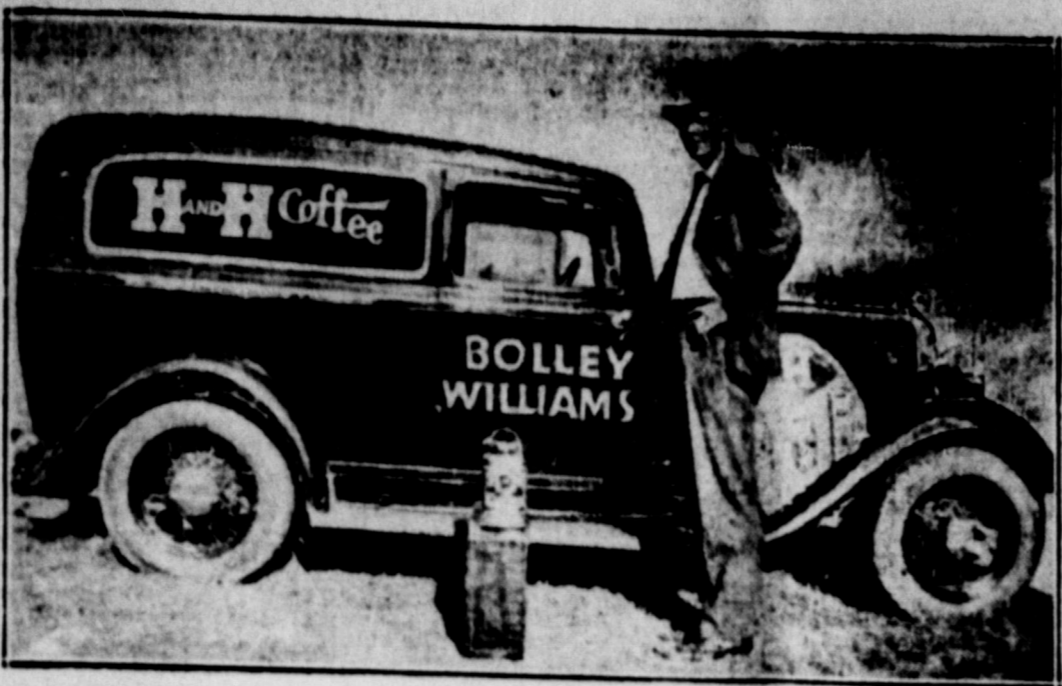
Typhus Fever, On Increase in Texas, Is Caused By Rat

San Antonio, Texas, August 22.—Typhus fever is on the increase in Texas, said Dr. John W. Brown, Health Officer, "and the rat is the cause of its spread. Old typhus fever has a high death rate, while the type we have in Texas, sometimes called 'Rice' Disease, has a low death rate. It occurs among persons who live in rat infested buildings. It was the observation of this fact that led to the discovery that rats are carriers or transmitters of the disease. It appears that rats suffer attacks of this disease and that the disease is harbored by the sick rat bite and thus human infection re-

quires the loss caused by rats would be more than pay the State taxes for typhus, as it is estimated over 100,000 is thus lost. Dry, hot weather favors the increase of the disease, and as the rats are gathered around buildings will in-

crease the patient's greatest fear is that he is not going to die. The illness generally lasts about two weeks.

"The control of typhus is very difficult and it depends upon the extermination of rats and this is no easy matter. Trapping and poisoning help, but the best results are obtained by starving the rats. This is done by having all buildings where food is stored rat-proofed. The State Department of Health and the U. S. Department of Agriculture will be glad to assist communities in their program for the extermination of this pest."

More than 2,623,000 head of the drouth-stricken cattle had been purchased by the Agricultural Adjustment Administration in the western drouth states at the close of business August 10, it was announced today. While actual payments had been sent out up to August 10 for 1,388,977 head, these payments totaling \$18,970,282, indicated that the average price per head for government-

purchased cattle was ranging from \$13.60 to \$13.70. These cattle were purchased from 180,576 farmers in 19 states—Minnesota, North Dakota, Wisconsin, Texas, Wyoming, Montana, New Mexico, Nebraska, Colorado, Utah, Idaho, Kansas, Missouri, Arizona, Oklahoma, Nevada, California and Oregon. Of the cattle purchased, 1,364,326 had been shipped up to and including August 10. Of this number 349,639 were shipped to grazing areas in southern and eastern states to be processed later, and the balance were sent directly to

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 11

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That there be added to Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas a new section to be numbered Section 2-A and to have five (5) lettered subdivisions and which section shall read as follows:

Section 2-A.

(a) General management and control of the affairs of the County shall hereafter be vested in the Commissioners Court, provided that in the exercise of powers not specifically granted to the Commissioners Court by the Constitution and Amendments thereto, the Court shall be subject to the authority of the Legislature of the State, and the Court shall also be subject to all general laws of the State now in force not in conflict with the provisions of this Amendment until such laws are modified or repealed.

(b) All duties heretofore performed by the Clerk of the District Court and the County Clerk shall hereafter be performed by an officer to be known as Record Clerk; all duties heretofore performed by the County Tax Assessor and the County Tax Collector shall hereafter be performed by one officer known as Tax Clerk; and in the counties where the sheriff performs the duties of the Tax Collector he shall hereafter perform the duties of the Tax Clerk. The Record Clerk and the Tax Clerk shall be elected to hold office for a term of two (2) years and until their successors shall be elected and qualified. The Commissioners Court shall have authority to combine the office of County Treasurer and the office of the County Surveyor, or to combine either, or both, of said offices with any county office. Within the maximum and minimum limits prescribed by the Legislature the Commissioners Court shall have authority to fix the compensation of all county and precinct officers except County Auditor, County Judge and County Commissioners. The Legislature shall fix the compensation of District Judges, District Attorneys, County Judges and the County Commissioners and may provide for a County Auditor and prescribe his duties and fix his compensation and the number and compensation of his assistants. The Commissioners Court shall fix the compensation of deputies and clerical personnel of all precinct officers and county officers except the county auditor.

(c) City and county officers and employees may, in addition to their duties as such city and county officers or employees, be required to perform such other similar duties for cities, towns and districts within the county, or for the county, as may be mutually agreed upon and contracted for between the Commissioners Court of said county and governing board, or boards, of such cities, towns and districts; and the cost of such service shall be provided for in said contracts and paid by such cities, towns or districts into the Treasury of the county or city, town or district, as provided for in said contract. All such contracts shall be approved by the Attorney General of this State and such contracts shall not cover a period longer than two (2) years.

(d) The Legislature shall have authority, by general law, to provide for complete forms of county government and organizations different from that provided for in this Constitution to become effective in any county when submitted in such manner as may be prescribed by the Legislature to the qualified voters of such county in an election held for such purpose and approved by a majority of the qualified voters in said election. Provided, however, that no such law shall impair the power of the Commissioners Court to determine the compensation of county and precinct officers other than the County Auditor, to fix the number of assistants, deputies, and clerical personnel which said officers may employ; nor shall such general law change the present constitutional limitations as to particular and total tax levies for any or all county purposes; nor shall such general law change the present constitutional limitations on counties to incur public debts.

(e) In any and all cases where provisions of the Constitution of this State are in conflict with the provisions of this Amendment, the provision of this Amendment (Section 2-A, Article IX) shall control; provided, however, should any county adopt a Home Rule Charter under authority of any provisions of the State Constitution or Amendment thereto, this Amendment shall not be applicable to such county.

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the electors of this State, qualified to vote on Constitutional Amendments, at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1934, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon the words:

"For the Amendment of Article IX of the State Constitution by adding Section 2-A thereto, giving the Commissioners Court general management and control of county affairs, and authorizing the Legislature to provide more economical forms of county government and different than as now provided by law."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the State at the next general election, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"For the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas subjecting the lands of the University of Texas to taxation for county and school district purposes, and providing for the payment of said taxes to the proper authorities of the counties and school districts where said lands are located," and all those opposed shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"Against the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas subjecting the lands of the University of Texas to taxation for county and school district purposes, and providing for the payment of said taxes to the proper authorities of the counties and school districts where said lands are located."

Cities having more than five thousand (5000) inhabitants may, by a majority vote of the qualified voters of said city, at an election held for that purpose, adopt or amend their charters, subject to such limitations as may be prescribed by the Legislature, and providing that no charter or any ordinance passed under said charter shall contain any provision inconsistent with the Constitution of the State, or of the general laws enacted by the Legislature of this State; said cities may levy, assess and collect such taxes as may be authorized by law or by their charters; but no tax for any purpose shall ever be lawful for any one year, which shall exceed two and one-half percent (2½%) of the taxable property of such city, and no debt shall ever be created by any city, unless at the same time provision be made to assess and collect annually a sufficient sum to pay the interest thereon and creating a sinking fund for at least two percent (2%) thereon; provided further, that no city charter shall be altered, amended or repealed other than every twelve (12) months."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the State at the next general election, to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1934; at which election all voters favoring such proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"For the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas permitting any Home Rule City to alter, amend or repeal its charter every twelve (12) months;" and those opposed shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"Against the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas permitting any Home Rule City to alter, amend or repeal its charter every twelve (12) months."

All fees earned by district, county or precinct officers shall be paid into the County Treasury where earned, for the account of the proper fund, provided that fees incurred by the State, county and any municipality, or in case where paper's oath is filed, shall be paid to the County Treasury, when collected, and provided that where any officer is compensated wholly on a fee basis, such fees may be retained by such officer, or paid into the Treasury of the county as the Commissioners' Court may direct. All Notaries Public, County Surveyors and Public Weighers shall continue to be compensated on a fee basis."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified voters of this State and the next general election to be held on Tuesday, after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1934, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"For the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas adding Section 61 to Article XVI, abolishing the fee system of compensating all district officers and all county officers in counties having a population of twenty thousand (20,000) or more; and authorizing the Commissioners' Court to determine whether precinct officers shall be compensated on a fee or a salary basis."

And one Railroad Commissioner shall be elected every two (2) years thereafter. In case of vacancy in said office the Governor of the State shall fill said vacancy by appointment until the next General Election."

The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the State on the next General Election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1934, at which election all voters favoring such proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballot the words:

"For the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas permitting Home Rule Cities to so amend their charters that the elected officials of such cities may hold office not to exceed four (4) years," and those opposed shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"Against the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas permitting Home Rule Cities to so amend their charters that the elected officials of such cities may hold office not to exceed four (4) years."

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 13

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 3 of Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereinafter read as follows:

"Section 3. Taxes shall be levied and collected by general laws and for public purposes only; and the total amount of revenue which the State shall be authorized to collect during such biennium from taxes, licenses, permits and fees, except fees paid by students to state educational institutions, and except rentals, bonuses and royalties obtained from public lands and other public property) shall not exceed a sum reasonably estimated to equal the product obtained by multiplying the number of inhabitants of this State by the sum of Twenty-two and 50/100 (\$22.50) Dollars; provided, however, the total amount of such revenue which may be so collected, shall be reduced by the amount of any surplus funds or unexpended appropriations remaining at the close of the preceding biennium. The expenditures of the State government of funds derived from the sources above referred to shall never exceed during any biennium, a sum equal to the product obtained by multiplying the number of inhabitants of this State by the sum of Twenty-two and 50/100 (\$22.50) Dollars, provided however, that the population of the State (in determining the amount of revenue which may be collected from taxes, licenses, permits and fee or expended from the revenue thus obtained) shall be determined by the then last preceding Federal census, to which population shall be added or deducted, as the case may be, for each year that has elapsed since the last preceding Federal census, the average yearly increase or decrease of the population as shown by said Federal census when compared with the Federal census which immediately preceded said last Federal census. Provided, further, that in case of war, riots, or insurrection, or a statewide calamity caused by earthquake, fire, flood or an epidemic which seriously threatens the health of the citizens of this State, the legislature shall have authority, by a two-thirds vote of both Houses, to suspend for a definite period this constitution limitation as to the amount of money which may be collected and expended during the biennium."

The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1934. At this election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballot the word:

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 21

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 1 of Article 9 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so as to hereinafter read as follows:

"Section 1. The Legislature shall have the power to create counties for the convenience of the people subject to the following provisions:

First. In the territory of the State exterior to all counties now existing, no new counties shall be created with a less area than nine hundred square miles, in a square form, unless prevented by the pre-existing boundary lines. Should the state lines render this impracticable in border counties, the area may be less. The territory referred to may, at any time, in whole or in part, be divided into counties in advance of population and attached, for judicial and land surveying purposes, to the most convenient organized county or counties.

Second. Within the territory of any county or counties now existing, the Legislature may by a two-thirds vote of both Houses, create new counties, combine existing counties and parts of counties and abolish existing counties and change county boundaries at will, provided that no new county shall be created with an area of less than nine hundred square miles nor shall any existing county be reduced in area so as to contain less than nine hundred square miles, unless such new county or such remaining county, and both shall have a population of not less than fifty thousand according to the last United States census prior to the date of the creation or change of such county. When any part of a county is stricken off and attached to, or created in another county, the part stricken off shall be holden for and obliged to pay its proportion of all liabilities then existing, of the county from which it was taken, in such manner as may be prescribed by law.

Third. No part of any existing county shall be detached from it and attached to another existing county until the proposition for such change shall have been submitted in such a manner as may be provided by law, to a vote of the electors of both counties and shall have received a majority of those on the question in each."

Section 2. The foregoing amendment to the Constitution shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1934. At this election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballot the word:

"For the amendment to Section 1 of Article 9 of the Constitution of Texas, providing that the Legislature may by a two-thirds vote of both Houses create new counties and change the boundaries of existing counties."

Those voters opposing said proposed amendment shall write, or have printed on their ballot the words:

"Against the amendment to Section 1 of Article 9 of the Constitution of Texas, providing that the Legislature may by a two-thirds vote of both Houses create new counties and change the boundaries of existing counties."

Section 1. TAXATION TO BE EQUAL AND UNIFORM AS TO REAL ESTATE AND TO ALL REASONABLE CLASSIFICATIONS OF PROPERTY, OCCUPATION AND INCOME TAXES; EXEMPTIONS, LIMITATIONS UPON COUNTIES, ETC.

"Taxation of real property shall be equal and uniform. All property in this State, whether owned by natural persons or corporations other than municipal, shall be taxed in proportion to its value, which shall be ascertained as provided by law. The Legislature may by general laws make reasonable classifications of property other than real property for the purpose of taxation, and may impose different rates thereon; provided that the taxation of all property in any class shall be equal and uniform. The Legislature may impose a poll tax, but also impose occupation taxes upon natural persons and corporations, other than municipal, doing business in this State. It may also tax incomes of natural persons and corporations other than municipal, except persons engaged in mechanical and agricultural pursuits which never be required to pay an occupation tax; provided that the amount of household and kitchen furniture, belonging to each family in the State, shall be exempt from taxation, and provided that the occupation tax levied by any county, city or town any year on persons or corporations pursuing any professional business, shall not exceed one-half of the tax levied by the State for the same period of such profession or business."

Section 2. The foregoing amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1934. At this election all voters favoring said amendment shall write, or have printed, on a ballot the words:

"For the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that taxation of property shall be equal and uniform; and that all property in this State, other than that owned by municipal corporations, shall be taxed in proportion to its value as ascertained as may be provided by law; and providing that the Legislature may make reasonable classifications of all property other than real property, for the purpose of taxation, and that the taxation of all property in any class shall be equal and uniform; and providing further that the Legislature may impose different rates of taxation and occupation tax and tax and exempting from occupation tax persons engaged in mechanical and agricultural pursuits; and exempting from the tax Two Hundred Fifty Dollars worth of household kitchen furniture belonging to each family; and providing that the occupation tax levied by any county, city or town shall not exceed one-half that levied by the State for the same period."

Those voters opposing said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballot the words:

Multiple Births Not So Unusual, Old Records Show

ord of similar occurrences. Because of these conflicting facts, it is difficult to determine a great deal about the fundamental causes. And the rarity of the cases makes research upon the subject difficult.

"Although Mrs. Dionne and her five daughters represent a rare case in authenticated medical history," said Dr. Clendening, "still, by comparison with some of the stories which have been told, she is far from a record holder."

Seignette of Dijon, a writer of medical curiosities, told in 1755 of the birth of nine children. Ambroise Pare, a French surgeon who wrote in the 18th century, quotes Francisus Plicus Mirandiba, a Polish historian, who tells of an Italian woman, Dorothea, who bore 29 children in two accouchements, nine at one and 11 at the other.

Pare also recounts the story of the wife of Lord Malmesbury, who lived near Chambelly in the parish of Seaux. The first year of her marriage she became the mother of twins, the second year of triplets, the third year of quadruplets, the fourth year of quintuplets and the fifth year of sextuplets, in which delivery she died. At the time Pare wrote, he asserts, the then Lord Malmesbury was one of the sextuplets.

According to Le Burn, another French medical writer, Gilles de Tradegines, who accompanied St. Louis on the Crusades and who was made constable of France, was one of 13 children born at a single birth. According to the story that was told, his father was absent when the children were born and because of the unusual number the mother was suspected by the townspeople of adultery. As a result a trial was held and the children were condemned to be drowned as illegitimate. At the last moment, however, the father returned home. Moved to pity by the plight of his wife he acknowledged all 13 of the children, thereby saving their lives.

Even as late as 1799 there was reported a woman in Andalusia who was said to have been delivered at one time of 16 male infants seven of whom were living two months later.

Still more extraordinary is the case recounted by the Polish historian, Martin Cromeras, who writes that on January 20, 1296, near Craecovia, one Margaret, "of noble and ancient family," the wife of Count Virboslaus, brought forth at one birth 36 living children. Pare also mentions this event.

But all other accounts of multiple-births pale beside the one about Margaret, daughter of the Earl of Holland, Florent IV, and the wife of Count Hermann of Heneberg. Margaret, proud and haughty, was walking one day when a poor woman carrying twins asked her for some alms. Margaret not only refused the alms, but insulted the woman by telling her that each of the twins probably had a different father. In anger, the poor woman prayed that Margaret would give birth at one time to as many children as there were days in the year.

Therefore, as a punishment for her behavior, on Good Friday of the year 1278, Margaret was delivered at one time of 365 children, 182 males, 182 females and

one bi-sexual. It is said that the children were immediately baptized by the bishop of Trevas in two large brapen dishes, all the boys being named John and all the girls Elizabeth.

The two large basins were kept on exhibit in the village church of Loudun, a small place near The Hague, and they were considered one of the curiosities of Holland. Pepsy mentions having seen them.

Practically no work of a careful, scientific nature has been done with large multiple-births. Therefore, the five baby girls born to Mrs. Dionne will form an interesting study to medical observers.

There have been authenticated cases of large multiple-births before in America. In Maine it is of record that June 27, 1847, a woman was delivered of six children, two of whom survived. And in Dallas, Texas, in 1888, Mrs. George Hirsch became the mother of six children, four boys and two girls, all of whom lived.

But the record of the largest, fairly well-authenticated multiple birth in America was given in the September 26, 1872 issue of the Boston Medical and Surgical Journal, a conservative publication. It stated a Mrs. Timothy Bradlee of Trumbull County, Ohio, at one time became the mother of eight children. She and the children all lived.

The case of Mrs. Bradlee was interesting in other respects. Previously she was the mother of two sets of twins, bearing 12 children in six years. She herself was one of triplets, and both her father and mother were of twin births. Her grandmother was the mother of five sets of twins.

Such a case-history suggests that a tendency towards multiple-births is inherited, and there is some evidence for such a belief. Nevertheless, in many cases there is no such evidence whatsoever.

It has never been determined whether a tendency toward multiple-births lies with the mother or the father, or both. Tending to show the father's influence is the famous case of the peasant Kirilow, who was presented to the empress of Russia in 1853 when 70 years old. He had been married twice. The first wife bore quadruplets four times, triplets seven times, and twins three times. His second wife bore triplets once and twins six times. There had been no single births. He had, therefore 72 children. All were living at the time of his presentation at court.

Still more remarkable is the case of another Russian, one Fedor Vassilet, who, in 1872, at the age of 75, was the father of 87 children. He also had been married twice. His first wife had quadruplets four times.
