## GOV'T. CATTLE In Two Sunday BUYING BRINGS \$20,000 HERE

#### \$40,000 Additional In Checks In Mails As Program Goes On

#### \$70,000 APPRAISED 6,301 of 10,375 Head Signed Up Have Been Appraised

Approximately \$20,000 in govreceived by Crockett County ranchers in payment for cattle purchased by the government in The Giants will pack their its drouth relief cattle buying program, and an estimated \$40,-000 worth are in the mails, to reach the local office in the next

few days. A total of 10,375 head of cattle had been signed up for inspection and appraisal at the office of J. S. Barlow up to Wednesday afternoon, this number representing the offerings of 101 ranchers. Of this number, 6,301 head have been appraised, 2,307 condemned and killed, and 3,994 accepted and shipped. The total appraised value of the 6,301 head was \$69,923. Of this amount, \$20,000 had already been received, \$40,000 is in the mails en route and the balance of approximately \$10,000, represents the value of animals on the way to shipping points where they are finally received by government representatives. According to records of estimates in the office of Mr. Barlow, there are 19,480 head of cattle left on the ranches where appraisals have been made.

Smith, county relief administration and government agent in receiving cattle at the shipping pens at Barnhart, Big Lake and Rankin, show that up to Tuesday night, receipts at Barnhart totaled 3,477 head, with 3,164 of this number, or 71 cars, already shipped. At Big Lake receipts totalled 280, or seven cars, all shipped out. One car of calves, one car of yearlings and eight cars of cattle were scheduled to be shipped from Barnhart today.

#### Prompt Reporting Contagious Disease Public Safeguard

AUSTIN, Tex., July 24-Asked who is responsible for reporting the occurrence of typhoid fever, tuberculosis, mensles, whooping cough, diphtheria, scarlet fever and other "catching" diseases to the Health Department, Dr. John Brown, State Health Officer,

"According to the laws of Texas relating to public health, a physician is required to notify the health officer of the city, town or county in which the illness occurs, immediately and in writing, of each case of a notifiable disease that is under his professional care. They in turn notify the State Department of Health

"But the responsibility of reporting the direases that are usually spoken of as 'catching' and that spread from person to person, or are contracted in handling like a fire department. 



## Cattle Purchases

Payments Total Near 6 Million At Close **Business July 19** 

More than 1.100,000 cattle from emergency drought counties in 16 Western States had been purchased by the Agricultural Adjustment Administration at the close of business, July 19, it was announced today. All of these cattle are turned over to the Federal Surplus Relief Corporation, as they are purchased, to be processed for distribution to families on relief rolls. None of the meat from these Government-purchased animals finds its way into com mercial channels.

Payments to cattlemen in these states at the close of July 19 amounted to \$5,910,305, of which \$2,097,914 represented benefit phy ments and \$3,812,391 purchase payments. These figures, however do not represent payment for all cattle purchased to that time, since several days ordinarily are required to issue vouchers in payment for snimals purchased.

The cattle purchased came from 89,113 forms in the 16 states and represent 32.8 per cent of the total inventory of 3.515,963 head of cattle on those farms.


