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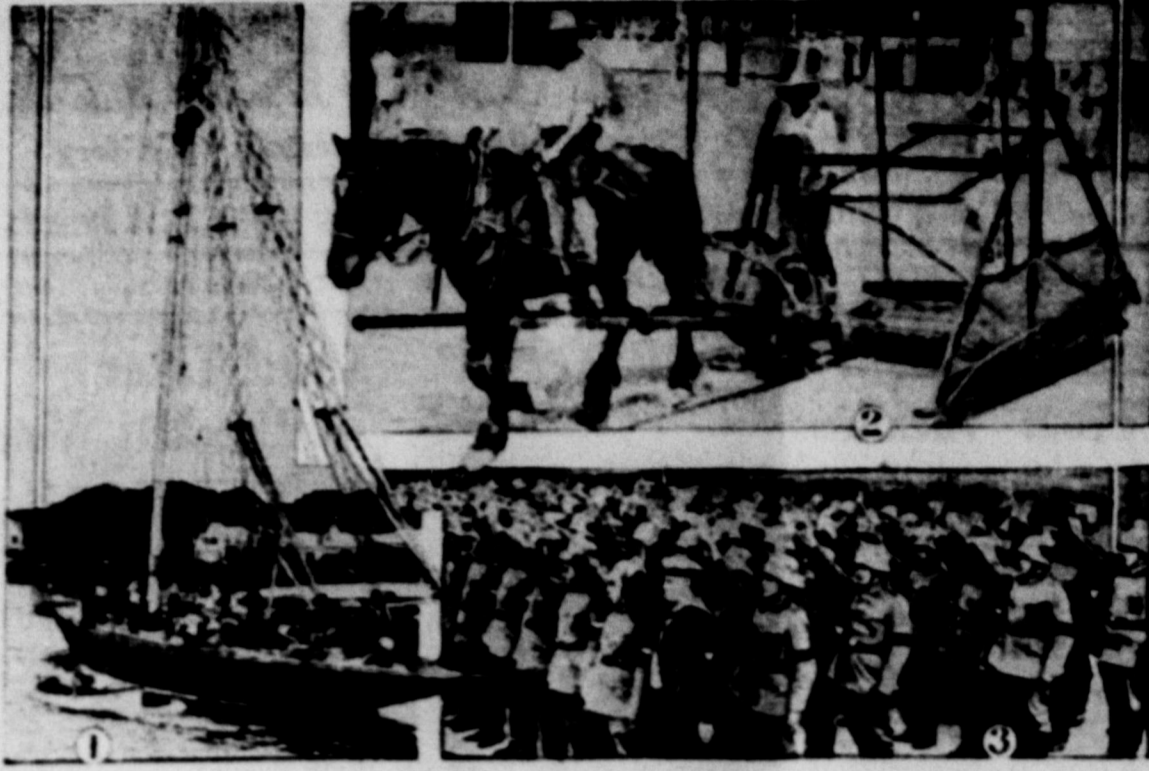

SCARCITY NOT WANTED

New York Times: Even after the news of the disastrous ruin of Western crops by the drought and heat, the Department of Agriculture continued to talk about pursuing its plan of agricultural restriction. But now the tune is changing. Some of the officials of AAA itself are intimating that nature has so overdone their job that it may be necessary to modify drastically, or even entirely abandon, for a year or two the policy formerly in force. They must have noted how Senator Borah and other Western men are seizing upon the crop failure to attack the whole plan authorized by Congress and carried out in part by Secretary Wallace. It is not pleasant for a high official of the administration to find himself compared to the chinch bug and the boll weevil. In the presence of a threatened scarcity caused by natural forces, a little abundance does not look so bad as it did.

It has often been remarked that there are curious and embarrassing conflicts between different plans of the administration. The calamity of the drought has served sharply to point one of these contradictions. Senator Borah argues that the artificial cutting down of farm products is really at war with the announced purpose, or hope, of the administration to provide for Americans a "more abundant life." The President has recently given his blessing to the two great hydroelectric projects on the Columbia River. But they are anticipating the actual needs of that region for power by 25 years. This may be justified by the event provided that an enormous development of manufacturing and a great increase in the population, with a consequent demand for larger food production, shall follow.

Government Cattle Buying Swells Texas Shipping To Record

AUSTIN, Texas, Aug. 30.—The efforts of stock raisers in cooperation with the Government to salvage as much as possible from the ravages of the drought and to conserve the limited feed and pasturage for coming months were reflected in livestock shipments in Texas during July, according to Dr. F. A. Buechel, assistant director of the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research.

"The unprecedented total of 8,381 cars was shipped to Fort Worth and interstate points during the month against 3,366 cars during the similar month a year ago," he said. "These figures do not include shipments to markets within the State other than Fort Worth or the cattle purchased by the Government and processed by canning plants for emergency relief. Contributing further to the disappearance of livestock from Texas ranges are unusually high death losses and the destruction of diseased and emaciated animals by the Government.

"Cattle and calf shipments accounted for practically all of the increase, although there was a slight increase in the number of sheep, while shipments of hogs were only half as large.

"The hog statistics for the month deserve special notice. During July this year the receipts of hogs into Texas from outside states exceeded shipments to the states by 112 cars; whereas in July, 1933, shipments from Texas to outside states exceeded receipts from out of State points by almost exactly the same number of cars. Moreover, this disparity is likely to increase in future months as the Government program of hog reduction last year did not get well under way until about August. The sharp rise in hog prices which promises to reach a still higher level in coming months intensifies the outflow of money from Texas for live hogs, to say nothing of the added amounts for dressed pork, of which there is at present no record."

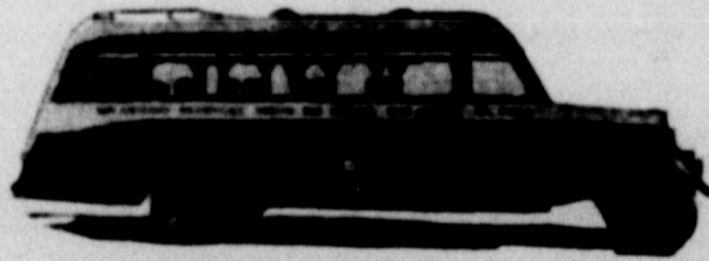

Hints for the Household

HOUSEHOLD HINTS

Hint on Child Care

When children first learn to toddle around—it is most fascinating to them. They are thrilled with their achievements and have no sense as to direction or distance.

I find it very successful in caring for a child of this age to tie a bell on its neck or arm so that while I am working I can unconsciously know my child is near by the constant tinkle and when I miss this cheery ring I immediately go in search of my baby.

Potato Hint

Do you always think it's necessary in order to fry left-over potatoes that you have to cut them up? I did for a long while. But occasionally and for a change, I like to put my left-over potatoes in a frying pan and press the potatoes down several times with a wire potato masher.

COOKING HINTS

Asparagus and Poached Eggs Boil asparagus until tender. Make required number pieces of toast.

Butter toast and keep warm. Lay toast on platter. Place asparagus on top of toast. Season with butter, salt and pepper. Poach desired number of eggs in the same water you cooked the asparagus. Place eggs on top of asparagus and serve.

French Fried Onions

Peel large onions. Cut them in slices about one-fourth inch thick. Soak about one-half hour in half milk and half water. Drain. Dredge with flour and let dry. Fry in deep fat until golden brown. Salt and serve.

Cake Frosting a la California Stir together powdered sugar and orange juice. Spread on cake. Some ground nuts added to frosting makes it extra delicious.

BAKING HINTS

Date Muffins 1/4 cup of shortening. 2 tablespoons of sugar. 1 egg. 3/4 cup of dates (cut up). 2 cups of flour. 4 teaspoons of baking powder. 1/2 teaspoon of salt. 1 cup of milk. Method: Cream butter and sugar until light. Add well beaten egg and mix well with dates. Sift together flour, baking powder and salt. Add to first mixture, alternating with milk. Pour into greased muffin tins and bake in a moderate oven 25 to 30 minutes.

Apple Sauce Pie Method: Make pie crust. Line pie tin with crust and bake. Make apple sauce. Sweeten and strain.

Loud Speaking Car as Traffic "Corrector"

When cool fill baked pie shell with strained apple sauce. Make a meringue and bake in a slow oven or serve topped with sweetened whipped cream.

Ice Cream Roll

Either make a plain sponge cake—the consistency you would use for a jelly roll—or have a baker sell you a jelly roll without the jelly. Spread cake with ice cream. Roll up. Place on a platter. Pour over chocolate or marsh-

mallow sauce or fresh fruit mashed and sweetened, or top with sweetened whipped cream. This is easy, delicious and unusual.

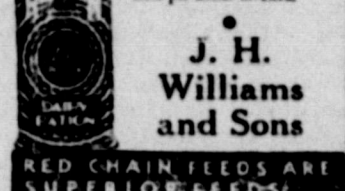

Thus diseased teeth or gums may directly develop an infection of the nose, eye, head sinuses, the stomach and even the intestinal tract. Again, germs from a diseased mouth may be transported by the blood stream to the kidneys or heart, thus causing serious trouble frequently ending fatally. Even such extremely painful and tenacious conditions as neuritis and arthritis can often be directly traced to infections in and around the teeth.

The man or woman who respects health as the greatest of all earthly assets will do well to heed the ordinary principles of mouth hygiene; being conscientiously adhered to, they can be relied upon to protect against the conditions that take such a tremendous and unnecessary toll.

Thoroughly to cleanse the teeth daily by toothbrush and dental floss, and religiously to seek a periodic dental examination at least semi-annually, oftener if required, is merely practicing a common sense procedure which returns incalculable dividends.

FAILURES DECLINE

AUSTIN, Texas, Aug. 30.—According to the weekly reports received by The University of Texas Bureau of Business Research, only 17 commercial failures occurred in Texas during July, a decline of 59 per cent from the 41 failures in July last year. Liabilities of \$261,000 were 64 per cent below those of a year ago. The average liabilities per failure, totaling \$15,353, was 14 per cent below that of last year.

Texas Professor Hooks Up Amplifier To Make Heart Beat Audible In Lecture Room

AUSTIN, Texas, Aug. 20—An amplifying device which will make a heart-beat audible through a large lecture room is being hooked up by Dr. Paul Boner, professor of physics at The University of Texas.

The same device will make audible the movement of the molecules in a piece of iron, and the noise created by electrons jostling each other in a piece of wire.

This large amplifier unit is being devised by Dr. Boner as a part of his program for making Physics I, the elementary course in the subject of more interest to freshmen students. This piece of apparatus, along with others of almost equally astonishing versatility, will be demonstrated in the lecture room for the first time early this fall.

Some of the devices to be shown will be largely "tricks" of the trade, but others will have serious scientific value, and all will be based on technical fundamentals of the physical sciences.

This amplifying system will also be used in connection with the high quality, wide-range phonograph which the department owns. The maximum amplification of the device will be ten to the eighth power, an almost inconceivable ratio for the lay mind, and the distortion will be extremely small, Dr. Boner said.

Texas Professor Hooks Up Amplifier To Make Heart Beat Audible In Lecture Room

AUSTIN, Texas, Aug. 30—An amplifying device which will make a heart-beat audible through a large lecture room is being "hooked up" by Dr. Paul Boner, professor of physics at The University of Texas.

The same device will make audible the movement of the molecules in a piece of iron, and the noise created by electrons jostling each other in a piece of wire.

This large amplifier unit is being devised by Dr. Boner as a part of his program for making Physics 1, the elementary course in the subject of more interest to freshmen students. This piece of apparatus, along with others of almost equally astonishing versatility, will be demonstrated in the lecture room for the first time early this fall.

Some of the devices to be shown will be largely "tricks" of the trade, but others will have serious scientific value, and all will be based on technical fundamentals of the physical sciences.

This amplifying system will also be used in connection with the high quality, wide-range phonograph which the department owns. The maximum amplification of the device will be ten to the eighteenth power, an almost inconceivable ratio for the lay mind, and the distortion will be extremely small, Dr. Boner said.

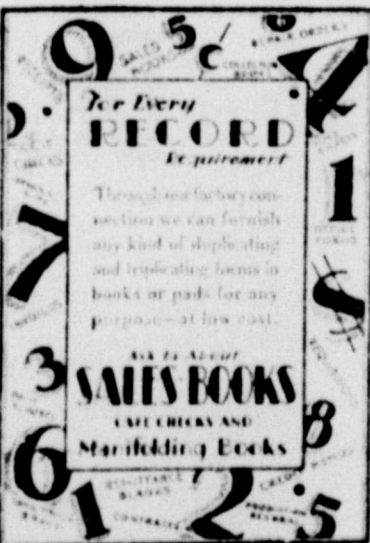
