Administration. "We expect to buy at least 4 for Temple to be with her million cattle, and possibly 7 mile. Madye Jo Bailey, who is lion" said Secretary of Agriculture Henry A. Wallace, "and if

the plants are able to process them at an average rate of 200,000 a week, the job will take six months."

Government cattle purchases to date amount to approximately 1,-500,000 head and the last figures indicated that fewer than 700,000 had been shipped to packing plants.

Processing plants handling Gov ernment cattle are being pushed to the limit of their facilities, and in some instances are working on 24-hour shifts to handle the cat-

Voters To Decide **Eight Amendments**

Proposed Changes In MRS. WALTER AUGUSTINE State Constitution Are Published

shall be made at the general election to be held in November. The text of the eight proposed constitutional amendments is being pub lished in this issue of The Stockcounty of the state to thoroughly and Mrs. Douglas Kirby. acquaint the voters with the issues involved.

One of the most important of the amendments from the standpoint of the peeople of Crockett County and the other sixteen coun ties containing lands of the University of Texas is House Joint Resolution No. 30, which provides that University lands shall be taxed for county and school purposes and that such taxes shall be remitted from the available funds of the University instead of from the general fund as at present for county purposes. This amendment makes two changes in the amendment passed two years ago in that it extends the taxation for school arposes and makes payment from the University funds instead of

Abolish Fee System

from the state's geenral revenue

Another important amendment in the list of proposed changes is that of abolishing the fee system for compensating district and county officers. The amendment as written would abolish the fee system in counties over 20,000 population immediately and would give the Commissioners Court authority to abolish fees and substitute a salary for officers in smaller counties.

Other amendments cover various subjects. One would give the legislature authority by a twothird vote of both houses to create new counties and change the boundaries of existing counties. Another would give the Commisioners Court general management and control of county affairs and the legislature authority to combine certain county offices and make other changes in county government in the interest of

Senate Joint Resolution No. 13 would limit the amount to be collected and expended by the state government each biennium to \$22.50 per capita. Another would give Home Rule cities the right to amend their charters every twelve months and another would give them authority to amend charters to extend the term of city officers to four years. Senate Joint Resolution No. 16 provides for equal

and uniform taxation of real es tate and other classifications of property and giving the legisla-ture power to levy poll taxes, occupation taxes and income taxes.
