Public Health Assn. In 12th Annual Meet At Abilene Oct. 3-5

AUSTIN, Texas, Sept. 25—The Twelfth Annual Meeting of the Texas Public Health Association will be held at the Wooten Hotel in Abilene, October 3-5, stated Dr. T. J. McCamant, President. The meeting is open to physicians, health officers, nurses, sanitarians and others interested in public health.

Besides the general meeting, there will be special sections for nurses, laboratory workers, and full time health officers. Among the speakers will be Dr. John W. Brown, State Health Officer; Dr. Lewis C. Crabbe; E. A. Baugh; Senator J. W. E. H. Beck, M. D.; and representatives of the United States Public Health Service, State Medical Association, Agricultural Department, American Public Health Association, and State Medical Association.

The program will consist of discussions of health work possible with relief funds, milk sanitation, water and sewage, public health nursing, health legislation, and communicable disease control. Many cities and their health workers to this meeting so that they may keep up with the new developments in their field. This will be especially true this year as much health work may be accomplished with relief funds.

2,000 Students Ask FERA Part-Time Jobs At University Texas

AUSTIN, Texas, Sept. 25—More than two thousand students applied for part-time jobs under the Federal Emergency Relief Administration at The University of Texas. The University's full quota of part-time student workers has already been approved for jobs and these places have been accepted, according to Dean V. I. Moore, chairman of the University FERA committee. A total of 428 men and 223 women, the University's full allotment on the basis of its last year's enrollment, have been assigned places. One half of these were not in school last January. Presumably, these new students were formerly holding some sort of position, however small, last year, and their attendance at the University will create a number of vacancies for other workers in the outside business world, Dean Moore pointed out.

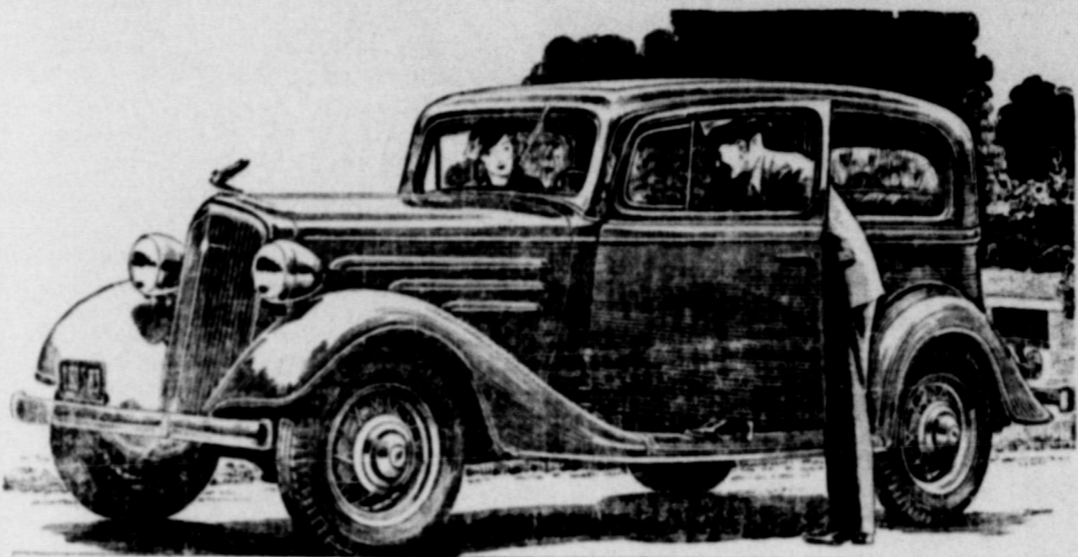

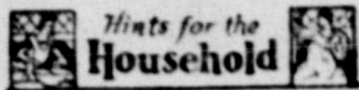

Five-Pointed Star Overcoat Button Was First Seal Of Texas

DALLAS, Tex., Sept. 25. (Special)—The first use of a five-pointed star as the emblem of Texas was in 1835 when a brass button, cut from an overcoat, was used as a seal. The large button came from the overcoat of Henry Smith, provisional governor, elected by the Texans when events were shaping themselves for independence, but at a time when the main issue was as to whether the Mexican constitution of 1824 would be observed.

Smith was named governor at a meeting held at San Felipe (Austin County). Needing some kind of a seal for official documents, he cut off one of the decorative buttons on his overcoat and it was used as the seal. The present seal of the State features a five-pointed star, and the star also is used in the Texas flag.

This historic button may or may not be in existence today. It would be a most interesting relic for exhibition in 1936, when the Centennial of Texas Independence is to be celebrated at San Antonio, Houston, Galveston, Breham, Neconoches, Huntsville, Dallas and other cities of the State identified with the early history of the Lone Star State.

California Orange Marmalade

12 navel oranges.
2 lemons.
Sugar.
Method: Peel rind and take off white and throw away. Cut up pulp of oranges and lemons. Add equal quantity of water. Let stand over night. In the morning cook fast for 20 minutes. Measure and add equal amount of sugar. Cook half hour. Stir constantly with wooden spoon. Pack in jars. Cover when cool.

Nut Frappe

1/2 envelope of gelatine.
1/2 cup of cold water.
1/2 cup of sugar.
1 cup of cooked pineapple and strawberries.
1 cup cream or evaporated milk.
3/4 cup of milk.
1 cup of chopped nuts.
White of 1 egg.

Method: Soak gelatine in cold water five minutes.

Dissolve over hot water.

Add dissolved gelatine to whipped cream.

Milk and sugar; stir in beaten egg white; add pineapple, strawberries and chopped nuts. Serve cold.

Lions Drop Opener To Kittens, 19-0, As Majority Of Youthful Squad Get First Baptism Of Fire On Gridiron

Team Concentrates On Defense For Stockton Game Sat.

Youth and inexperience combined to rob them of a victory, but Ted White's Ozona High School Lions showed some possibilities for development into a front ranking gridiron machine in their opening battle with the heavier San Angelo Kittens on the local field last Saturday afternoon. The Kittens sacked the game decisively with three touchdowns up, the final count being 19 to 0.

Next Saturday, the Lions get some more of that much needed experience when they tackle the tough Fort Stockton crew on the local grid. The Fort Stockton eleven is rated as probable winners of the district championship in their own district, drubbing Odessa 29 to 0 in their opening game last week. The Lions are given only an outside chance to win the struggle, but will show the Stockton visitors and the home rooters an improved defensive game in next Saturday's fracas.

Coach White has been drilling the lads on a defensive system that is likely to make it difficult for even superior teams to score, but will have little time the rest of this week to do much work toward improving the offensive power of the Lions. However, local fans are putting much stock in the possibilities of a good passing combination in the effective work of Cox heaving to Brown, Friend Parker and Childress. The short passes dropped in unprotected zones behind the Kitten line netted some nice gains in Saturday's game and would no doubt have accounted for at least one touchdown had they been worked to best advantage.

Material Looks Good

Albert Cox at fullback, Gene Williams and Haskell Leath at the halves and Ray Boyd calling signals formed the starting backfield of the Lions and promise some good ground-gaining material with a little more experience. The starting line with Batts Friend and Vaughn Brown at ends, Tom Everett and D. A. Parker at tackles, Capt. Leonard Freeman and Max Eppier at the guard positions and Joe Tom Davidson at center showed a fighting spirit, although outclassed by the Kitten

forwards, and as the season progresses, Coach White hopes to develop a line that will open some lanes for the backfield and present some power in stepping line plays from the opposition.

The Kittens made their first touchdown Saturday early in the engagement when a ball carrier skirted the end and ran some 40 yards for the marker. The try for point failed and in the last quarter the visitors scored two more, the first on an intercepted pass on the Ozona 30-yard line and the last on a pass and a line-buck, kicking goal for the point after the last touchdown for a total of 19 points.

Grades For First 3 Weeks Show High Averages In School
