Ozonan Named to Committee On Accident Prevention

Austin, Jan. 13-"Texas streets and highways must be made safe for public travel," Governor James V. Allred has announced the formation of the Governor's Traffic Safety Committee. Repres entative civic leaders interested in safety have been invited to serve on the committee along with various state officials.

"Auto deaths in Texas during the past 11 months totaled 1,852 according to figures released by the United States Department of Commerce," Governor Allred point! ed out. "Through the work of the Governor's Traffic Safety Committee, in coordinating official safety activities with other safety moves over the state, it seems that a drastic reduction of traffic accidents in Texas can be effected," he said.
