All persons who have reached the age of sixty years prior to January 1, 1935 are required to procure from the Tax Collector a certificate of exemption from payment of Poll-Tax in order to qualify as a voter. All persons reaching the age of 21 after January 1, 1935, and prior to January 1, 1936 are required to secure like certificates from the Tax Collector before January 31, 1936.

Thruout Texas, communities are engaged in raising the funds for Will Rogers' memorials. Here is an authentic account of how Will Rogers wrote his first newspaper material for publication.

In 1920, Charles H. (Chuck) Newell, well-known Texas newspaper executive of Dallas, Texarkana, Austin and elsewhere, was editor of Newspaper Enterprise association, a national feature service. He'd heard Rogers' wiseeracks in vaudeville, and conceived the idea of having him write a dozen or so a day on the Republican national convention at Chicago in June. They went over with a bang, and at the Democratic convention in San Francisco later, Newell again hired Will to wise-crack. That was the first acquaintance the great American news-reading public had with Rogers, and from that modest start sprang Rogers' voluminous writings, his daily news feature and his magazine articles that were eagerly read by scores of

millions. "He was as nervous about how is stuff was going to 'get over' with the newspaper readers as a high-school girl," said Newell. 'And he grinned with joy when e reports showed it was clicking all over the country.
