# Jake McCulley Dies In Japanese Prison Camp

U. S. Fighter Pilot, Hero Of Philippines, Taught School Here

Lt. J. E. McCulley, a former Ozonan and one of America's imhopeless stand of American and Filipino forces in the Philippine until America could brace herself

No further details were given in the War Department's message other than that Lt. McCulley had died in a Japanese prison camp somewhere in the Philippines.



COFFEE Stamp No. 21 valid for I pound from July 1 through July 21. Stamp No. 22 valid for 1 pound from July 22 through August 11. SHOES-Stamp No. 18 in Book 1 good for I pair of shoes through

Oct. 31 MEATS, EDIBLE FATS AND OIL, (including butter), CHEES-ES, CANNED FISH-Each holder of Book 2 allowed 16 points per week. Red stamps J, K, L, M and N expire June 30. Red stamps P. Q. 


