## Jessie Harrison, Howard Graves Are Married Saturday

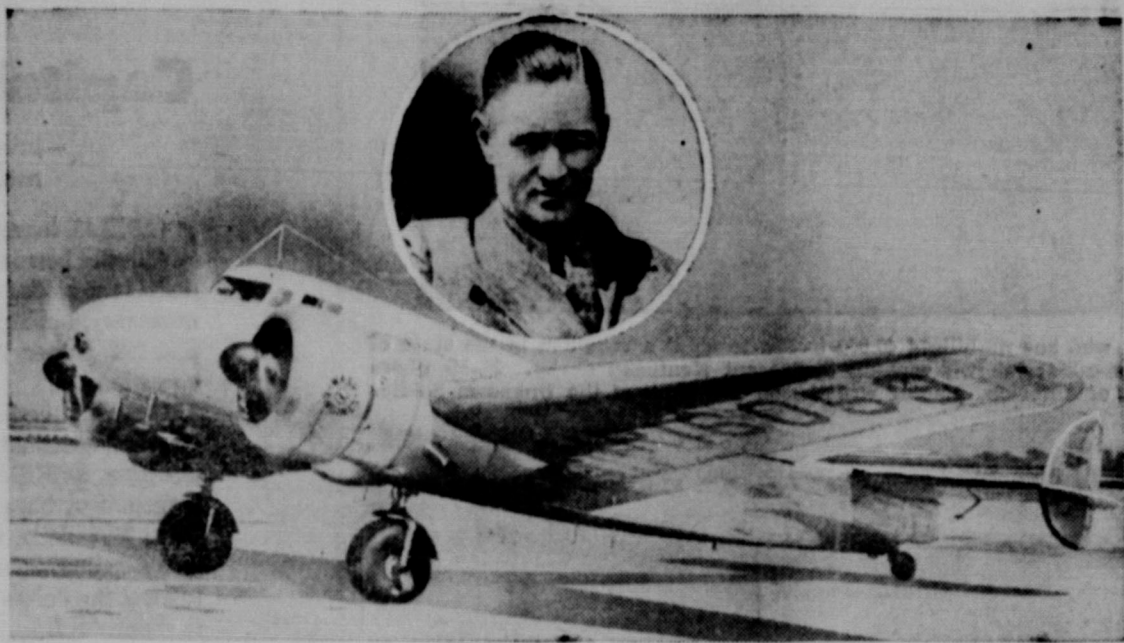

## Two-Way Atlantic Flight Takes 45 Hours



Henry T. (Dick) Merrill, inset, and the Lockheed Electra plane in which the flyer and his co-pilot John S. (Jack) Lambie completed the first commercial round trip flight across the Atlantic and the fastest two-way journey ever completed over that ocean. The total flying time was 45 hours and 24 minutes from New York to London and return. The eastward passage took 21 hours and two minutes and the westward flight took 24 hours and 22 minutes. The flyers visited London for the coronation and brought back photographs and films of the coronation ceremonies. The flyers landed in New York 35 seconds less than five days after they took off from Floyd Bennett field on the eastward flight.

## PIANO BURNS ABOARD TRUCK

### Origin Of Blaze Which Destroyed Instrument Of Mrs. Ingham Mystery

Another of those strange incidents that serve to make a living for certain cartoonists was the unexplained origin of a fire which last week destroyed a piano aboard a truck on its way from Ozona to the Ingham ranch.

The piano, belonging to Mrs. B. B. Ingham, was being taken from her town home to the ranch. Dudley Ingham driving the truck, noticed smoke seeping through the piano wrapping and stopped to investigate. When he removed quilts and a tarpaulin with which the instrument had been wrapped, it burst into flames and was soon completely consumed. The burning piano was pushed from the truck when it became apparent that the flames could not be quenched.

At least two theories have been advanced as to the cause of the blaze. One is that a match had been dropped into the piano and was fired from friction in moving the instrument. Another is the recently discovered explosive nature of accumulated house dust, which certain experimenters have found to be highly combustible.

## More Work Slated For Highway In Crockett County

### Let Contract June 4 For Seal Coat On 17.6 Miles

Asphalt seal coat is to be applied on 17.6 miles of Crockett County highways under a contract to be awarded by the State Highway Department at Austin on Friday, June 4. Notice to contractors of the proposed construction project is being advertised in this week's issue of The Stockman.

Three and four-tenths miles of the finish surfacing is to be done on Highway 27 from the east end of the Pecos River bridge toward Ozona and from a point 15 miles north of Ozona to Barnhart.

## Third Of Acreage Signed For Range Saving Inspected

### Grazing Capacity Averages 60 Units In Area Examined

Range inspectors under the Agriculture Conservation program have covered approximately one-third of the Crockett County acreage signed up for participation in the program, it was announced this week by County Agent C. J. Van Zandt.

A total of 484,408 acres have been inspected on 46 ranches scattered over the county, the agent said. Inspectors' reports on grazing capacity of these ranches and degree of infestation of range destroying plants have already been approved by the county committee, it was stated.

An average of 60 grazing units to the section has been determined for the half million acres inspected, it was reported. Under the Conservation program, the allotment will be \$1.50 per grazing unit, the money to be used in any of the various approved range practices for improvement of grazing land.

New instructions from the state committee clarifying certain questions regarding the program on which the local committee was in doubt, were received this week by the local office, the county agent reports. On the question of inspection of split ranches, where a rancher operates in two or more counties, the state committee ruled that the ranches must be inspected by the county in which application was filed, and that application must be made in the county in which a majority of the ranch is located. Where there is a near equal division, the application shall be filed in the county where headquarters are located. In order that a rancher might pool his allotment on two or more ranches for use on one, the ranches must be operated as a unit, stock transferred from one to the other, the instructions said.

Ranchers participating in the program were advised that grubbed prickly pear must be piled in piles of sufficient size to insure rotting of the plants. Such piles were estimated at between two and three feet in thickness and from six to eight feet across. Final approval for payment on cleared acreage will be withheld if the grub does not appear to be dying. Piled pear must not be placed in draws or washes.

Both types of cedar, red and white cedar, must be cleared from land for approval of clearing work, the committee ruled. Method of disposal of cedar is left to the discretion of ranchers, with burning barred.

There have been a total of 126 ranchers making application for participation in the program in this county, with approximately 1,600,000 acres represented.

way of lodging, food, clothing, car repairs and other miscellaneous items of travel, none of which can be tabulated or even accurately estimated. Summer travelers who know what a small percentage of their vacation expenses is taken up by gasoline can realize how great a sum was probably spent within the state on these other items. There can be no doubt but that this influx of out-of-state trade was profitable both to the collective and individual interests of Texans. Oklahoma led the list of

states who sent the greatest number of cars to Texas with nearly seven thousand visitors. California was second with over five thousand, and next in order were Louisiana, Illinois and Mississippi. These figures were much higher than usual because of the Centennial, since 32,131 cars crossed the state line during those four months alone. With statewide cooperation the Pan-American Exposition should prove just as successful in stirring up traffic this summer.

Capital Loans

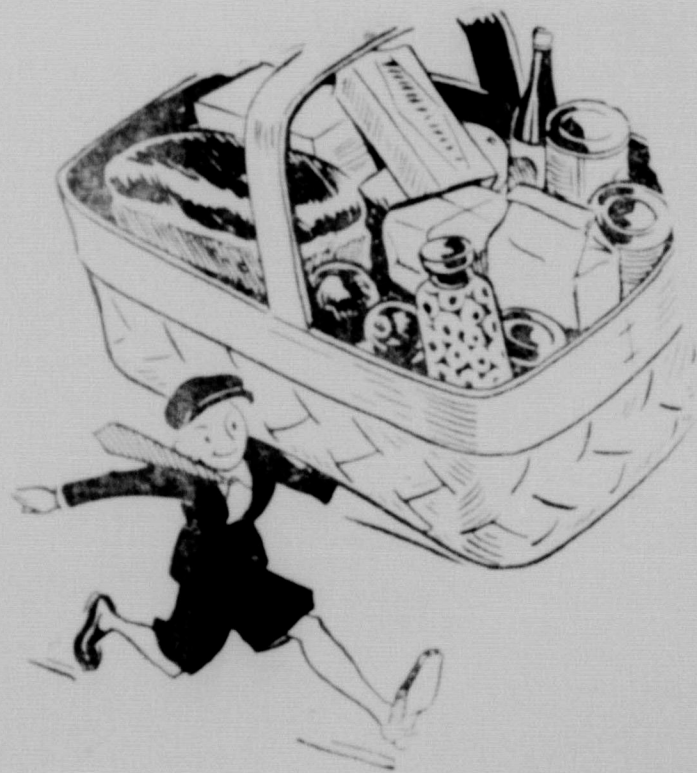

## Six Proposed Amendments To Texas Constitution Submitted To Voters

Special Election Set For August 23 To Pass On Proposals

H. J. R. No. 23  
HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION  
proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas to be known as Section 20 of Article VIII, providing that no property of any kind shall be assessed for ad valorem taxes at a greater value than its fair cash market value; and giving the Legislature power to provide that the State and all governmental or political subdivisions or taxing districts may allow a discount for payment of ad valorem taxes before the date when they would otherwise become delinquent; and providing that this Amendment shall become effective January 1, 1939; providing for an election on the question of adoption or rejection of this Amendment; providing for the proclamation and publication thereof; and making an appropriation therefor; and prescribing the form of ballot.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new Section to Article VIII to be known as Section 20 and to read as follows:

"Section 20. No property of any kind in this State shall ever be assessed for ad valorem taxes at a greater value than its fair cash market value nor shall any Board of Equalization of any governmental or political subdivision or taxing district within this State fix the value of any property for tax purposes at more than its fair cash market value; provided that in order to encourage the prompt payment of taxes, the Legislature shall have the power to provide that the taxpayer shall be allowed by the State and all governmental and political subdivisions and taxing districts of the State a three per cent (3%) discount on ad valorem taxes due the State or due any governmental or political subdivision or taxing district of the State if such taxes are paid ninety (90) days before the date when they would otherwise become delinquent; and the taxpayer shall be allowed a two per cent (2%) discount on said taxes if paid sixty (60) days before said taxes would become delinquent; and the taxpayer shall be allowed a one per cent (1%) discount if said taxes are paid thirty (30) days before they would otherwise become delinquent. This amendment shall be effective January 1, 1939. The Legislature shall pass necessary laws for the proper administration of this Section."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at a special election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the 23rd day of August, 1937, at which election all voters favoring the proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the following words:

"FOR the Amendment to the State Constitution providing that property shall never be assessed for taxes at more than its fair cash market value, and providing that in order to encourage the prompt payment of ad valorem taxes, the Legislature shall have the power to permit a discount for the payment of same before they become delinquent."

Those voters opposing said proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:

"AGAINST the Amendment to the State Constitution providing that property shall never be assessed for taxes at more than its fair cash market value, and providing that in order to encourage the prompt payment of ad valorem taxes, the Legislature shall have the power to permit a discount for the payment of same before they become delinquent."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution for Amendments thereto.

Sec. 4. The sum of Eight Thousand Dollars (\$8,000), or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State, not otherwise appropriated,

to pay the expense of such publication and election.

A JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an amendment to Article III, Section 52, of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 52d; providing that the Legislature may authorize by law, after a majority vote of the resident qualified electors owning taxable property therein, the adoption of a plan for the construction of paved roads and bridges or both in Harris County and in road districts therein; providing for the levy of a tax to pay for such construction; providing for the necessary proclamation; and appropriating funds to defray the expenses of the proclamation, publication, and election.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III, Section 52, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding thereto another section to be known as Section 52d, which shall read as follows:

"Section 52d: Upon the vote of a majority of the resident qualified electors owning rendered taxable property therein so authorizing, a county or road district may collect an annual tax for a period not exceeding five (5) years to create a fund for constructing lasting and permanent roads and bridges or both. No contract involving the expenditure of any of such fund shall be valid unless, when it is made, money shall be on hand in such fund.

"At such election, the Commissioners' Court shall submit for adoption a road plan and designate the amount of special tax to be levied; the number of years said tax is to be levied; the location, description, and character of the roads and bridges; and the estimated cost thereof. The funds raised by such taxes shall not be used for purposes other than those specified in the plan submitted to the voters. Elections may be held from time to time to extend or discontinue said plan or to increase or diminish said tax. The Legislature shall enact laws prescribing the procedure hereunder.

"The provisions of this section shall apply only to Harris County and road districts therein."

Sec. 2. The foregoing amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the State on the fourth Monday in August, 1937, at which election all voters favoring such proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the following words: "For the amendment to the Constitution providing that Harris County and any road district therein may upon a vote of the people therein adopt a road plan and levy taxes for road and bridge construction in lieu of the issuance of bonds"; those voters opposing said amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "Against the amendment to the Constitution providing that Harris County and any road district therein may upon a vote of the people therein adopt a road plan and levy taxes for road and bridge construction in lieu of the issuance of bonds."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have same published as required by the Constitution for amendments thereto.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000) or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated to pay the expense of such publication and election.

the incorporation of banking bodies and provide for the supervision and regulation of same; providing for all of the capital stock to be subscribed and paid for before charter issued; restricting foreign corporations from doing banking business; restricting corporate business to one place.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 16, Article XVI, of the Constitution of Texas, be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 16. The Legislature shall by general laws, authorize the incorporation of corporate bodies with banking and discounting privileges, and shall provide for a system of State supervision, regulation and control of such bodies which will adequately protect and secure the depositors and creditors thereof.

"No such corporate body shall be chartered until all of the authorized capital stock has been subscribed and paid for in full in cash. Such body corporate shall not be authorized to engage in business at more than one place which shall be designated in its charter.

"No foreign corporation, other than the national banks of the United States, shall be permitted to exercise banking or discounting privileges in this State."

Sec. 2. The foregoing amendment to the Constitution shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the fourth Monday in August, 1937. At this election all voters favoring the proposed amendment shall write, or have printed, on their ballots the following words:

"For the amendment of Section 16 to Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing for the amount of the liability of stock-holders in State banks."

Those voters opposing said amendment shall write, or have printed, on their ballots the following words:

"Against the amendment of Section 16 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing for the amount of the liability of stock-holders in State banks."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for such election, and to have same published as required by the Constitution and the amendments thereto.

"Section 51-c. The Legislature shall have the power by General Laws to provide, under such limitations and regulations and restrictions as may be by the Legislature deemed expedient, for assistance to the needy blind over the age of twenty-one (21) years, and for the payment of same not to exceed Fifteen Dollars (\$15) per month per person; such assistance or aid to be granted only to actual bona fide citizens of Texas; provided that no habitual criminal and no habitual drunkard and no inmate of any State supported institution, while such inmate, shall be eligible for such assistance to the needy blind over the age of twenty-one (21) years; provided, further, that the requirements for the length of time of actual residence in Texas shall never be less than five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for assistance to the needy blind over the age of twenty-one (21) years; and continuously for one year immediately preceding such application.

"The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Government of the United States such financial aid for assistance to the needy blind as that Government may offer not inconsistent with the restrictions hereinabove provided."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters:

"AGAINST the Amendment to the State Constitution providing for assistance to the needy blind over the age of twenty-one (21) years, not to exceed Fifteen Dollars (\$15) per month per person, and providing for acceptance from the Government of the United States of America financial aid for such payment."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution for Amendments thereto.

Sec. 4. The sum of Nine Thousand Dollars (\$9,000), or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State, not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

Section 3. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and existing laws of the State.

Section 4. The sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000) or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the treasury of the state not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of said publication and election."

### NOBODY'S BUSINESS

BY JULIAN CAPERS JR.

Austin—With a strangely mixed record of good and bad legislation, the 45th legislature's regular session was brought to a finish in the wee hours of Sunday morning, as members prepared to make a flying visit home and resume their efforts at the next called session scheduled by Gov. Allred for Thursday of this week.

The governor specified nothing at repeal of pari-mutual betting on horse races in his call, but pointed out omission of the usual reservation of his right to submit other matters did not preclude his doing that thing, provided progress on the race repeal measure was sufficient.

Bryan Bradbury of Abilene, author of the repeal bill in the house, planned to hold one-day hearings Friday, and report the bill to the house floor immediately. Prompt passage by the house on a large vote was foreseen, and the senate will do remained doubtful. Frank Rawlings, shrewd senator from Tarrant county, who single handed blocked action thru the special session of the senate, was expected to resume the fight to prevent a senate vote.

Appropriations Up

Appropriation bills rushed thru conference committees in the day-

ing hours of the session, further complicated the state's woful financial condition. Budget appropriations for the biennium were hiked approximately \$10,000,000 total, as forecast in this column last week. John Redditt, chairman of the senate finance committee, constant comforter of the special interest's lobby, which fears taxation, however, promptly came to bat with an optimistic statement that he believed only \$5,000,000 to \$7,500,000 additional revenue would be necessary despite the current 10 million dollar deficit and the upped appropriations.

DeBerry Is Confirmed

Nomination by Gov. Allred of Tom DeBerry, former senator from Red River, to succeed John Wallace as member of the board of control on Jan. 1, 1938, was confirmed by the senate, but brought out much political discussion. Allred's unprecedented action in submitting this and other nominations far in advance of vacancies in the offices brought the question on the senate floor as to whether the governor planned to resign to accept a federal judgeship. This Allred denied, but his denial was carefully worded, and served merely to strengthen the growing belief here that he will quit and take the federal post if it is offered him. Wild rumors that the deal had fallen thru because the national administration had determined to "punish" Tom Connally, junior senator, for his opposition to the Roosevelt court plan were discounted here by

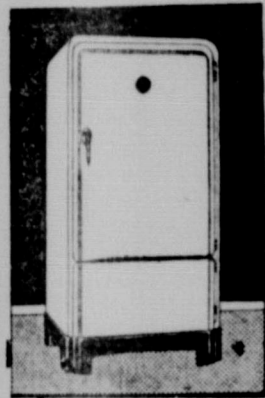

University of Texas Three Million Dollar Administration-Library Building Completed



With only a few minor details yet to be attended to, the new unit of the Administration-Library Building of The University of Texas, located in the center of the main campus at Austin, is ready for occupancy. The cost of the two units comprising the imposing structure, including fixtures and furniture, totaled approximately three million dollars. Not a penny of this sum came from the taxpayers. From an architectural standpoint, the tower, 308 feet high, with its 28 book-stack stories, is its outstanding feature. Its higher elevation causes it to rise several feet above the Capitol dome. In addition to book stacks, its space will be devoted to offices for a number of members of the faculty. The new unit of the building contains the offices of the president, registrar, auditor, comptroller, librarian, and dean of the College of Arts and Sciences. Among the many attractive features are two rooms, exposed on three sides, and entirely glass-enclosed, for pleasure reading. Students who attend the 1937 summer session will be the first to have opportunity to use the building in its completed form.
