Ozona Resident 37 Years Buried Monday Morning

Body Of Tom Gilbert, Laid To Rest; Heart Attack Fatal

The body of Thomas Benjamin Gilbert, 72, a resident of Crockett County thirty-seven years, was laid to rest in Cedar Hill cemetery Monday morning following funeral services conducted at the family residence here.

Mr. Gilbert died at 2:45 o'clock Monday morning as a result of a heart attack. He had been in failing health for a number of recent years, but had remained active until a few weeks ago.

Funeral services were conducted at the home by the Rev. W. D. Beck of Arlington, Texas, former minister of Ozona Church of Christ, with the Rev. James F. Beck, minister of the Church of Christ, assisting. Members of the Masonic lodge, of which Mr. Gilbert had been a member for forty years, conducted graveside rites. Oberkampfs mortuary direct services.

Mr. Gilbert was born in Louisiana September 15, 1864. He came to Texas when he was four years old. He was married at Sonora December 23, 1895, to Miss Nettie Hill. Five years later the couple moved to Ozona to make their home and have lived here continuously since.

Surviving are the widow and children, four daughters, Mrs. John Williams of Dryden, Mrs. Met Ross of Sanderson, Mrs. Elie Armentrout of Ozona, and Mrs. Ezra Trotter of Ozona, and two sons, Ben Gilbert of Sanderson, and Afton Gilbert of Los Angeles, Calif. Ten grand children and one great grand child also survive. All of the children were present for the funeral except Afton Gilbert, who was unable to come from California.

Crockett School Attendance Equal 409 School Years

Annual Report Gives Interesting Figures On Term

Pupils of Crockett County schools last year attended school a total of 409 school years in aggregate pupil-day attendance.

This is an interesting side-light on totals for the school year contained in the annual report to the State Department of Education prepared by C. S. Denham, superintendent.

The total enrollment of pupils was 648, with 532 of this number in elementary grades and 116 in high school. These pupils attended school a total of 71,575 days, with aggregate absences numbering 359 days.

Salary totals for the year reached \$26,665, an increase of \$3,325 over the 1935-36 year by reason of salary increases granted at the beginning of the term. Based on 22 teaching positions in the county, the annual salary average was \$212 per teacher.

Based on total salaries of elementary teachers and the average daily attendance in grade school, the cost per pupil in the grades was \$52, while in the high school the cost was \$83 per pupil. The average cost per pupil for the year, including all salaries, was \$59.

Last year's scholastic enrollment total was 729 pupils, with an increase of five enrolled this year, or a total of 734.

Former Crockett Cowboy, Now U. S. Marine Writes Of Experiences Aboard Airplane Carrier Ship, Saratoga, In Pacific Waters

An interesting account of the doings of Uncle Sam's Navy and Marine Corps lads is contained in a letter received this week by The Stockman from W. W. Hillis, former West Texas cowboy, now in the U. S. Marine Corps, on duty aboard the U. S. S. Saratoga, Navy airplane carrier ship. The letter was written "at sea" June 4.

Devil-Dog Hillis subscribed to the Stockman last year and in sending in his renewal, took occasion to write a brief letter recounting some of his recent experiences.

"Just a line to let you know I enjoy your paper very much," the letter opens. "We have been out to sea most of the time since March. We are going to Long Beach now for a three-weeks stop, then to Bremerton for three months in the Navy yard for general overhaul. Have been up to San Francisco for the opening of the bridge. We got back to the States May 28 from Hawaii and Midway Islands.

We lost two men in an airplane crash between Midway Islands and Honolulu. We never found planes nor men. They crashed a half mile off our stern in late afternoon. One of the destroyers stood by for several hours, but they never came up.

"We have 2100 men aboard now. Around 700 will get off in San Diego tomorrow noon. They are pilots and plane handlers. In the last battle practice we had, the gun I was on had the luck to make an E, or Expert. We fired at a target about 2000 yards away. The target is 8 x 8 feet square. We have to make eight hits in thirty-two seconds to score an E. Ours was the only gun to make an E out of 12 guns on the ship."

West Sails For Round-The-World Tour Thru Summer

Mr. and Mrs. W. E. West plan to sail today from San Francisco for a round-the-world tour. They will spend a month in a tour of China, Japan, Korea, Manchukuo, and then to India, Burma, Egypt, Malta, and to France. In the fall, they will leave Cherbourg to land in Montreal.

Although this will be their first round-the-world trip, it will be Mr. and Mrs. West's thirteenth crossing of the Atlantic. Their first crossing of the Atlantic was in 1926. However, they had spent the summer of 1924 in the Hawaiian Islands and that of 1925 in Alaska. Again in 1927 they visited England and France, and in 1929, 1930, 1931, and 1933 they again went abroad.

Organization 4-H Club For Boys Is Crockett Project

County Agent Plans for Forming Group This Summer

Organization of a 4-H Club for boys of Crockett County this summer is being considered by County Agent C. J. Van Zandt, and if enough interest on the part of boys and their parents is shown, enrollments will be taken starting at once.

Extensive discussion of the work of the 4-H clubs will be heard at the annual Ranchmen's Round-Up to be held June 24 and 25 at the Ranch Experiment Station near Sonora and the Crockett County agent plans to enlist as many local boys and their parents to attend this meeting as possible.

County agents of the area are already planning a 4-H Club show for 1938 to be held at Sonora, and Mr. Van Zandt is anxious to get the work under way in this county so that the Crockett Club would be as far advanced as any in the area and would stand an equal chance in the show. The Sutton County 4-H Club, already organized with 16 members, plans a wool show next Spring and clubs in counties adjoining Crockett are making plans for a club encampment this summer.

Soaking Rains Worth Millions To Ranch Area

2 1/4 Inches Fall Regis- tered Here In Two Rains

Drouth breaking rains the past week, soaking practically all of the livestock area of West Texas, will prove worth millions to the industry in bringing relief to some sections that through lack of sufficient moisture through the spring were facing a serious situation.

The section to the south of Ozona, missing most of the previous rains and suffering from the drouth, were included in the rains of the past week, ranchers in that section reporting from an inch to two inches fall.

The total precipitation here from Thursday through Sunday was 2 1/4 inches, Thursday night's fall amounted to 1 1/4 inches and the rain early Sunday morning registered another inch.

Crockett Teachers To Draw \$6,092 In Summer Salaries

Under a plan adopted by the school board at the beginning of last school year whereby teachers are paid the year round instead of the nine school months, teachers in the Crockett County system will draw a total of \$6,092 in salaries this summer, according to figures taken from Supt. C. S. Denham's annual report.

Under this plan, teachers' annual salaries are divided into twelve equal parts and this amount is paid each month. The system has been found satisfactory and helpful to the teachers and will be continued next year, officials said.

SELECT QUEEN TO RULE OVER OZONA'S SHOW

Her Majesty To Be Se- lected By Popular Balloting

INVITE DUCHESSES

25 West Texas Towns Invited To Send Representatives

Her Majesty, the Queen of Crockett, will rule over the festivities at the tenth annual Crockett County Rodeo, Race Meet, Stock Show and Sale here July 1, 2 and 3.

In the court of the ruling queen will be duchesses from the various provinces of the realm of West Texas, all gathered for the coronation of Her Majesty, who is to be elevated to the royal status in the next three weeks by popular ballot.

Invitations have gone out this week from the Coronation Committee of the Fair Association to some twenty-five West Texas towns inviting them to select duchesses to be presented at the Queen's Court here the evening of the opening day of the tenth annual show, July 1. In addition to the visiting duchesses and their escorts, the Queen will select a group of her maids in waiting, who will step into the coronation spotlight along with Her Majesty and the visiting dignitaries.

Chosen By Vote

Popular vote of residents of Crockett County will determine the selection of the Crockett Queen. Balloting is to begin at once and continue until shortly before the show, the closing date to be announced by the committee. Each person in the county will be entitled to one vote, and every vote cast must be signed by the voter. Unsigned ballots will not be counted, it was announced.

Elsewhere on the front page of this paper appears a copy of ballot form which may be used in voting. A copy of this form may be made, the only requirement being that each vote bear the signature of the voter.

Health Dept. Gives Advice On Summer Care Of Infants

Austin, June 9—The season of the year when the most complaints are received on account of diarrhea and dysentery or "Summer Complaint" is here and the Texas State Department of Health has issued a warning to parents in regard to this, and offers the following suggestions to prevent its occurrence among babies. The chief causes of diarrhea include impure milk, water and contaminated foods, overheating, fever from any cause, too much sugar or cream in the diet, overfeeding and underfeeding.

Mother's milk is the safest food. However, if other milk must be used, the supply should be clean and pure. The water should be clean, pure and boiled. Any other articles of food should be fresh and clean and no unsuitable articles of food such as cake and candy should be given.

If a feeding formula is used, it should be one prescribed by a physician and it must be prepared with extreme attention to cleanliness and kept cold until used. The baby should be fed at regular intervals and should not be forced to eat when he is not hungry. The

baby should be kept cool and comfortable in hot weather, should not be overclothed, and should be given plenty of clean water to drink. Any infections which develop in the nose, throat, ears or other organs should receive prompt attention from a physician.

Know Texas News Bureau Texas State College for Women

Denton, June 9—Summer travelers who feel the call of the "wide open spaces" must, of course, look to the West to find a vacation spot. Texas' Panhandle, painted with the glowing colors of its cowboy legends, offers a varied bill of fare to the visitor.

Probably the most inclusive route through the Northwest section of the state begins at Fort Worth on Federal highways 81 and 370, passes on through Wichita Falls to Amarillo. After a circle of the Panhandle, it turns south through Plainview and Lubbock.

Remains of ancient Indian cultures are glimpsed by the tourist in the eastern corner. Then, traveling along the scenic Canadian river and southward he comes upon the land which formed the well known XIT ranch, a 3,000,000 acre tract which was paid for the building of the state capitol. Just a remnant now remains.

Another large tract is the Goodnight ranch in the lower Palo Duro Valley southeast of Amarillo. Nearby is a state park of 15,000 acres, and also a museum of relics collected by the Panhandle Historical Society.

Although most of the great old ranches are being replaced by fields of wheat and cotton, and more recently by oil and gas fields, between the high plains and Fort Worth are four ranches large enough to deserve mention—Spur, 6666, Matador, and Waggoner. In the nearby towns rodeos are held throughout the summer.

The territory of most historical importance is around Albany, Throckmorton and Graham, where Forts Richardson, Belknap and Griffin are located. These are among the most famous of the old frontier forts.

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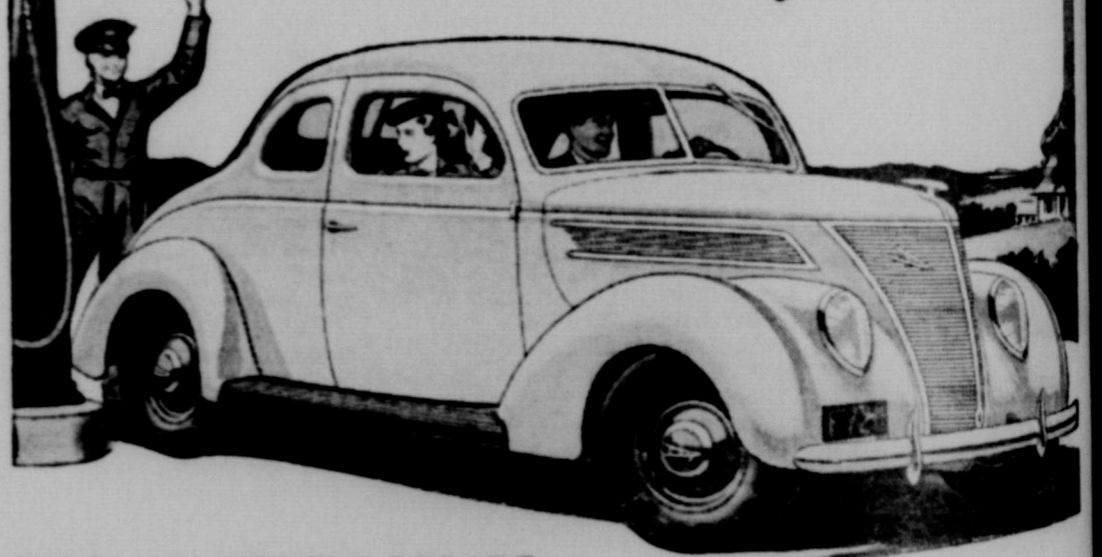

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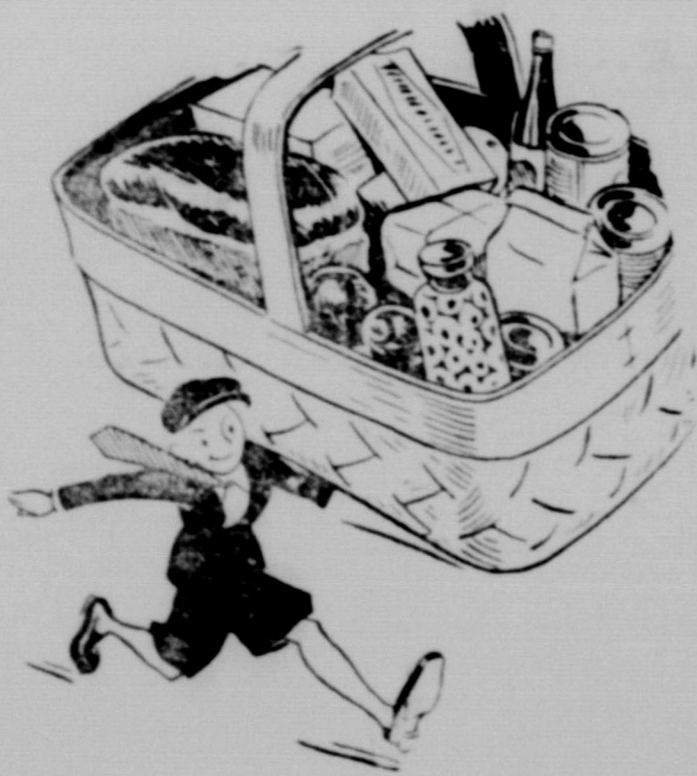

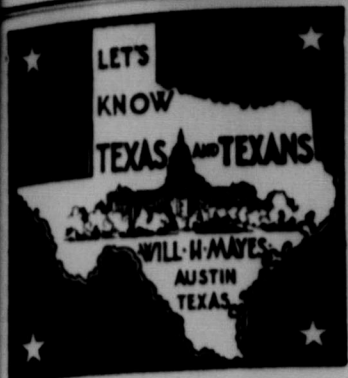

In this column answers will be given to inquiries as to Texas history and other matters pertaining to the State and its people. Address inquiries to Will H. Mayes, Austin, Texas.

Q. What is the present motor truck load limit on Texas highways?
A. Seven thousand pounds.

Q. When was Richard Coke elected governor of Texas and by what vote over whom?
A. Coke was elected December 2, 1873, by a vote of 85,549 over Edmund J. Davis, who received 42,633 votes.

Q. Where is "Danevang" and how did it get the name?
A. "Danevang" is a Danish settlement and postoffice in Wharton County, settled in the 1880's by immigrants from Denmark. The name is said to mean "Dane Meadow."

Q. What Texan went to New Orleans in the fall of 1835 to enlist men in the Texas service?
A. Adolphus Sterne, a hotel proprietor at Nacogdoches, who assisted much in equipping and financing the men.

Q. What was the first organized force to come from the United States to assist Texas in the Mexican revolution?
A. Two small companies known as the "New Orleans Grays", one

under command of Major R. C. Norris and Capt. Wm. G. Cooke, the other commanded by Capt. Thos. H. Breese. These companies reached San Antonio by different routes in time to have a part in the siege and capture of San Antonio in the fall of 1835. There were only 64 of these men, and although they were enlisted at New Orleans, they were from twelve different states and five foreign countries.

Q. Where is John Tarleton Agricultural College located, who is its president and what is the attendance?
A. It is a state school at Stephenville, a branch of Texas A. & M. College, with J. Thomas Davis, dean of the faculty. The attendance at the long session is approximately 1,000, that of the summer school about 500. There were 128 graduates at the session recently closed.

Q. What percentage of Texas farmers have incomes of less than \$400,000 a year?
A. The Resettlement Administration finds that more than 18 per cent have incomes ranging from \$400.00 down.

Q. What will be the height of the Neches River bridge, under construction at Port Arthur, and what will it cost?
A. It will be 230 feet high, the sixth highest bridge in the United States, and will cost \$2,750,000 when completed.

Q. Who was Alexander (Sandy) Horton mentioned in some histories as chief adviser to Sam Houston?
A. Col. Hoyton was aide to Houston at San Jacinto and otherwise prominent in the Texas revolution. Born in North Carolina in 1810, he came to Texas with his mother, in 1824, his father having died in Louisiana en route. The family settled at Ayish Bayou. He was in Jas. W. Bulloch's command that defeated Gen. Pledras at Nacogdoches, Aug. 2, 1832; was a member of the San Felipe consultation of 1835; accompanied Houston as aide from Washington-on-the-Brazos to Gonzales; in the Cherokee War of 1839; marshal of Republic, four times sheriff at San Augustine, mayor, custom collector.

Q. Who surveyed the town of Gonzales and who was its first settler?
A. James Kerr, who resigned a state senatorship in Missouri, and six assistants, made the survey in August, 1825, and named the town for Don Rafael Gonzales, provincial governor of Coahuila and Texas. Francis Berry, the first settler, joined them a few weeks later, these then being the only Anglo-Americans west of the Colorado River.

Q. Where and when did Col. Alexander Horton die and how has the State honored his memory?
A. Col. Horton died at his home at San Augustine, Jan. 11, 1894, and the State in 1929 erected a monument to him and his wife at San Augustine.

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Six Proposed Amendments To Texas Constitution Submitted To Voters

Special Election Set For August 23 To Pass On Proposals

H. J. R. No. 23
HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION
 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas to be known as Section 20 of Article VIII, providing that no property of any kind shall be assessed for ad valorem taxes at a greater value than its fair cash market value; and giving the Legislature power to provide that the State and all governmental or political subdivisions or taxing districts may allow a discount for payment of ad valorem taxes before the date when they would otherwise become delinquent; and providing that this Amendment shall become effective January 1, 1939; providing for an election on the question of adoption or rejection of this Amendment; providing for the proclamation and publication thereof; and making an appropriation therefor; and prescribing the form of ballot.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new Section to Article VIII to be known as Section 20 and to read as follows:

"Section 20. No property of any kind in this State shall ever be assessed for ad valorem taxes at a greater value than its fair cash market value nor shall any Board of Equalization of any governmental or political subdivision or taxing district within this State fix the value of any property for tax purposes at more than its fair cash market value; provided that in order to encourage the prompt payment of taxes, the Legislature shall have the power to provide that the taxpayer shall be allowed by the State and all governmental and political subdivisions and taxing districts of the State a three per cent (3%) discount on ad valorem taxes due the State or due any governmental or political subdivision or taxing district of the State if such taxes are paid ninety (90) days before the date when they would otherwise become delinquent; and the taxpayer shall be allowed a one per cent (1%) discount if said taxes are paid thirty (30) days before they would otherwise become delinquent. This amendment shall be effective January 1, 1939. The Legislature shall pass necessary laws for the proper administration of this Section."

Sec. 2. "AGAINST the Amendment to the State Constitution providing that property shall never be assessed for taxes at more than its fair cash market value, and providing that in order to encourage the prompt payment of ad valorem taxes, the Legislature shall have the power to permit a discount for the payment of same before they become delinquent."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

No contract involving the expenditure of any of such fund shall be valid unless, when it is made, money shall be on hand in such fund.

"At such election, the Commissioners' Court shall submit for adoption a road plan and designate the amount of special tax to be levied; the number of years said tax is to be levied; the location, description, and character of the roads and bridges; and the estimated cost thereof. The funds raised by such taxes shall not be used for purposes other than those specified in the plan submitted to the voters. Elections may be held from time to time to extend or discontinue said plan or to increase or diminish said tax. The Legislature shall enact laws prescribing the procedure hereunder.

"The provisions of this section shall apply only to Harris County and road districts therein."

Sec. 2. The foregoing amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the State on the fourth Monday in August, 1937, at which election all voters favoring such proposed Amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "For the amendment to the Constitution providing that Harris County and any road district therein may upon a vote of the people therein adopt a road plan and levy taxes for road and bridge construction in lieu of the issuance of bonds"; those voters opposing said amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "Against the amendment to the Constitution providing that Harris County and any road district therein may upon a vote of the people therein adopt a road plan and levy taxes for road and bridge construction in lieu of the issuance of bonds."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have same published as required by the Constitution for amendments thereto.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000) or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated to pay the expense of such publication and election.

Formula For Red Ant Extermination Is Given By County Agent; Campaign Urged

A campaign to exterminate red ants is being urged by County Agent C. J. Van Zandt. Ant beds are more numerous this spring than in many years, and the county agent has recommended a treatment for beds that will kill the pests.

From two to three ounces of carbon bisulphide, or "highlife", poured into the ant hole and promptly covered will kill all ants in the hole, he said. Eggs in the ant nest will hatch in from a week to ten days and if a new treatment is applied immediately the colony will be destroyed for all time.

Now, after the rains, is an ideal time for killing ants. Mr. Van Zandt said. The ground being wet prevents too rapid absorption of the fluid and results in more effective treatment. In case the

ground is dry, the area around the hole and the hole itself should first be soaked and the carbon bisulphide then poured into the hole. The hole should then be covered, either with dirt or a tin can to make it airtight. The gas from the volatile liquid, being heavier than air, sinks to the bottom of the hole and destroys the ants. One should be sure to get the liquid into all entrances to the bed, the agent said. Numerous ant beds at the fair grounds should be given this treatment before the show opening in July.

In the eighth grade, a new general mathematics text will replace present course in algebra. Under the new arrangement Algebra I will be taught in the ninth grade and Algebra II discontinued. Other new books for high school include texts in Spanish, general science and biology.

A total of 942 books have been boxed and shipped back to the State Department for exchange.

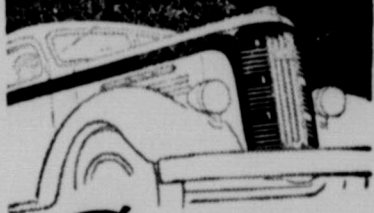

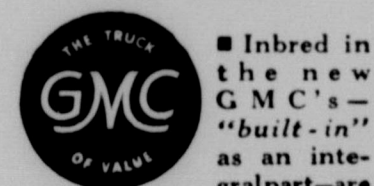

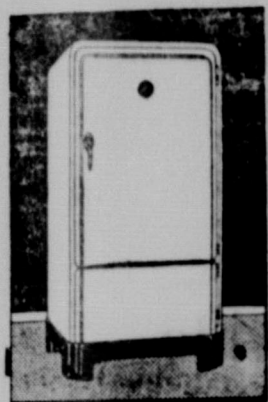
