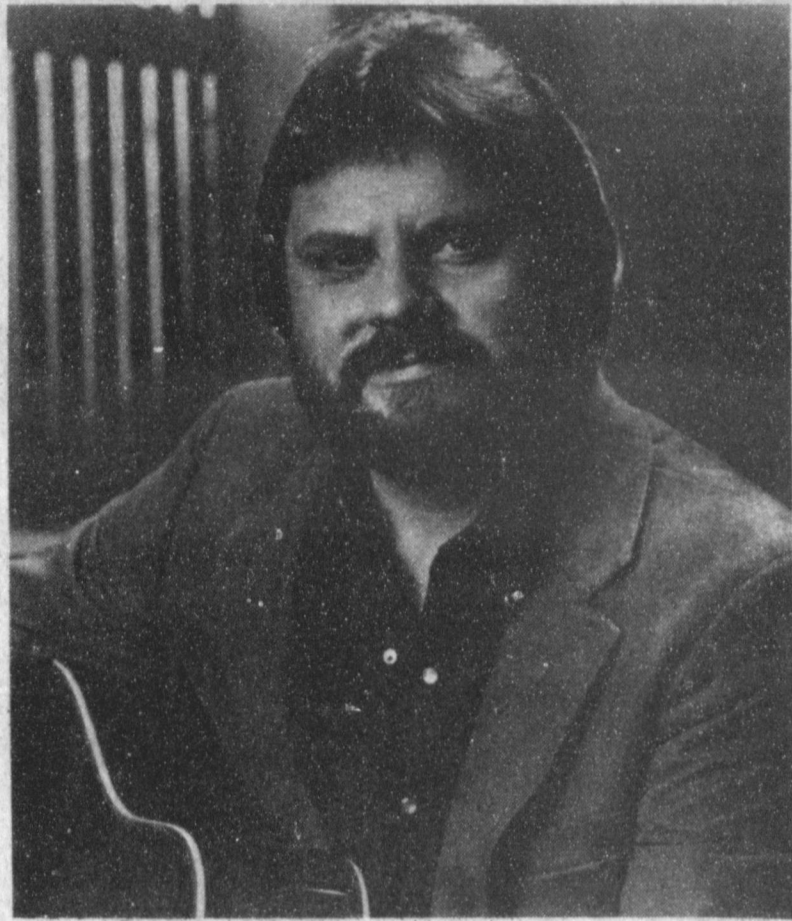
Deadline for the Christmas card project is Monday, December 16, so be sure to include yourself and your family.

Dogs trained by Mardis are bred to herd sheep, and for competition. He shows all over Texas, especially in the Waco area, and has shown in California during the fall in the \$10,000 Sheep Dog Futurity.

Parade Entry Deadline Near For December 7

"Christmas is For..." is the theme of the annual Christmas Parade, scheduled for Saturday, December 7, at 10 a.m., says Toni Eagle, manager of the Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture.

Parade entries are being accepted at this time, and the deadline for entering the parade is fast approaching, she reminded. If you plan to enter the parade in any of the divisions, you are asked to be sure to meet the Friday, November 22 deadline.

All persons entering the float division must have the name of the sponsoring club or organization on each side; including the name or theme of the float.

For the antique cars and other cars, all entries must have signs indicating the make, model and year displayed on both sides, or the rear of the vehicle. The sign should also give the name of the owner and/or driver. Cars carrying dignitaries should have a sign or signs indicating who the dignitaries are, by both title and name, prominently displayed.

Riding clubs will be judged by rules of the American Association of Sherriff Posses and Riding Clubs.

All commercial entries are required to have signs on both sides of the entry with the name of the sponsoring business, also, should have the theme of the entry.

Individual riders or walkers will be grouped according to sameness of the entries, if they are on bikes, mules, or horses, in wagons, on foot, or otherwise. Mules will be judged on uniformity of a pair or group, including, grooming, uniformed, tack, gear, showmanship and parade ability.

All parade entries are asked to be at the Boy Scout Grounds on South Main Street no later than 9 a.m. on the day of the parade.

During a regular monthly staff meeting Thursday afternoon, Muleshoe physicians apparently presented West Plains Medical Center Hospital administrator Jack Reamy a list of proposals.

The administrator told The Journal Friday morning that he had received a list of proposals from the physicians, but said, "I do not feel at this time it is appropriate to comment. We are meeting with the physicians and are attempting to work out a solution to the problems, but, until a decision is reached, I can make no comment."

However, the administrator said that as soon as a solution is worked out to the satisfaction of both the physicians and Westworld Community Healthcare, Inc., he will notify The Journal immediately.

Also, on Friday morning, Dr. Arturo Gonzales called The Journal office and asked for a 'Letter to the Editor,' to be published. Dr. Gonzales has denied that he, at any time, has talked with any reporter, or representative, from the Lubbock paper.

(See 'Letter to the Editor' - this issue of The Bailey County Journal.) Daily charges for the patients in the hospital has created controversy, that spilled over to the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal, who wrote a long front page story in the Sunday, November 10, edition.

A follow-up story, about the physician's staff meeting, was on the front page of the Friday, November 15, edition of the same paper.

Not only hospital daily charges, but the controversy concerning West Plains Medical Center and Blue Cross and Blue Shield of Texas, were also highlighted in the Sunday paper.

According to the Lubbock paper, the physicians presented the following proposals:

- A true, valid price-lowering policy that is competitive with surrounding community hospitals
- A true, valid price-lowering policy that is competitive with surrounding community hospitals and acceptable to area residents.
- Making an agreeable arrangement with Blue Cross and Blue Shield of Texas Inc. to guarantee hospital and physician coverage for area patients.
- Beginning an aggressive public relations campaign to recapture business lost as a consequence of the prior policy.
- Guaranteeing a trained and sufficient number of business office personnel for management of physicians clinic.

The physicians requested a response to the proposals within 30 days.

Three Way Eagles Blast Loop, 69-38

Awesome might be a very proper way to describe the Three Way Eagles.

Friday night, they wound up their regular district action with a 69-38 victory over Loop.

This latest victory brought Three Way to a straight victory season, and the right, without question to represent their district in Bi-District playoff action.

The Eagles will meet Guthrie at Smyer at 7 p.m. Friday, November 22, according to Eagle Coach C. W. Williams.

Last Friday night, on the way to their 69-38 victory over Loop, the Eagles had 545 aerial yards, as well as 137 rushing yards for a total offense of 682 yards.

Brett Stegall completed 32 of 50 passes for the 545 yards with seven of the passes resulting in touchdowns for Three Way.

Primary receiver was Saul Guillen with 14 catches for 259 yards; Steven Zapata had seven receptions for 135 yards and Oscar Guillen latched onto six passes for 116 yards. Robert

Zamora was the leading ground gainer with 123 yards on nine carries.

At 8:02 of the first, Stegall connected with Saul Guillen on a six yard pass into the end zone, with Curtis Tucker kicking the extra point.

Then at 5:43 of the first, Robert Zamora rambled for 20 yards to pay dirt, with Curtis Tucker adding two with his kick. This was followed by a 35 yard pass play to a touchdown from Stegall to Steven Zapata at 2:27 of the first, with the extra point attempt failing.

Final points for Three Way in the first came on a two-yard pass from Stegall to Matt Sowder with Tucker kicking the extra points.

At halftime, the score was 30-24 for Three Way.

In the third, at 8:24, Stegall found Steven Zapata on a 16 yard pass play, and the extra point attempt failed.

Selecting a Nursing Home

When people are no longer capable of living alone, either because of age or infirmity, arrangements must be made so they can get the care they need. The two major sources of such care are home health care services and nursing homes.

Home health care services can include part-time nursing care, physical therapy, home-delivered meals, transportation and escort services and many other programs of assistance.

CHECK HOME CARE FIRST

It is always best to find out what home health care services are available in your area before contracting with a nursing or custodial home. Contact your local office of the Texas Department of Human Services or call the Texas Department on Aging's toll free number (1-800-252-9240) to find out the name of your local area agency on aging. They can tell you what services and kinds of financial assistance are available for home health care.

TYPES OF NURSING HOMES

A nursing home is a medical facility and must be licensed by the State of Texas, but a nursing home is not a hospital. For those who cannot afford the payments, many nursing homes will accept residents under the Medicaid program if they qualify.

Most Texas nursing homes participate in the Medicaid program, which certifies two categories of nursing homes: skilled nursing facilities (SNF) and intermediate care facilities (ICF).

Skilled nursing facilities offer 24-hour nursing services, regular medical supervision and rehabilitation therapy. Intermediate care facilities have regular nursing services, but it is not provided around-the-clock.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR

If you decide that a nursing home is necessary for you or a family member, visit and compare at least three nursing homes in your area, if possible. The decision must be made

carefully because you are deciding where you or a loved one is going to live. You might regret a hasty decision for years to come.

Some of the things you should look for are:

● **Location.** How close and how easy is it for family and friends to visit? But don't pick the first home you visit just because it is close.

● **Layout.** The design and the condition of the home are important. Is it safe, well designed and well maintained? Does each resident have space for personal possessions and have privacy when necessary?

● **Cleanliness.** The home should be orderly and reasonably free of unpleasant odors. The employees should be clean and well groomed.

● **Food.** Ask to see typical menus for a week and, if possible, sample a meal.

● **Atmosphere.** The residents should be treated with dignity, like honored guests. You may want to talk to the residents and those who have relatives living there.

● **Administration.** The administration sets the tone and establishes the policies of the home. You should talk with the senior administrator when you visit. Find out exactly what is provided for in the cost and what "extras" would have to be paid for from personal funds. The administrator should provide you with a copy of the patient's rights. You should also find out how the home safeguards residents' valuables and how it administers their private funds for personal use. Ask to see the current nursing home license and a summary of the most recent state inspection report. You may also want to know if the home is owned locally or part of a chain, and whether the home is associated with a religious or charitable group.

NURSING HOME HOTLINE

The Texas Department of Health's Bureau of Long Term Care can tell you which nursing homes in your area have been awarded a "superior" rating and will try to answer any questions

you may have about a particular home. Their toll free number is 1-800-252-9106.

Are Your Elderly Parents Eating Right

Since our parents teach us to eat our vegetables when we're children, it's difficult to imagine that they may not be eating right in their later years.

Yet research shows that older people in all economic groups in this country often don't get enough calories, protein, vitamin C and calcium, says Dr. Alice Hunt, a nutritionist with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service.

"The need for nutrients does not change with age, but a decreased sense of taste and a less activity can result in a loss of appetite and lead to a less than adequate nutritional intake," she says.

Adult children should be concerned about older parents' eating habits because a prolonged poor diet can reduce their ability to fight disease, advises Hunt.

The nutritionist lists seven signs that an elderly parent may not be eating right:

• Have your parents lost weight?

• Have their eating habits changed? Do they skip meals or snack throughout the day? People can rarely eat a healthy diet while following these eating patterns.

• Do either of your parents live alone? Preparing and then cleaning up after a balanced meal for one person three times a day is unusual. Healthful convenience foods or a community meal service can reduce the burden of food preparation.

• Do either of your parents seem depressed? If so, they probably lack motivation to eat well. Some company at meal-time may help.

• What type of physical limitations do your parents have? Use of a walker or arthritic joints can make shopping or preparing food difficult. Check into community service or private housekeeping agencies for help.

• Are either of your parents taking medications? Many drugs alter the way the body uses food or affect the appetite. Encourage them to discuss the problem with their doctor.

• Do your parents have dentures? Often when chewing is difficult, soups and soft foods, such as pudding, are eaten instead of high protein meals and vitamin-rich fruits and vegetables. Encourage your parents to have regular dental check-ups to avoid problems.

"With just a little assistance, adult children can help their elderly parents maintain good nutrition and their independence," says Hunt.

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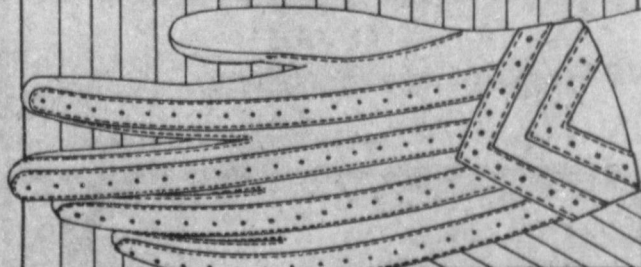

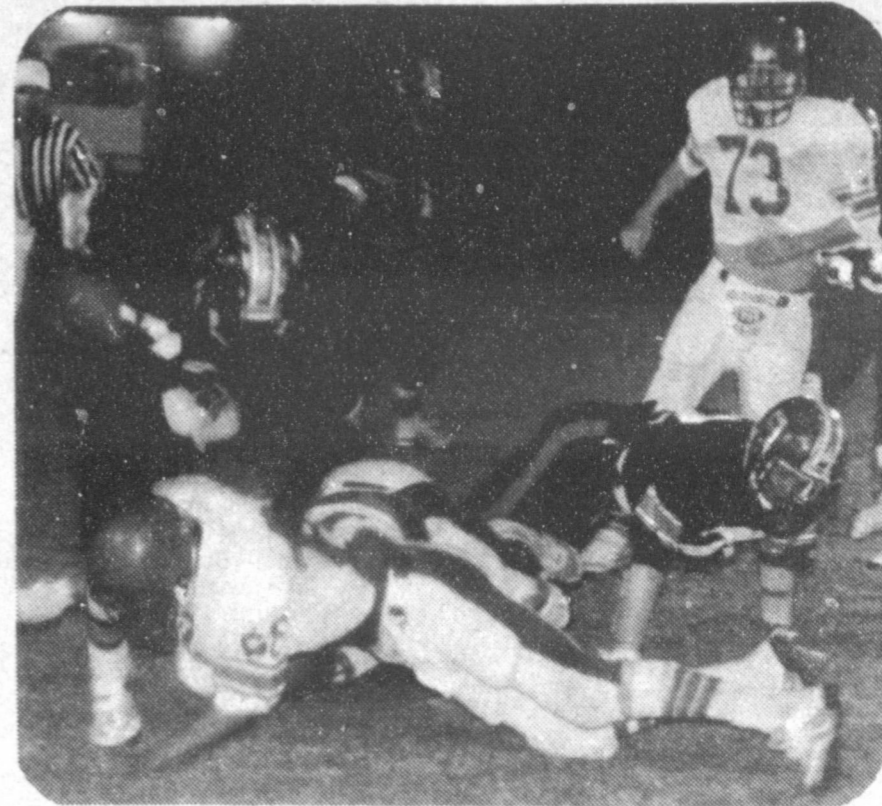

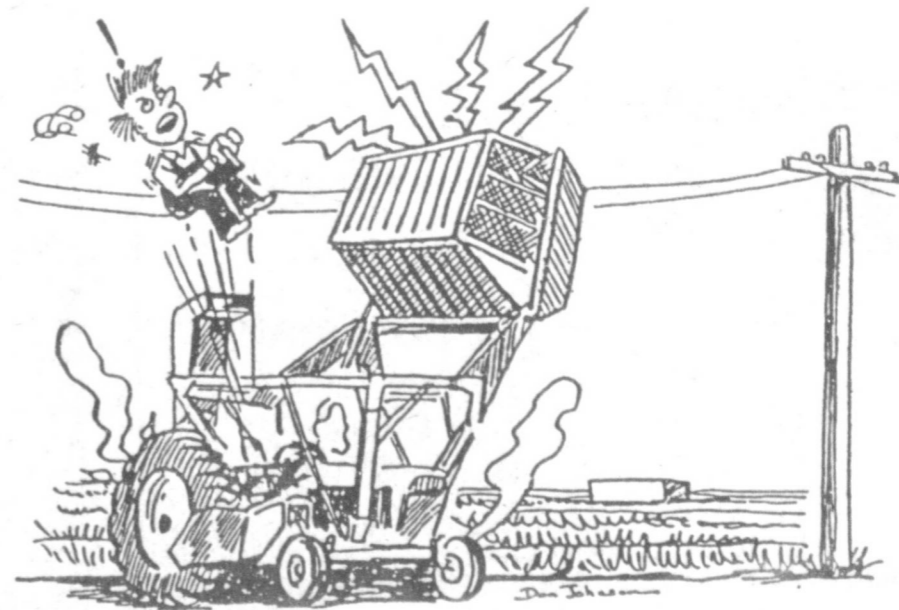

DON'T TAKE A CHANCE LOOK UP FIRST

Cotton harvest is here and the Coop urges extreme caution when operating farm equipment near electric lines.

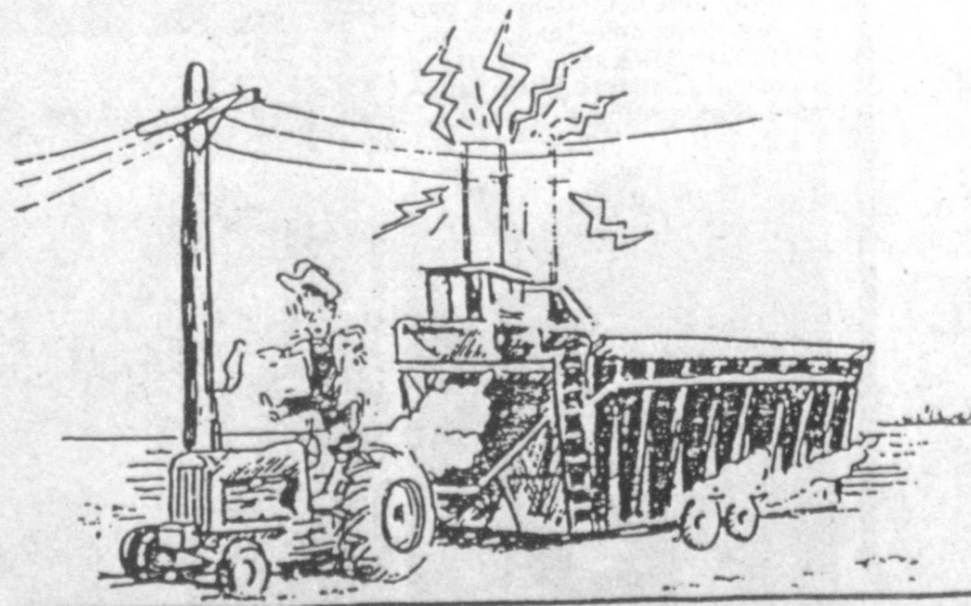
In recent years, many incidents have involved cotton module builders. The extended portion of the cotton module builder can easily come into contact with overhead electric lines if the operator is not careful. The same problem exists with overhead baskets on cotton strippers.

We urge farmers and their employees to be alert to these potential hazards and take every possible precaution to avoid serious injury or death. When moving a module builder, be sure the packer arm is lowered as far as it will go. When using a stripper with an overhead basket, be sure to check for overhead lines before dumping.



If some piece of equipment does contact these 7200 volt overhead lines, it's important that you or the operator not try to simply back away. The line could break, or if it's already broken, it could tangle in the equipment and break again, compounding the problem and increasing the danger.

Jump clear of the machine, being sure not to touch the ground and the machine at the same time. Move quickly away at a right angle to the power line. Then call Bailey County Electric Cooperative at (Area Code 806) 272-4504 whether the line is broken or not.

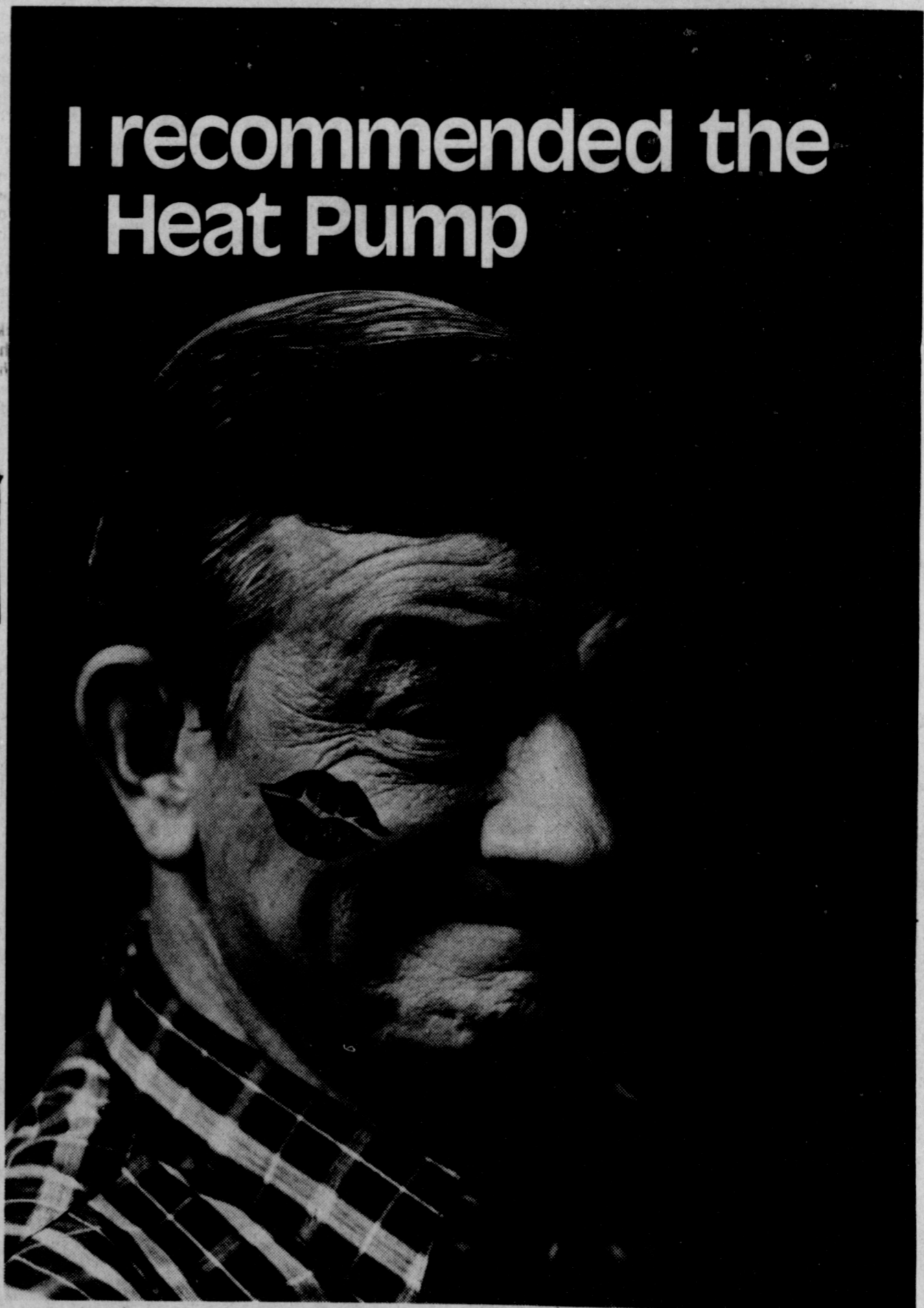

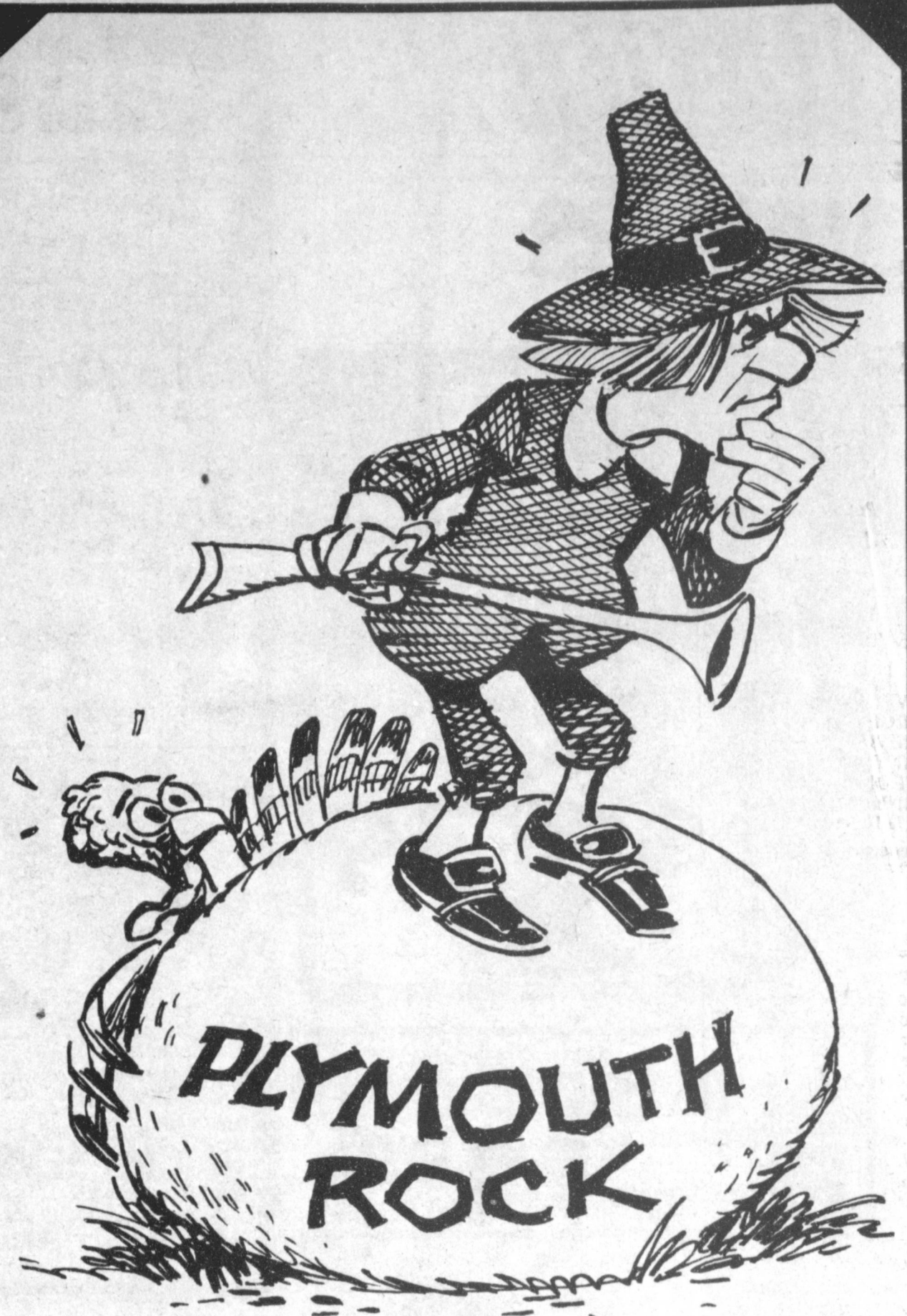
