Getting Sun Tan Too Quickly May Result In Illness

Austin, Texas, June 2—"One of the striking examples of over working a good thing is the enthusiasm displayed by thousands of persons in trying to secure a sun tan quickly. Under a misguided conception of the sun's health giving power, such persons either deliberately or thoughtlessly submit their unprotected faces, backs and legs to over-exposure and suffer painfully, sometimes seriously as a consequence," comments Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

"The discomfort and annoyance of even mild sunburn should deter people from repeating this folly from year to year. However, especially where younger persons are concerned, the enthusiasm for fun and the desire to become speedily tanned are likely to exact the inevitable price with painful regularity.

"It is one thing to apply the principles of sun treatment scientifically and quite another one to place the tender skin unrestrainedly under the direct rays of the sun. It should be understood that when the sun is employed as treatment patients are exposed for but a few minutes at a time, the per-

iods being gradually extended as the tanning develops.

"The uninformed and the thoughtless, on the other hand, give the sun free rein, submit themselves frequently to hours of continuous exposure and naturally reap misery and illness as a direct consequence.

"Before becoming too ardent over sunbathing, one would do well to ponder that many a vacation or weekend excursion has been ruined solely because the blistering and illness producing power of the sun's rays upon the tender skin was insufficiently appreciated."

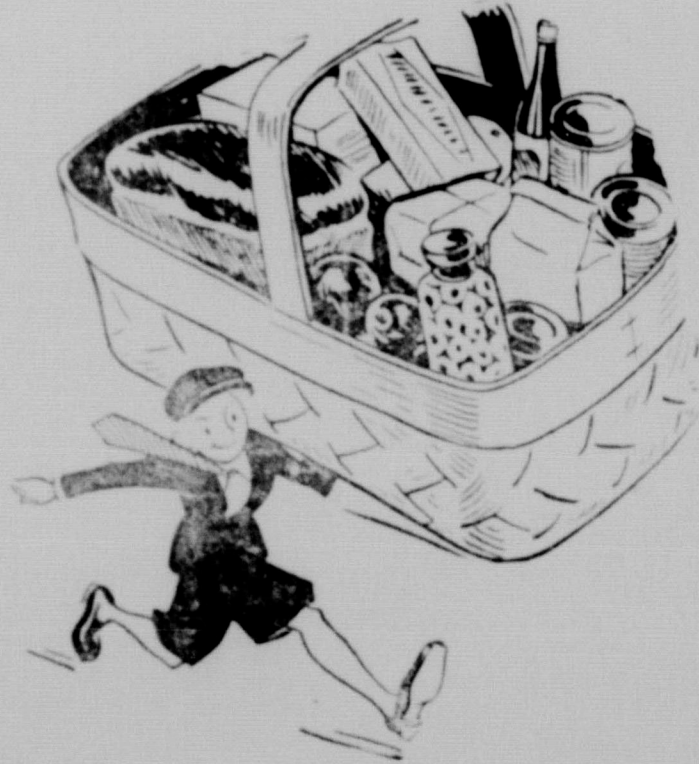

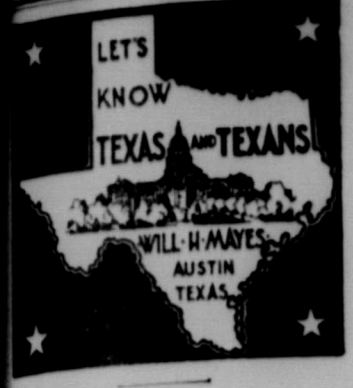

"We Go The Limit to Please"



In this column answers will be given to inquiries as to Texas history and other matters pertaining to the State and its people. Address inquiries to Will H. Mayes, Austin, Texas.

Q. Who was Capt. James Gillespie, in whose memory a monument has been erected recently in Huntsville?

A. Capt. James Gillespie (also spelled Gillaspie) was born in Virginia, Jan. 5, 1805, and came to Texas in 1835. Enlisting as a Texas volunteer at Nacogdoches, Jan. 14, 1836, he was elected first lieutenant on Capt. Joseph L. Bennett's company, Feb. 1. He was promoted April 8, to the captaincy and commanded a company at San Jacinto. He was a lieutenant-colonel in the United States-Mexican war, and raised a company for the Confederacy, being stationed on Galveston island. Was superintendent of the penitentiary at Huntsville from 1850 to 1858 and again from May, 1867 until his death Oct. 3, 1867.

Q. How much water may be stored in the three Colorado River reservoirs under construction between Austin and Llano?

A. When completed, Buchanan Lake will have approximately 1,000,000 acre feet capacity. Inks Lake 30,000 and Marshall Ford Lake 650,000.

Q. Who were the "Red Rovers" and by whom were they commanded?

A. The "Red Rovers" were a company of 75 young men from Courtland, Alabama, organized and commanded by Dr. John (Jack) Shackelford, who financed them and was their captain. Dressed in red jeans and carrying a red banner, they left Courtland, Dec. 12, 1835, arrived at Copano Bay about the middle of January, 1836, and were placed in Fannin's Regiment, which was massacred at Goliad. Dr. Shackelford escaped the slaughter because of medical services he rendered to wounded Mexicans and returned to Alabama in June, 1836. Shackelford County was named for him.

Q. Why did Gen. Sam Houston furlough the Volunteer Army in 1837?

A. The Republic lacked money with which to feed, clothe and pay the men, and during the period of inactivity many of them became dissatisfied, restless and mutinous a condition that threatened the internal peace of the country.

Q. Where is Paisano Peak?

Speed Mt. Rushmore Memorial



The heads and shoulders of President Washington and President Jefferson, sculptured in the solid granite of South Dakota's Black Hills, receive the finishing touches as workmen begin work on the last figure, that of President Lincoln. Gutzon Borglum, the sculptor, recently announced that he expected to have the major work on Mount Rushmore, near Rapid City, completed by next year, leaving the finishing touches for 1939.

Q. On the Southern Pacific Railroad between Alpine and Marfa, the highest point along the line between the Gulf of Mexico and the Pacific Ocean.

Q. How did the Sandia post office in Jim Wells county get its name?

A. Sandia is the Spanish word for watermelon, and when the post office was established in 1907, it was located in a big watermelon field.

Q. What provision did the Texas constitution of 1836 make for a judiciary system?

A. It provided for congress to create a supreme court and not less than three nor more than eight district courts, the supreme court to consist of a chief justice and the district judges sitting together as a court.

Q. What newspaper did Mirabeau B. Lamar establish and publish before coming to Texas?

A. The Macon (Georgia) Enquirer, now the Macon Enquirer-Sun, which he started April 23, 1828, and conducted until 1833.

Q. Are Federal taxes in Texas increasing or decreasing?

A. Texas citizens in 1936 paid \$74,581,047 in Federal taxes. Karl A. Crowley, solicitor of the Post-office Department, at the recent meeting of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, asserted that the amount would increase to \$125,000,000 in 1937.

Q. How many acres are included in the Texas National Forests and in what counties?

A. 1,000,000 acres, situated in Houston, Trinity, Angelina, San Augustine, Nacogdoches, Shelby, Sabine, San Jacinto, Montgomery, and Walker counties.

Q. How much tree planting was done in 1936 by the National Forestry service in Texas?

A. Slightly over 10,000,000 young trees were planted on 12,289 acres. Present plans call for the planting and development of 10,000 to 15,000 acres a year.

Q. What event does the Panhandle section of Texas propose to celebrate in connection with New Mexico and Arizona?

A. The 300th anniversary of the exploration of Coronado (1540-41), the celebration to be under the auspices of the historical societies of the territory traversed by Coronado.
