BONUS

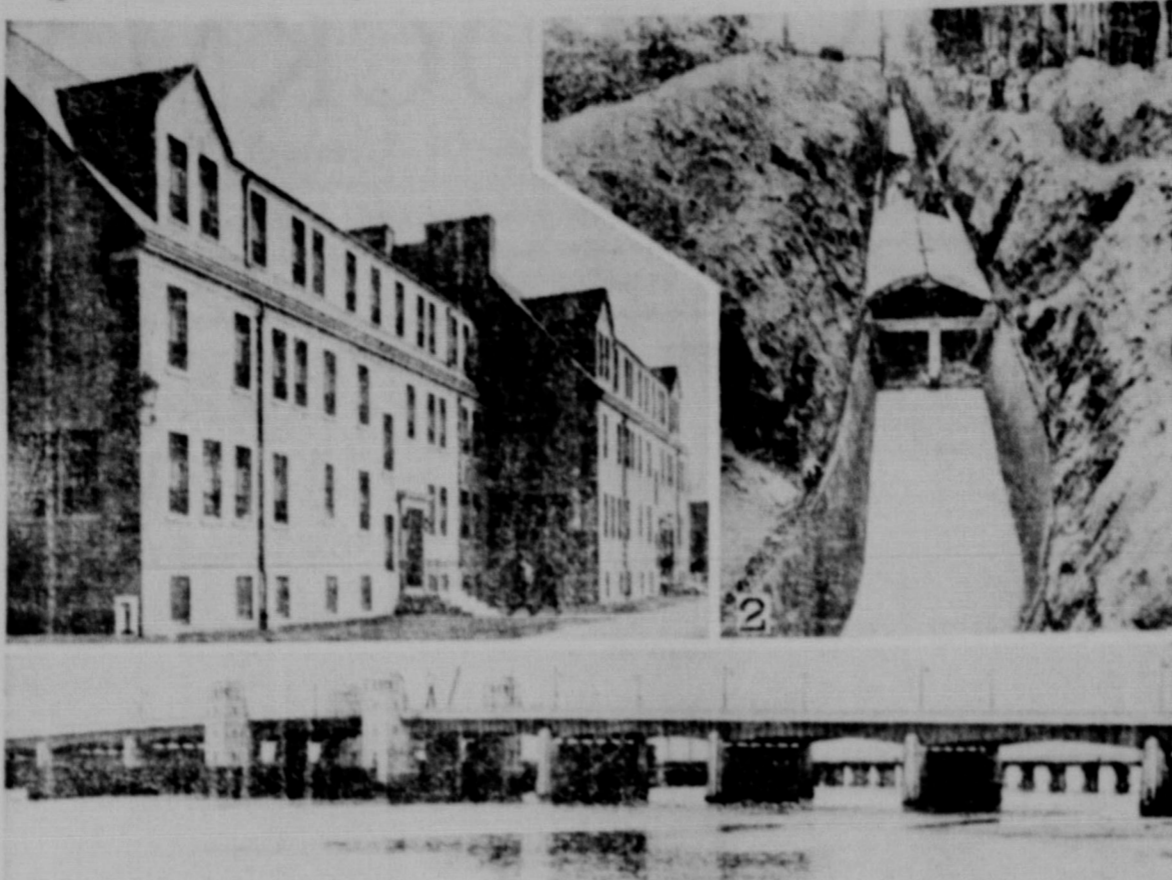
Uncle Sam begins tonight the delivery of approximately \$3,000,000,000 (billions) in cash and bonds, representing the unpaid portion of the soldiers' bonus. Government checks will cover only such amounts as are in excess of bonds of \$50.00 denomination.

This newspaper, along with many veterans of A.E.F. and home service, four successive Presidents of the United States, and a large public minority has first opposed voting of the bonus, then the so-called "loan" on the first half of the face value of adjusted service certificates, and finally the present payment of the last half.

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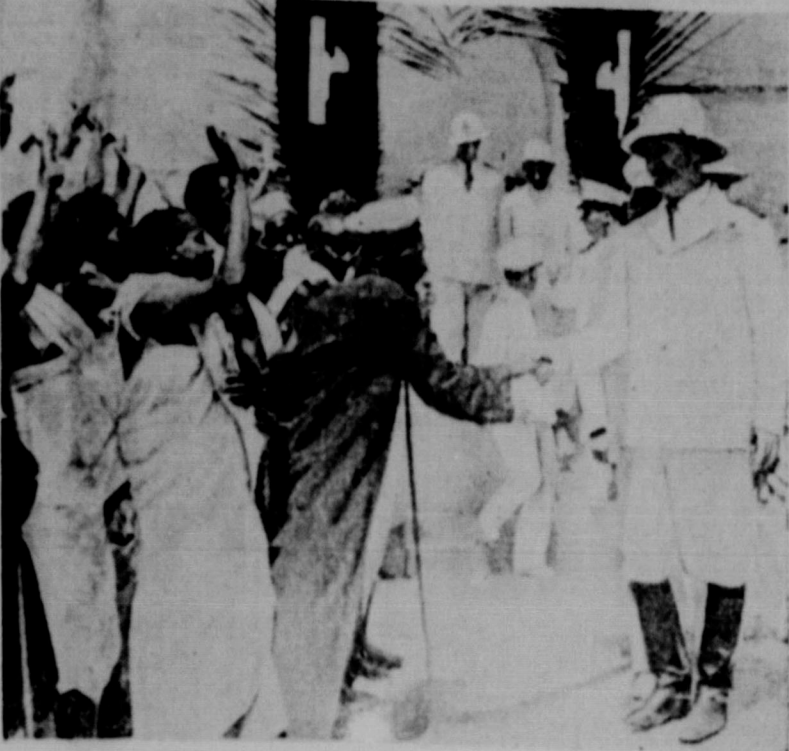
Fans Hurt As Car Turns Over On Way To Crane Game

Representative Coke R. Stevenson and District Attorney Weaver H. Baker are unopposed candidates for district offices in this district.

The list of candidates for county and precinct offices in Crockett County is headed by County Judge Charles E. Davidson, unopposed for re-election to the post he has held for nearly a half century. George Russell, for county and district clerk, N. W. Graham for county attorney and Commissioner Charley Black of Precinct 2, are the only other unopposed candidates in this county.

Places Are Drawn

In the race for the office of sheriff, assessor and collector of taxes, the name of R. F. Powell was drawn for first place and that of Sheriff W. S. Willis, seeking re-election, in second. Tom Casbeer took the top place for the office of county treasurer, with Bob Weaver in second position. Bill Conklin was drawn for first place and C. E. Grimmer for second in the race for county surveyor.

In the four-cornered race for justice of the peace, Drennan Slaughter drew first place, J. T. Glover, second, Walter Capps, third, and W. M. Johnigan, incumbent, fourth.

B. B. Ingham, O. W. Smith and Rob Miller is the order of candidate positions in the race for commissioner, Precinct No. 1. O. W. Parker, J. W. Owens and Mike Friend is the order in the Precinct 3 race and E. R. Kinser, S. M. Harvick and Frank Kirkpatrick in Precinct 4.

Estimates of the cost of holding the election were made by the executive committee and assessments made against each candidate for his pro rata share of the cost. Candidates have until June 30 to pay these assessments, but the amount must be paid by that date. Chairman Smith announced.

Provision Made For Boys Who Could Not Attend Earlier Camp

Boy Scouts of the Concho Valley Council who did not get to attend Camp Louis Farr with their troop earlier in the camping season will get the opportunity the last week of the encampment beginning June 28. According to word received here this week by local Scout leaders, two provisional troops of 18 Scouts each will be set up to care for Scouts who did not get to attend camp.

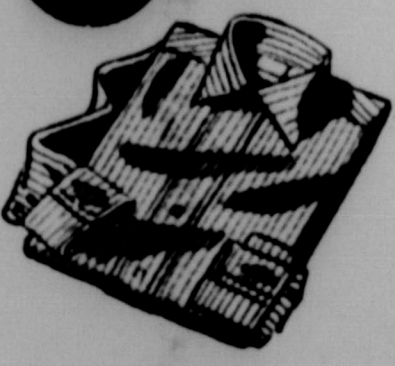
