GIANTS GRAB FIRST HALF BASIN FLAG

Rejuvenated McCamey Team For 2 In Final Series

TEXON DROPS ONE

Wink Breaks Tie By Knocking Off Oilers Saturday

When the Wink Cats bounced the Texon Oilers 7-6 last Saturday and the Ozona Giants came thru for a double win Saturday and Sunday over the McCamey Refiners, Slim Harris and his Giant crew topped out a full game in the lead of the nearest rival for the first half championship of the Permian Basin League, rated one of the fastest semi-pro leagues in the state.

The six-team league went into the final week-end series for the first half with Ozona and Texon tied for first place as a result of Crane's double snatch from the Giants there the week before. The game being broken in the final series, the May 23 rained out game between the Giants and Oilers was chalked up as "no game" under ruling of League Prexy Bill Collins.

Hearing rumors of a possible contest for the first half flag, Manager George Russell of the Giants called President Collins by long distance telephone yesterday to learn the course of developments.

"So far as I am concerned, as president of the league, I am declaring Ozona undisputed winners of the first half," Collins told Russell. "I have ruled on the postponed game and that ruling will stand." Collins admitted that he had been on the receiving end of a flood of telegrams and telephone calls since the week-end turn of events.

Crane, a half game behind the two leaders up to the week-end, slipped back after Iraan pounced on them Sunday for a 9-2 victory, after the Gulfmen had won Saturday with a score of 12 to 9.

After a free-scoring contest Saturday in which the Giants ran away with the affray 15 to 4, the McCamey aggregation, bolstered by a number of players recruited from the disbanded Odessa team.

Choice Fat Calves, 12,000 Pounds Of High Quality Meat, To Be Barbecued To Feed Ozona Visitors July 2, 3 & 4

R. J. Cooke, Barbecue Master, Estimates 300,000 Pounds Meat Served Here In His 37 Years As Head Cook

Meat from choice fed calves, packing house butchered and dressed, and cooked to the delicious flavor that has made Ozona barbecue famous throughout the South, will be the repast prepared for the thousands of visitors expected to flock to Ozona July 2, 3 and 4 for this city's Centennial year Rodeo, Race Meet, and Stock Show.

Twelve thousand pounds of meat has been ordered from the packing house to furnish barbecue for Ozona's three-day celebration and if that isn't enough to feed every person that will "come and get it" those three days, there will be plenty more available from Crockett County ranches, members of the barbecue committee have announced.

Sale Entry



In addition to the 12,000 pounds of meat to be barbecued for the event, there will be the usual trimmings, including several 30-gallon pots of "son-of-a-gun" or cowboy stew, ranch style frijole beans, pickles, onions, several thousand loaves of bread, coffee and feed tea.

14,000 Lbs. In 1926

The 12,000-pound order for meat for the Ozona celebration is by no means a record for the local show, according to Bob Cooke, who has been at the job of preparing the barbecue, beans, stew, etc for the Ozona's annual show for the past 37 years. In 1926, the first year the local celebration was presented by an organized fair association, 14,000 pounds of meat were prepared for the three-day feeding of visitors.

That year, however, overflow crowds, those who could not find room in the regular eating places, were fed breakfast and supper as well as the regular barbecue dinner. For breakfast, fried steaks were served and the last day of the show, the breakfast diners were given a treat of fried fish. The fish as an extra on the menu card came about more or less accidentally. A Port Arthur fish dealer, learning of the Ozona show, shipped 200 pounds of fish to Mr. Cooke's market for sale. But the market was closed during the three days, since folks were being fed in a big way each meal of the day. It was a matter of sending the fish back or feeding it to the crowds, and a deal was made with the fish dealer by long distance telephone. Thus, the rodeo crowds were surprised with a spread of fish for breakfast on the last day of the celebration.

Mr. Cooke drew the assignment to cook the barbecue for Ozona's

OZONA STAGES OFFICIAL RAM SALE OF TEX.

Centennial Designates Ozona's As State's Official Sale

RECORDS TO FALL

Greatest In History Is Expected By Local Committee

Designated as the official Texas Centennial Ram Sale, the Ozona Rambouillet sheep sale July 2, 3 and 4 is expected to draw not only the pen capacity of entries of fine animals in the sale but also to attract the leading sheepmen of all Texas and a half dozen other states as potential bidders at the auction.

Nationwide publicity accorded the local sale through its official designation by the Centennial commission as the state's Centennial year ram sale will bring sheepmen from all over the sheep raising sections of the nation. This added impetus, coupled with its consistent record of chalking up the highest average prices of any sale in the United States, will make the 1936 auction by far the most successful in the history of the local event, in the opinion of the committee in charge.

The leading growers of Texas, Utah, California and other sheep producing states are already on their way to Ozona with the pick of their flocks for entry in the show and sale to be held in connection with the Centennial year Crockett County Rodeo, Race Meet, Stock Show and Sale. In the neighborhood of a thousand of the nation's best rams will be on the block, with Nelson Johnson of San Angelo calling for the bids.

Deadline For Last Half Tax Payments Near

June 30 Is Last Day To Pay Split Payment Without Penalty

Collections at the office of the tax collector here are on the increase as the deadline for paying the last half of split payments for 1935 property taxes draws near, reports from the office of W. S. Willis, sheriff, assessor and collector, indicate.

Payments have been coming in steadily. Tom Casbeer, deputy in charge reports. June 30 is the deadline for payment of the last half taxes without penalty, the collector pointed out, and since just four more week days remain in which to make these payments, those who took advantage of this manner of paying last year's taxes are urged to make the last payment at once to avoid additional penalties.

Delinquent taxes may be paid during the last days of June at considerable saving in penalties, also, it was pointed out. A jump of 3 percent in the penalty assessed for delinquent 1935 taxes will result on July 1 and interest charges will add to the total penalty to be paid.

\$3,000 Damage To Moore Home Result Of Fire

Origin Of Early Morning Blaze In Attic Undetermined

Fire of still undetermined origin about five o'clock this morning caused damage estimated at slightly more than \$3,000 to the home of H. A. Moore just north of the elementary school building.

The fire was discovered by N. P. Hokit, nightwatchman. The Moore family was awakened and the fire department notified. The fire engine crew and volunteer workers extinguished the blaze, but not until considerable damage had been done to the home and furnishings.

The blaze apparently started in the attic and traveled down walls of the living room and one bedroom. It was necessary to make an opening in the roof to extinguish the blaze in the attic, and the walls were considerably damaged by fire and water. Several pieces of furniture were scorched, and damaged by being removed from the home.

Ozonans Ballot To Decision On Beer Saturday

Big Vote Expected On Issue Of Legal Sale In Precinct 1

Decision will be made by Ozona voters next Saturday on the question of whether or not beer and light wines of not more than four percent alcoholic content shall be sold in this precinct. A big vote is expected to be polled on the question.

The election, set for next Saturday by the Commissioners Court in response to a petition signed by sixty-two qualified voters of the precinct, is to be held in the district courtroom of the courthouse.

PLANS TAKING FORM FOR BIG RODEO PARADE

Citizens Cooperate To Make Parade An Outstanding Feature

HISTORIC PAGEANT

West Of Old And Present Day Depicted In Line March

With committees working feverishly this week on various features and business houses and individuals shaping plans for their parts in the event, plans were rapidly taking form for a mile-long parade which will be a feature of the opening day program of the Ozona Rodeo, Race Meet, Stock Show and Sale the last three days of next week.

More than a dozen commercial floats, competing for attractive cash prizes, hundreds of cowboys, saddle horses, cowgirls, Indians, ancient and modern transportation facilities, and miscellaneous features appropriate to the Western motif and the occasion of Texas' celebration of its hundredth birthday will march in the parade line.

Howard E. Cox, director, and John R. Bailey, general chairman, and their committees of workers have been busy all week shaping up all details of the parade and are securing almost one hundred percent co-operation from business firms and individuals in making this, the first street parade in the history of the local celebration, one of the most colorful ever staged in West Texas.

Adjutant General Carl Nesbit of Austin will ride at the head of the parade with President Wayne West and other officials of the fair association, it was announced this week following the adjutant general's acceptance of Ozona's invitation to participate in the parade.

Remudas of saddle horses, pure bred and range stallions, cow waddies ancient and modern, a large contingent of cowgirls in colorful regalia, a group of Indians, a herd of Palomino horses, commercial floats depicting the development of the West, ancient vehicles and present-day models and other interesting entries will feature the parade line.

The giant parade will be staged at 11 o'clock a. m. on Thursday, July 2, the opening day of the three-day celebration.

Louis Welk And Orchestra Play For Rodeo Hops

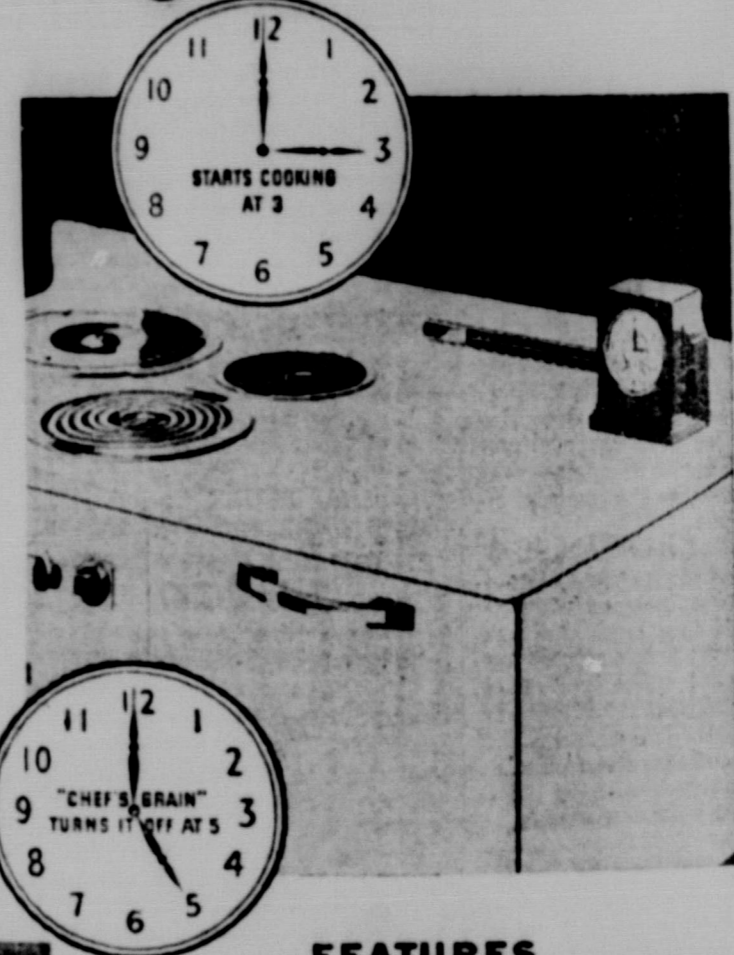

Centennial Opening Week Attendance Is Near Chicago Mark

DALLAS, Texas, June 24—Paid admissions during the first week of the Texas Centennial Exposition exceeded the total for the first week at Chicago's 1933 Century of Progress Exposition by 790, official comparative figures revealed here today. Paid admissions during the first week of the 1934 Century of Progress Exposition exceeded the first week's total for the Texas Centennial Exposition by 4,755.

The paid admissions for the first Centennial Exposition week totaled 231,149, while the 1933 Chicago exposition total was 225,399, according to official figures for both fairs. The paid admissions for the 1934 Chicago exposition totaled 235,904.

These figures for the Texas and Chicago expositions do not include admissions by passes of employees, press representatives and others. Texas Centennial officials were pleased over the comparative figures when announced by W. A. Webb, general manager. If the average attendance for the first week is maintained, the total attendance for the exposition will exceed the 10,000,000 visitors expected by executives before the close of the Texas World's Fair November 29.

Total attendance at the 1933 Chicago exposition was 27,703,132. For the 1934 Chicago exposition the total was 21,066,095.

Unique Clock In French Cathedral Flashes Resurrection Scene at 12

BESANCON, France—The most complicated clock in the world, containing 30,000 different parts, is in the cathedral at Besancon. Constructed for Cardinal Mathieu in 1857, at a cost of \$375,000, the clock measures 19 feet in height, 8 feet in width, is 3 feet deep and has 27 principal dials.

The ordinary dial for telling the time is set at the top while below are other faces indicating the time in 16 parts of the world. Another set of dials tells the length of the day, the equation between real time and mean time, the seasons, days of the week, length of the night, the signs of the zodiac, the planets corresponding to each day of the week and even the day of the year. Eight other faces indicate the seconds, the hour of sunset, time of sunrise, the Roman year, the cycle of the sun and two other indications of ecclesiastical computation. Still another dial indicates the movements of the planetary system.

On the sides of the clock are dials painted with views of French seaport towns. Harve, Mont Saint-Michel, Dieppe, Brest and other French seaports are depicted.

Some pictures show stormy weather with small ships tossing about on tall waves while others depict calmer weather. Each picture is accompanied by an indicator showing the exact tide at each port.

The 12 Apostles stand in niches above the dials and at each hour two groups of six Apostles change

places with one another. Each figure carries some symbol by which it is known and with this strikes the hour on a bell.

The Archangels St. Michael and St. Gabriel stand in niches above the Apostles and strike each quarter hour on a bell. Moving figures of Faith, Hope, Charity are seen every hour.

At the top of the clock the Resurrection is pictured. As 12 strikes a slab of rock rises and the figure of Christ ascends while Roman soldiers on guard disappear. As 3 strikes, the figure of Christ descends into the tomb and the Roman soldiers reappear.

The world's most complicated clock is completed with a statue of the Virgin carrying a scepter which lowers at the Resurrection and rises at the Entombment.

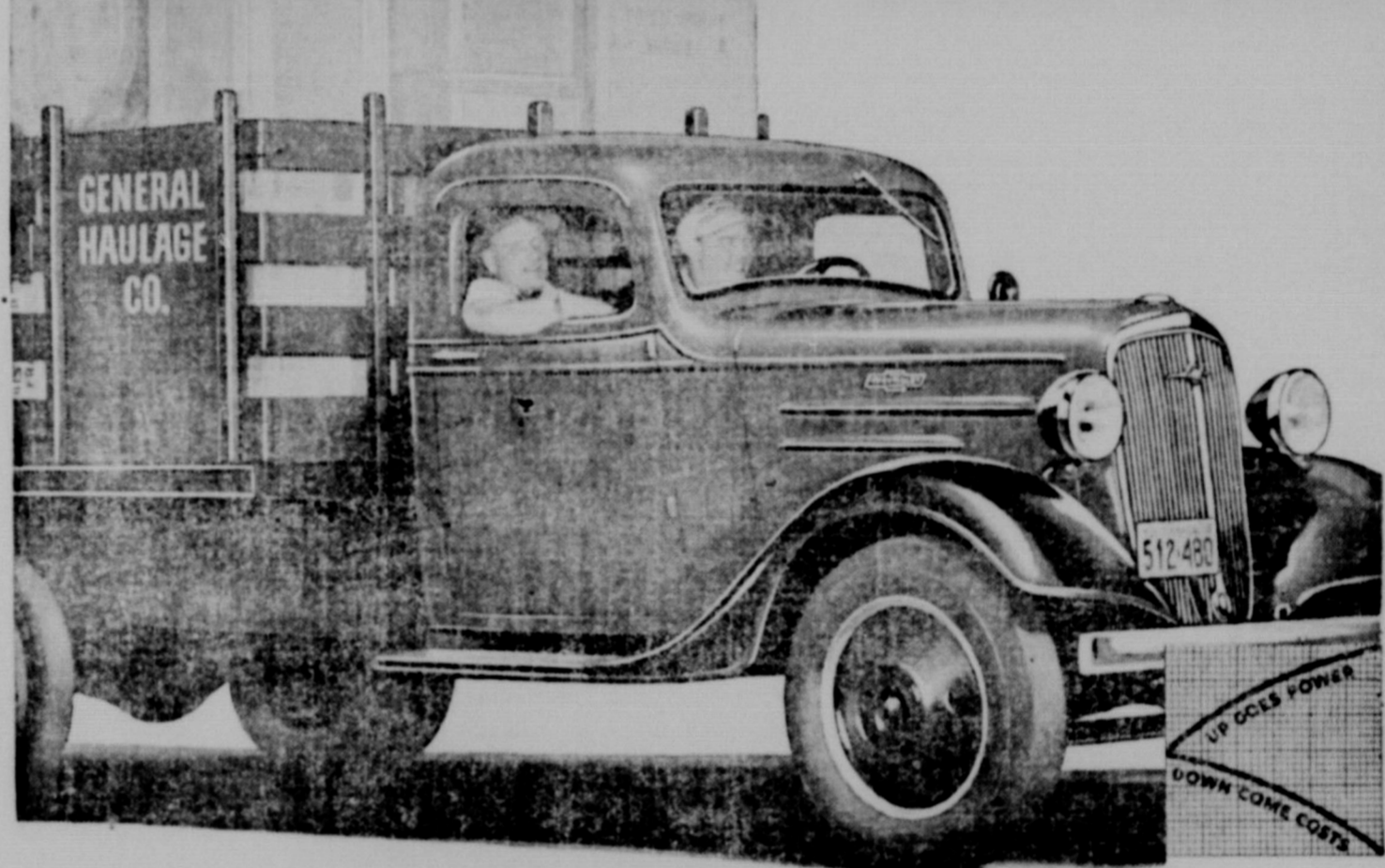

AUSTIN, June 24—On July 4, 1936, Texans will celebrate along with the State's Centennial year, the one hundred and sixtieth anniversary of National Independence.

Thousands of visitors will be in Texas on this National holiday, and it is up to loyal Texans to do everything possible to see that this day brings pleasure and not tragedy to our visitors and ourselves, says a warning from the State Department of Health.

"While there certainly is no desire to minimize the joys of this nation-wide holiday," said Dr. John W. Brown, State Health Officer, "it is only common sense to respect hazards to life and limb, and to govern one's actions accordingly."

"Not so many years ago the newspapers on each July 5 would publish columns detailing the tragedies that were invariably associated with the handling of dangerous fireworks by careless persons. For a number of years now, however, the press has been placing particular emphasis on the need for a 'Safe and Sane Fourth of July,' with the result that accidents of this kind have decreased.

"All injuries, however slight, may carry the lock-jaw or tetanus menace with them. Every wound should be cleaned thoroughly and all foreign matter removed. A physician should be consulted immediately, and tetanus antitoxin administered if necessary.

"Unfortunately, while the hazard of handling fireworks has consistently diminished, that of the automobile has just as consistently been increasing. Every one will agree that to be careless in the operation of a motor vehicle on this day when the roads carry peak loads, is to invite possible injury and even death.

"Your future happiness and health, and that of your family may depend on your recognizing and carrying out the ordinary rules of precaution. Obey these rules and live to enjoy many other fourths of July."

Already leading the league in strike-outs, the big soldier from Randolph Field took a new hitch in his trousers and shot well in the lead by whiffing a sum total of ten batsmen in the Sunday fracas. Only six McCamey players touched first base in the game and only one felt of second, that on the single Ozona error of the game, Vic Montgomery. Giant left fielder, was credited with materially assisting in the shut-out when in the sixth inning, with a man on first and the only man to reach second on that bag, two men down and a batter smacked one hard between left and center, Montgomery making a circus catch to retire the side with no runs.

Lenz scored Ozona's first run in the sixth after doubling and crossing the platter on Heatherly's single. The champion Giants salted the flag down in the eighth by adding three more tallies. In this frame Lenz again started it off with a single, Montgomery singled and Heatherly crashed

Colorful Story Of Ozona's Show To Be Broadcast Through Medium of Official Texas Centennial Publicity Channels

Centennial Review Carries Yarn On Official Ram Sale

Editor's Note—The following story of Ozona's ninth annual show and sale July 2, 3 and 4 was written by Sam Ashburn, of "Top of the Windmill" fame, especially for the Centennial Review, official publication of the Texas Centennial Exposition, to be broadcast throughout the land in connection with other publicity material for the Texas birthday celebration. The story went from here by telegraph yesterday to appear in this week's Centennial Review, by request of the Review editors.

The official Texas Centennial Ram Sale, at Ozona July 2, 3 and 4, is to be a grand mixture of business and entertainment in the most colorful ranch atmosphere of the state. Wayne West, president said today. In a county of 150 sheepmen owning 450,000 sheep, there will be offered at auction on the three days the best Rambouillet rams from the registered flocks of a half dozen states.

This is the ninth annual sale. Recognized as the official festival of the sheepmen since it was inaugurated. The prices paid at these sales have been the highest average in the United States. The auctioneer Colonel Nelson Johnson, will have before him some thousand rams and more than three thousand of the sheepmen of the state which has nine million sheep within its boundaries, when he steps in the auction ring.

Mile Long Parade

The show opens with a mile long parade July 2, with old trappers, former professional deer hunters, pioneers, cow hands, sheepherders, palomino horses, two hundred smart cutting horses, numerous ranch remudas, in the line of March headed by Mr. West and Joe Pierce, former president, and Adjutant General Carl Nesbit of Austin, Rangers, both new and old, some of them with notches on their guns, will add the western color which does not have to be imported.

There is not a farm in this county—the last man who farmed here was killed by a bear and the man who brought in the county's first and only oil field was sent to the penitentiary. Located on the Old Spanish Trail Ozona is reached by seventy miles an hour roads from every direction. There is just one house between here and any of the adjoining towns. This is an inland town with thirty homes worth more than twenty-five thousand dollars each. These homes will be open to the visitors, house parties will be held all over town and on the big ranches of this the third largest county in Texas. For those who like to fish there is the Pecos not many miles distant.

Dancing Each Night

Each night there will be dances in the open air with the orchestra sleeping in the courthouse. Each afternoon there will be horse races, a rodeo and for the first time in history a judging of ranch remudas. Present for the affair will be Judge C. E. Davidson, county judge since the county was organized almost a half century ago. He's the only exclusive cowman in the county.

This is the land of the aristocracy of agriculture, the home of the sheepmen, who this year have their pockets filled with money from the best prices in ten years and they are throwing this party for their friends, which means everybody in Texas. It is not the usual sort of aristocracy for the man of millions often has for his best friend a cow waddy who makes fifty dollars a month.

The food? There will be a free barbecue served in the shade of the courthouse plaza each of the three days under the direction of J. M. Baggett. Prime packing house beef, fresh killed Spanish kid goats, the delight of the epicure, red beans and stew. It will be a great three day period out here in the red bean and dun horse country.

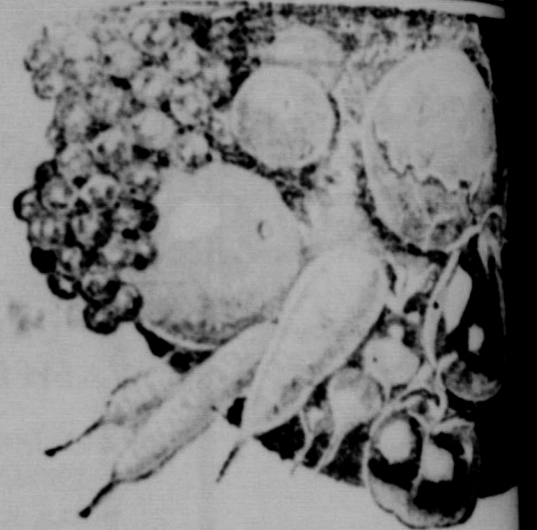
