W. Owens Out For Re-Election As Commissioner

Precinct 3 Representative Member Court Since 1915

J. W. Owens, veteran County Commissioner from Precinct 3, and one of the nation's outstanding breeders of registered Rambouillet sheep, made it unanimous among the four commissioners making re-election when he made formal announcement this week that he would be a candidate for re-election to the post.

Mr. Owens has served Crockett County as commissioner from No. 3 precinct since 1915. His is one of the most thickly populated precincts in the county, accounting for some forty votes in usual elections. It is the only precinct containing two voting places, the Texas Valley Power and Light plant and the old Hat Ranch, headquarters of the J. W. Owens ranches. The precinct includes roughly the northwest section of the county, joining precinct No. 4 to the south and extending up the Texas River to the north boundary.

So far Mr. Owens is unopposed for re-election to the post he has held uninterruptedly for twenty years. Knowledge of county affairs gained through this long service and the court's record of achievements in that period are bases upon which the veteran commissioner solicits the support of voters in his precinct for re-election.

Drivers Licenses Now Being Issued To Motorists Here

Miss Rachel Schrader In Charge Of Issuance At Sheriff's Office

Drivers' licenses are now available to Crockett County automobile owners and drivers at the office of W. S. Willis, sheriff, tax assessor and collector, it was announced this week.

The new licenses, made mandatory by recent legislative act, are being issued under the supervision of Miss Rachel Schrader, office deputy in charge of tax assessments. No charge is being made for the license.

The drivers license is issued in three sections. Arrest and conviction for a traffic violation results in one of these sections being taken up by the proper court official. The second section will be taken up with the second conviction and if a third conviction occurs, the license is revoked and the person then becomes liable to a heavy fine and jail sentence if he ventures further to drive an automobile. Failure to be able to produce the license upon demand of an officer also subjects an automobile driver to possible fine.

Offenses for which sections of the license will be recalled include reckless driving, driving while intoxicated, passing a car on a curve or hill, excessive speed and other traffic offenses that might result in accidents.

Distribution of application blanks for old age pensions under the state pension bill, which went into effect last Friday, got under way here Saturday.

A supply of the blanks was left here late Friday by Tom Atwood of San Angelo, district 19 supervisor for the old age assistance administration. The blanks are being distributed at the courthouse and from The Stockman office. Justice of the Peace W. M. Johnigan is filling out the forms for Crockett County eligibles for government pensions, a number of whom have already sent in applications.

Curtail School Program Result Mumps Epidemic

Thirty Percent Of Student Body Reported Malady Victims

Activities in Ozona's schools have been curtailed and the daily routine restricted to class room work as the system continues in the grip of an epidemic of mumps that has raged for the past three weeks unabated.

Assembly programs, a weekly feature, have been cancelled and athletic activities have been at a standstill. The past week has witnessed the development of a number of additional cases of the disease among pupils, but so far no more teachers have developed the malady. Coach Ted White, first member of the faculty to contract the disease, was able to be back at his duties this week. Misses Ada Moss and Elitabel Tilroy, however, are still confined to their homes.

There were approximately 38 cases out of high school yesterday and nine in the grades, Supt. C. S. Denham reported. These figures constitute around 30 per cent of the entire student body.

110-Year-Old Mexican, First Settler From Old Mexico To Ozona, Died Sunday

Crockett County's oldest resident is dead!

Teafilo Moncada, first Mexican from Old Mexico to settle in Ozona and who came here before the town was established in its present site, died at the home of friends in the Mexican quarter of Ozona Sunday night.

Moncada's age was estimated at 110 years. He came to Crockett about the time the first town was located at Emerald and before the townsite was changed to the present site of Ozona. The ancient Mexican was associated with the late Blas Vargas, Mexican merchant and shearing captain, who died several years ago, and made his home until his death with the Vargas children.

A few years ago a group of friends of the viejo offered to finance his trip back to his native Mexico but the old man refused, saying he wished to spend his last days in the country of his adoption.

Higginbotham Firm Leases Hoover Ranch

Higginbotham Bros. of Dallas, and Hal Ramsey, associate and manager of their extensive ranch operations in Mexico, have leased the 300-section ranch in northeastern Pecos county owned and controlled by A. C. Hoover, of Ozona, for two years at an unannounced terms.

It was reported in Fort Stockton that they will stock the ranch with several thousand head of cattle and a large number of sheep. The cattle will be shipped in from Mexico, crossing at Eagle Pass and lower points, and from South Texas.

Mr. Ramsey, former operator at Eldorado and south of Sanderson and Marathon, is one of the largest-scale traders in Texas, and much activity is expected for the Pecos county lease during the two years.

Just when the stock will be placed here has not been learned. —Ft. Stockton Pioneer.

Deputy Coming To Assist With Income Returns

Deputy Collector To Be Here March 3 To Assist Taxpayers

J. A. Miller, deputy collector for the Internal Revenue Service, will be in Ozona at the Hotel Ozona Tuesday, March 3, for the purpose of assisting income taxpayers in this community with the preparation of their income tax returns. The Stockman has been advised by W. A. Thomas, collector of Internal Revenue at Dallas.

"There are several changes in the law which are apt to prove confusing to the average taxpayer," Mr. Thomas writes. "Our visiting deputy will be glad to assist such persons."

SON OF OZONAN DIES FROM WRECK INJURIES

Phillip Looney, employed on the Roy Henderson ranch, returned the first of the week from Corpus Christi, where he went to attend the funeral of his son, Phillip Looney, Jr., who died there Friday. Funeral services were held Sunday. The younger Mr. Looney suffered injuries in a car wreck a year ago that are believed to have resulted in complications that led to his death. He was employed by an oil company at Corpus Christi.

Applicants For Pensions Must Prove Incomes

Limit Set By Statute Bars Aged From Participation

AUSTIN, Feb. 19— Applicants should be able to prove their yearly income because the old-age assistance law provides that \$360 yearly for single persons and \$720 yearly for married couples must be the total of revenues received by applicants from all sources including the State Aid, Orville S. Carpenter, executive director of the Old Age Assistance Commission said today about the new law.

"Applicants should be prepared to make a full and complete statement of all earnings for the two years immediately preceding application," Mr. Carpenter declared.

"The cash or security clause in the new law necessitates that applicants be able to tell the exact amount of money they have in the bank. They should be prepared to give a description of all securities owned, serial numbers, from whom purchased, etc.," he explained. "If securities were sold, the name of the purchaser must be known. Full details about all securities handled, bought, or sold during the last two years must be provided.

"Not only does the requirement concern earned income, but aid received from any source must be listed," Carpenter stated.

Section 7, subsection (e) of the new law reads that the application shall contain the following information:

If receiving aid from any source the amount received and from whom, or if such aid is not in cash money, then a description of such aid tendered, together with the name of the source of such aid and from whom; the amount received from the United States Government, State or County, public or private charitable organizations, corporations, or private individuals.

Conservation Of Texas Wildlife Conference Topic

AUSTIN, Texas, Feb. 19—Call for a general meeting of representatives of organizations and individuals to hold a Texas Wildlife Conference in Austin, March 27th and 28th has been issued by Governor James V. Allred. The conference is to be of the same nature as the North American Wildlife Conference held in Washington early in February.

Speakers of national and international note, including J. N. Darling, president of the General Wildlife Federation and noted cartoonist; Frank Bell, U. S. Commissioner of Fisheries; Carl D. Shoemaker, secretary of the U. S. Senate Wildlife committee; Juan Zinser, chief of game administration of the Republic of Mexico and

Roswell P. Rosengren, vice president of the United States Junior Chamber of Commerce are among those from out of the State who have places on the program of the Texas meeting.

Representatives of sportsmen's groups, land owners' organizations, all departments of the state government interested in any phase of wildlife development, educational institutions and civic groups are being urged to attend the meeting.

Set forth in the Governor's proclamation, the purpose of the meeting is to unify the efforts of all

those in this State interested in wildlife conservation. It is expected by the Texas Wildlife Council, at whose request the conference is called, that there will be a larger representation of life conservationists than ever before been assembled in the State and it is their hope that of this conference will come a greater unified effort for conservation and restoration of life in Texas than has ever before been achieved.
