

For too long we have sat back and enjoyed our freedom,

and done little about preserving it. Whether America's democratic ideals face an actual threat from the spread of the dictatorial idea is open to discussion - and it's certainly been getting it. Be that of the problem of dictatorship on the public voice and mind ought to lead to a renewed interest in the government and system under which we live.

A democracy, to be a success. requires the active interest and participation of each of its subjects. If the current flood of talk does nothing else, it ought to renew and revitalize America's interest in its own way of living.

FREEDOM FOR PHILIPINOS

Like a lady, safely married for a decade, who suddenly realizes that her coming divorce may bring an uncomfortable sense of insecurity, the Philippine Islands are today beginning to wonder whether they really want to "divorce" the United States. With the might of Japan looming large on the Asiatic horizon, the Philpinos can't help but see the sad shades of political peril and aconomic disaster hiding the rosy glow of freedom.

Philippine High Commissioner McNutt's recent call for a "realistic re-examination" of the question has so far produced little reaction in Washington. It is obvious, of course, that what the Filipinos really want is to have their cake and eat it. Given their choice they would probably follow the British plan and chose dominion status - complete freedom in local matters, plus protection and trade benefits from the mother country

Such a set-up would leave America with everything to lose and nothing to gain in the Orient. In exchange for a few naval bases, the U.S. would be dedicated to the task of walling off the Islands from Japan. In exchange for a minimum of control, America would be asked to grant the benefits of American citizenship with none of the responsibilities.

The catch comes in the fact that the Filipinos are in a very real sense wards of the American government. They didn't ask for U. S. control. Should they now seek to eep what they once only accepted.

2 Hundred Million Gross Business Of FHA In Two Months

Washington, D. C., April 20 -The Federal Housing Administration has transacted gross business totaling nearly \$200,000,000 during the period of approximately two months since the signing of the amended National Housing Act, according to figures made public today by Administrator Stewart McDonald

This total includes mortgages selected for appraisal on small homes, applications for the insurance of mortgages on large scale projects and property improvement loans insured.

During the week ending April 9th mortgages selected for appraisal on small homes amounted to \$23,242,102. This represents a new high in FHA records. It compares with \$21,414,849 for the previous week and \$15,414,023 for the corresponding week a year ago.

Nearly 5,000 individual home mortgages were selected for appraisal by the Federal Housing Ad ministration each week during the month of March. This was an increase of approximately 100 per cent over the average of 2500 cases received each week in Febru-





Painting and trim are the two ornia and the Pacific Coast states. Expect some rare bargains in most conspicuous features of a house, the wiring and piping, even the plaster and floors are concealed behind these two items. Only the experienced observer looks be youd them.

> The house that is down at the heels can be brought up to date, thus increasing its value and improving the appearance of the entire neighborhood.

Before any repairs are made, a house should be checked for structural soundness. If the value of the property is to be maintained. it must be basically sound. Repairs of this order should be made

It is poor economy to agree to one less coat of paint or enamel in an effort to cut down the cost of building or repair. Before the work is started there should be a definite agreement as to the number of coats and the quality of the paint to be used.

Cheap millwork shows up in opened joints, warped edges, and raised grain. Grades of wood and methods of finish and joining should be agreed upon before the contract is signed. When it is necessary to cut down costs, it is better to omit nonessential features completely than to skimp on the quality of those contributing to fundamental soundness.





We wandered over to two of our beauty


We wandered over to two of our beauty
