## Rain Replenishes Depleted Moisture

Members of the board for the Muleshoe Area Hospital District met Friday evening at the Muleshoe City Hall.

The only business conducted was to canvass the votes for the Tuesday election to create the MAHD, and declare the election valid.

There will be no meeting of the MAHD on Wednesday, June 28, as members have many meetings and much checking to do before the next meeting.

Bailey County Commissioners will meet in Special Session on Friday, June 30, at 10 a.m. to consider the following items:

Open bids for caliche crusher; consider budget amendment to FY1989 budget; appoint election judge for voting box A; departmental reports and miscellaneous items.

On Monday, June 26, the board of trustees of the Muleshoe Independent School District will meet at 7:30 p.m. in regular session to consider the following items:

Under business will be re-evaluate school calendar for 1989-90 and make adjustments if needed; pass resolution for Texas School Services Foundation to handle the Educators Health Group Trust claims; adopt board policy Update 34; consider proposal by Durham Transportation to contract the school transportation services and take appropriate action; and discuss SB 1019 (school finance) and its impact on the MISD and take appropriate action.

Under informational reports will be board president; superintendent's report; assistant superintendent of business and assistant superintendent of instruction.

Under personnel considerations are pending resignations; report on personnel matters and discuss job openings and future concerns.

Due to a typing error, it was shown that 53 percent of the vote for the Muleshoe Area Hospital District at Lazbuddie, when in fact, 65 percent of the vote cast at Lazbuddie was for the creation of the Muleshoe Area Hospital District. The vote was 93-50 in the Tuesday election.

## MAHD Negotiating To Obtain WPMC From Current Board

All five members of the Muleshoe Area Hospital District Board, along with 12 others, attended the Wednesday night meeting of the board at the Muleshoe City Hall.

Because of a state law which says ballots must be held for 24 hours before an election can be certified, the board members scheduled a Friday, June 23 meeting to certify the Hospital District election held on Tuesday. In the meantime, the board, who had been named by the Texas Legislature to serve as Temporary Members, got down to 'brass tacks' as they started preliminary work to obtain West Plains Hospital and the Muleshoe Nursing Home.

City Manager Dave Marr, who has proven to be the 'anchor' for the temporary board, explained that he had visited with Carl Gilbert, manager of the Bailey County Appraisal District.

Gilbert informed Marr that the

Muleshoe ISD received notification from the Texas Education Agency that Mrs. Barbara Finney, Dillman Elementary principal and Dr. Lawrence Ward, superintendent of schools, were both accepted for the TEA 1989 Texas School Improvement Initiative Program this summer.

best way and fastest way to have tax money this fall will be for the Muleshoe Area Hospital District to contract with the Bailey County Appraisal District and Parmer County Appraisal District (separately), and use the appraisal values of properties in place now.

Marr said Gilbert had agreed to contact Parmer County Appraisal District to find out what type contracts they use.

The board is now faced with the question of exemptions -- what will be taxed and if they will offer discounts. It has been suggested that since the Muleshoe Independent School District and county both offer discounts, for the MAHD to offer discounts. This would allow combined statements, saving money for the hospital district.

Also discounts induce the major taxpayers to pay earlier, thus allowing the MAHD to have funds more quickly.

Marr also suggested that one of the first things the MAHD board should do is to hire an attorney with a lot of experience dealing with a public entity.

The City Manager commented, "Before entering into any agreement, you need to have an attorney check the instrument. As long as you handle business as a public entity, with the use of an attorney, you will have very little, if any, personal liability."

Board members Vance Wagon and Bob Finney were named to a committee to check into obtaining an attorney for the board.

MAHD President Buck Campbell said the work needed to start on transferring the hospital from the old board (WPMC Board) and where do we start?"

It was noted that the West Plains Medical Center Board had named current President Jim Burgess, along with member David Stovall, to a committee to meet with the MAHD Board for negotiations.

Bob Finney and Buck Campbell were chosen from the Hospital District Board to negotiate terms for obtaining the hospital.

John Chisholm, WPMC administrator, said he appreciated the MAHD Board members calling, and keeping the lines of communication open. "I was amazed and pleased to see that the vote was such a mandate by

the people."

"The existing staff and administration has done a remarkable job in staying open for the last few months," said Marr. "They are all to be congratulated, and we need to assure the current administration they are not in jeopardy."

According to Chairman Campbell, "Everybody in Muleshoe knows how the Nursing Home has been kept well and run well. And, John, everybody knows what you've been doing."

They were joined by Bob Finney, who added, "We want to reassure the hospital staff that our number one priority is to stabilize the situation as soon as we can to get the transfer done. In the meantime, John, reassure your people they have jobs -- we want them to stay. This community recognizes that great sacrifices have been made by your people, and the community has

## Thunder And Lightning Give Brilliant Display

Although the National Weather Service rain gauge in Muleshoe showed .63 in moisture, amounts received in the area on Wednesday amounted to slightly over one inch. Accompanied by brilliant lightning and booming thunder, the first rain fell late on Wednesday afternoon, inundating a dry area that quickly soaked up the moisture.

Moving in from the west, the clouds darkened the skies late in the afternoon, with the first rain beginning around 6 p.m.

Near midnight on Wednesday, another storm moved through the area, depositing a slow rain that continued through much of the night, soaking into dry, thirsty ground.

Surprised residents reached for heater controls, jackets and long sleeves on Thursday, when the temperature failed to climb.

As a heavy drizzle fell, the temperature only climbed three degrees throughout the day, reaching a high of 55. Many residents shivered through the day, as the low, heavy clouds kept the temperature low.

Cotton, which had survived earlier hail and wind, and was just beginning to progress, lost out to the cold, wet temperature, and producers were "waiting it out" to see if young crops were damaged by the wet weather.

All year, planting had been hampered by the lack of moisture, with very little measurable moisture received since

October, 1988. Many producers received rain too late to plant cotton, and were already looking to alternative crops for 1989.

To the north, the Lazbuddie area received just over an inch of moisture, forcing school buses to make their routes for summer school 'on pavement only.'

Skippy moisture also missed the southeast corner of Bailey County, with just .25 to .50 inch of rain received.

No reporting area received any hail in this area, although a couple of minor fires were reported from lightning.

In fact, the west side of Muleshoe was without electric power for around two hours Wednesday evening after lightning hit a transformer and knocked down a power line in the 200 block of West 19th Street.

SPS workmen quickly moved to the area of the downed power lines to restore power to residents of the west side of Muleshoe.

Some brief street flooding was reported, but the water quickly ran into area playa lakes, leaving motorists free to travel on the streets and highways.

On Friday afternoon, the sun finally broke through the clouds, and the temperature warmed to 82 degrees.

NWS predicted that isolated thunderstorms would continue through the weekend, with a slow

The doors will open at 7, with variety acts to begin promptly at 7:30 p.m.

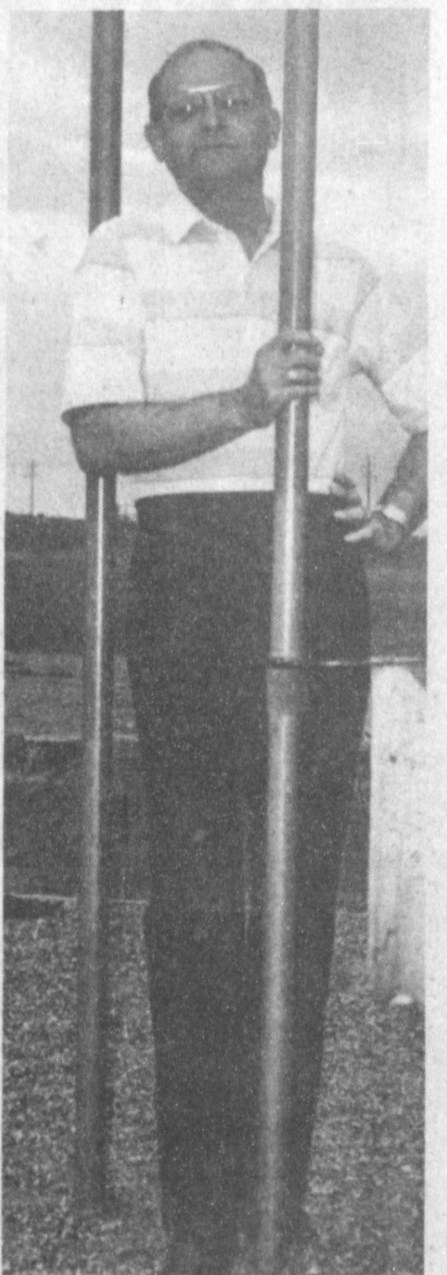

## Extension Programs Help Families Cope

Informal educational programs of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service address issues impacting the personal, family and economic well-being of citizens.

The aim of these programs is to develop life skills so that individuals and families are better equipped to prevent the negative impact of issues and to make informal decisions for optimum benefits not only for themselves but to their communities and society overall.

Nowhere is that aim more evident than in the Extension Service's home economics programs. Below are a number of issues that the Extension Service has addressed for some time, with figures relating to the past year.

--Feeding the poor; In the Expanded Food and Nutrition Education Program, almost 20,000 low-income homemakers and more than 12,000 youths are taught how to cut food bills while improving their diets. A series of video tapes were prepared to teach basic family nutrition to families with limited incomes.

--Housing costs: Programs have focused on helping families with marketing techniques to get the most value from their homes in a depressed housing market. Some 4,600 homeowners and 2,000 realtors plus lenders and real estate inspectors have been involved. Cooperative programs with the Farmers Home Administration have addressed the rural housing delinquency problem.

--Water quality: Teaching resources on water quality, including a video tape, were prepared to inform consumers about cost-effective water quality management and water quality

issues.  
--Child safety: Teaching parents of young children how to prevent life-threatening injuries in automobile accidents is a major educational effort. Programs and resource materials deal with selection and correct use of a child restraint seat.

Programs also have focused on creating an awareness of effects of alcohol and drug abuse through Project Celebration, in which alternatives to drugs and alcohol are provided during such celebration times as graduations and homecomings. More than 166,000 elementary school-aged children have been involved in this project, and another 84,000 have increased their awareness of ways to prevent drunk and impaired driving.

Special parenting effectiveness programs are being conducted with parents and children in cooperation with juvenile pro-

bation officers.

--Latchkey children: Efforts have been under way to help the increasing number of school-aged children responsible for their own after-school care. More than 50,000 youths have taken part in the Extension Service's self-care program.

--Alternatives to institutional care of elderly: More than 4,000 Texas families have availed themselves of programs on managing caregiver stress, understanding care alternatives in local communities, understanding aging and forming Alzheimer's support groups.

--Unemployment: Workshops on home-based businesses have been conducted as a means of family economic survival and community economic development.

--Wellness, diet quality and

disease prevention: Educational efforts have focused on employee wellness programs, including a computerized health risk appraisal, food borne illnesses, and heart-healthy dietary guidelines.

--Child care: Some 400 child care providers took part in a 30-hour self-instruction program the past year. In addition, about 1,000 providers annually are learning more about quality child care through an intensive six-hour training program.

--Leadership: Efforts focus on developing leadership and public policy decision-making skills of women and other family members to resolve important family-related public issues.

--Economic disadvantage of young adults: This new program is addressing the financial needs of young couples and what it costs to manage a household.

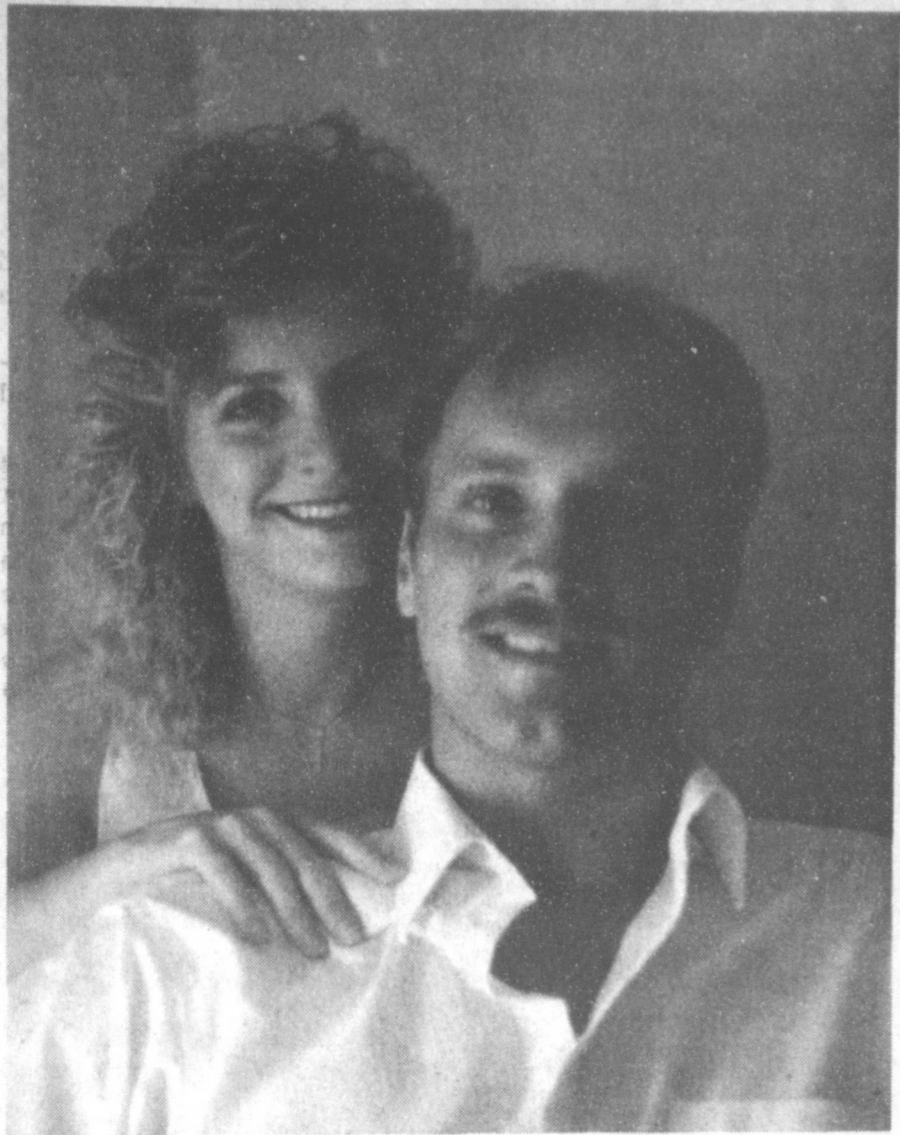

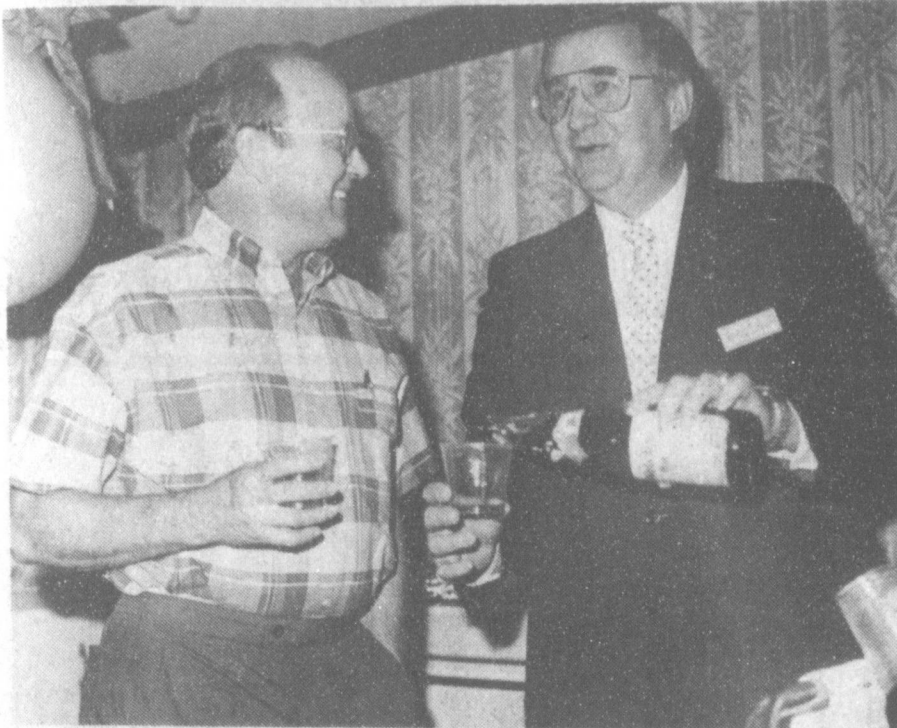

## PEST MANAGEMENT UPDATE

Parmer-Bailey Counties

The severe thunderstorms that passed through Parmer and Bailey counties a week ago did not help area crops. Although ample rain fell in many areas, it was accompanied by damaging winds and hail, so many more acres of cotton have been lost.

It is just about too late to replant cotton in this area and many producers are looking to alternative crops such as soybeans, grain sorghum, and sunflowers. Pinto and other dry beans could also possibly be another alternative. Producers who plant late sorghum should be aware that midge infestation may be a problem and be prepared to apply insecticides if needed. Last year, late sorghum in northern Bailey County had

severe infestations of midge; so resistant varieties should also be considered. Also, many herbicide products used pre-plant incorporated or pre-emergence in cotton can severely damage or kill grain sorghum.

As stated earlier soybeans are another alternative. Treflan and Prowl used in cotton will not hurt soybeans and the crop can be planted over a wide range of dates. Late planting of soybeans results in shorter stalks so the combine missed a good portion of the lower seed pods. The use of varieties that fall within the late Group IV and Group V maturity groups will help alleviate this problem. Other cultural practices which encourage stalk growth include higher seeding rates (65

to 70 pounds of seed per acre), planting a single row per bed, and early irrigation.

Sunflowers are also a possible alternative although contracting is the only way to insure having a buyer.

### COTTON

Much of the cotton that has not been destroyed is beginning to show symptoms of Aschochyta or wet weather blight. This disease is characterized by brown, dead areas on the leaves.

Though the best cure is hot, dry, sunny weather, plowing and aerating the roots as soon as possible will help. Now that much of the cotton in the area is squaring, producers should watch for cotton fleahoppers. Fields having high infestations of silverleaf nightshade (white weed), or mintweed especially, need to be checked for this pale green, oval, 1/8 inch long pest.

### CORN

Much of the corn in the area has also suffered much damage. Although few fields have been lost, most plants have stripped leaves and loss of leaf area. There are a couple of good points to the recent storms. The rains seem to have helped reduce the early spider mite populations that were building in area fields. Also, observations in past years have indicated that mites have a harder time colonizing on shredded up corn leaves.

Those producers still having high spider mite numbers in their fields are primarily looking to Comite and dimethoate. Remember, Comite is a contact and not a systematic insecticide, so coverage is a must. It is suggested not to let the corn grow above chest high and certainly pretassel if planning on applying this product.

The Texas Corn Growers Association requested a Section 18 for the use of Capture for the High Plains region. The Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA) is preparing the request submission to EPA. Tests done over the last few years with this product show excellent control of Banks grass mites and southwestern corn borers using chemigation; both through conventional drops and LEPA (Low Energy Precision Application). Aerial application of Capture seems to give sporadic control of spider mites at this time. Remember, Capture has not been approved for application on corn but we should hear within the next few weeks of the outcome on the Section 18 request.

## Lawn Care May Require More Exercise

1. For best results, the "Don't Bag It" Lawn Care Plan recommends mowing every five to six days instead of once a week or longer. Isn't that more work?

Not really. Cutting grass before it's overgrown is easier and faster. Plus, you save the time and effort it takes to bag grass clippings and to put the bags out for garbage pickup. Previous "Don't Bag It" lawn demonstrators reported less trouble overall. And don't forget, yardwork is good exercise!

2. Will grass clippings cause thatch if left on the lawn?

No. Thatch is a layer of organic material composed of plant parts

that include roots, rhizomes, crowns and stolons -- not the grass leaf or blade that you cut when you mow. The parts that cause thatch have a high lignin content, a substance very slow to decompose. Grass clippings do not contain much lignin and decompose fairly rapidly, returning valuable nutrients to soils.

3. My mower has a side discharge. What can I do about the unsightly rows of clippings left on my lawn when I remove the bag attachment?

If you leave a side discharge chute open, the grass clippings will blow out in small rows. When you close the chute, the clippings will be cut in smaller pieces by the mower blade and spread evenly beneath the mower.

Rear discharge mowers have an automatic trap door that closes when the bag attachment is removed. Most side discharge mowers have a trap door that can be lowered or attached manually.

If your mower lacks a trap door, ask a lawn equipment service dealer to install one.

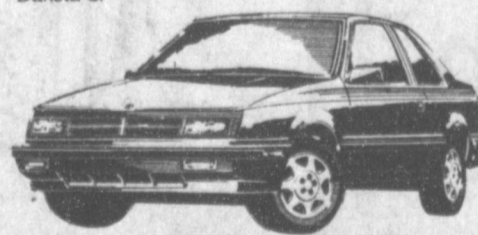

The *Lubbock Avalanche Journal* of June 21, 1989 had a front page article, "Bailey Parmer Electors Approve Hospital District." The news item stated, "Election results from Muleshoe showed 1,518 votes for the measure and 139 against, while voters in Lazbuddie approved the proposition by a vote of 93-50."

I was one of those 189 who voted against. 1,611 voters want my tax dollars to pay for their

hospital and their medical care. 188 voters and myself wanted to be responsible for our own hospitalization and medical care. We 188 voters will be subsidizing that 1,611 voters' medical care.

All registered voters were eligible to vote on the hospital district tax. Any qualified voter did not have to own any real estate property on which to be assessed the tax. So we 189 who voted against the hospital district tax will be required to subsidize those who pay no property tax.

Voters having no personal property to be taxed will not be burdened by hospital district taxation. So they had a good financial reason to vote for the hospital district tax.

We personal property taxpayers, especially the 189 who voted against the hospital district tax, will be anxiously concerned about how the hospital administration spends our tax dollars.

The tax money raised will be a magnet to medical suppliers to offer every kind of imperitively needed equipment, supplies and personnel. We taxpayers can look forward soon to another election for voting an increase on the present 25 cents per \$100.00 assessed valuation limitation.

The state regulated maximum is 75 cents per \$100.00 assessed valuation. It is only a matter of time until the taxpayer will be asked to vote for a 75 cents per \$100.00 assessed valuation tax.
