Nov. Employment **Drops Slightly Over** Oct. Total In Texas

Austin, Dec. 22-Reports to the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research from more than 1,800 Texas establishments employing more than 88,000 workers with a weekly payroll of \$2,143,-000 during November, indicated a decrease of 1 per cent in the number of workers from the month before, but an increase of 55 per cent over November last year. while payrolls declined 2.4 per per cent from October but were 13 per cent above November, 1936.

Cities in which the increase of both employment and payrolls were above the average increase for the state were Amarillo, Denison, El Paso, Houston, Laredo and Wichita Falls,



Auto Registrations Show Sharp Drop In **Texas For November**

Austin, Dec. 22-Registrations of new automobiles in Texas during November declined sharply in comparison with the corresponding month last year, and there was a moderate decline from the preceding month, according to the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research.

Reports from fifteen representa tive Texas counties indicate a total of 4,528 new automobile sales during November, a decrease of 8.6 per cent from the preceding month and 29.1 per cent from Nov ember last year. Aggregate sales for the year-to-date were 60,393. a decline of 3.6 per cent from the

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

Denton, Dec. 22-Do you have turkey trouble? Do you approach Christmas day with fear and trembling as to whether your masterpiece will be too tough to chew? Here are some pointers that may help you.

Cooking time of the fowl depends on the age and weight. Young birds, about a year old and weighing nine to twelve pounds, are rather softmeated and take around three hours roasting. Older ones, weighing fourteen to sixteen pounds, have firmer flesh and hardened breast bones. They take from four to five hours, or about 20 minutes per pound.

The dressed bird should be care fully inspected for feathers, singed, the body cavity wiped out with a soft, damp cloth, and the outinto soda water.

Roast Turkey With Oyster Stuffing

Sprinkle inside of a 14 pound with small cutter. turkey with mixture of tablespoon of salt and one fourth teaspoon pepper. Stuff with oyster dressing, packing in rather firmly, Truss and place in uncovered roasting pan. Brush all over with unsalted fat. Protect bony ends of legs by wrapping with fatsoaked pieces of cloth. If any part of turkey browns too fast, cover with slices of bread soaked in drippings. Baste with drippings from time to time. Continue to cook in slow oven (300 F.) until bird is evenly brown. Allowing 20 minu-for our students who are home for be required.

in 1 cup butter until tender) Clean 1 and one half pints of oysters; strain the juice. Add juice to bread crumb mixture. Fold in oysters.

Rricasse of Young Turkey (Sixteen to twenty servings) Cut 8 pound young turkey into pieces for serving. Simmer in water to cover until almost tender. Remove from broth and arrange in layer in roasting pan. Brown 1/4 cup finely chopped onion in 1/2 cup butter in large frying pan. Add one half cup flour and stir until smooth and well blended. Remove from heat and add broth (about 5 cups). Cook over low heat until creamy, stirring constantly. Season with 2 teaspoons salt and 1/4 teaspoon pepper. Stir in 1 cup coffee cream. Pour over pieces of turkey. Heat in moderate oven (350 F.) until boiling. Cover with small baking powder biscuits Cook in hot oven (400 F.) for 12 to 15 minutes, or until biscuits are brown.

For Biscuits

Cut 1/2 cup fat into 4 cups flour, side scrubbed with a cloth dipped sifted with 4 teaspoons baking powder and 1 teaspoon salt. Beat 2 eggs and mix with 1 cup milk. Add liquid to dry ingredients Roll about 1/2 inch thick and cut






A Comfortable Cottage That Blends With the Soil

Certain architectural types are fitted to certain localities. The Spanish type cottage here pictured and planned is one that simply melts in with the West Texas landscape. The design lends itself equally well to construction in stucco, rock, or adobe.

A feature of the plan is the accessibility of the out-of-doors. French windows in living room and dining room open on small iron bannister enclosed porches. Another modern touch is the divided chimney, permitting an opening to the outside over the fireplace to replace the conventional picture or mirror. The plan offers a large living room, dining room, small kitchen, two bedrooms and two baths.

This plan will meet full approval of the Federal Housing Administration and may be financed through the W. K. Ewing Co. of San Antonio under the F-HA plan.
