Mason Added To **Grid Conference** For 1939 Season

District 41-B Changed To 8-B With Seven Clubs In District

Next football season, that of 1939, will find Ozona playing in seven-club circuit and its district number changed from 41-B to 8-B, according to an announcement of reclassification of schools for football announced from the bureau of public schools, extracurricular activities, of the University of Texas, division of extension, a copy of which was received this week by Supt. C. S. Denham.

Under the new set-up, effective in 1939, Mason high school will be added to the present 41-B district, of which Ozona high school is a member. The new circuit, to be known as District 8, B conference, will be composed of Eldorado, Junction, Mason, Menard, Ozona, Rocksprings and Sonora.

Under the new rules, larger chools of the state will be regrouped in a new classification, to be known as AA. Class AA schools will include those with enrollment of 500 or more the previous year. Conference A classification is given those schools with an enrollment less than 500 and more than 200, and conference B classification is given schools enrolling less







Wall Or Fence Along Lot Lines Adds To Privacy

The privacy as well as the appearance of a house may be enrelatively inexpensive.

The kind of enclosure used can ness. be determined by the type of architecture of the house. Colonial cottages and frame houses in general call for a white picket fence or a neatly clipped hedge. The fences may be selected from many styles ranging from the least expensive type with plain flat palings to the more ornate variety with rounded pickets and fanlight gate.

Brick dwellings of Georgian architecture are best framed by masonry walls. These may be any height desired, according to conditions. If the house is situated on a busy street, and complete privacy is desired, a high wall that completely shuts out the view from the s. et is suggested. Under other conditions a lower wall is usually desirable.

Spanish or Mediterranean architecture is best complemented by a stucco wall, although hedges of various types are also used effec-




