Flood Control, Recreational Value To Ozona Cited

SEEK GOV'T. AID

Lakes Would Be Tremendous Asset To Town

Torrential rains in the area the past week-end which sent the two draws coursing through Ozona outside their banks twice within a twenty-four hour period resulted in the birth of agitation which may result in one of the greatest flood control and recreational development projects ever undertaken for Ozona if an idea now being mulled by officials and a large group of citizens can be successfully presecuted.

The sight of the raging torrents, carrying millions of gallons of precious water, lifeblood of the livestock industry, down to already swollen rivers and ultimately to the Gulf of Mexico caused the simultaneous expression from dozens of citizens of the idea that has been in the minds of many for years-damming of the draws above Ozona to control flood water and to impound lakes which could | billy. be used for recreational purposes.

The need for a swimming pool in Ozona, an obsession with many for years, the great distance of the town from any stream, and the constant menace of floods as a result of the uncontrolled draws are factors influencing the growing sentiment in favor of the county undertaking some such project. The feasibility of damming John son draw at a point north of Ozona where a minimum length structure would be necessary to connect highlands and successfully dam the flood stream, and turn excess waters through a cut to carry the overflow away from the town and protect the dam from damage by extreme high waters has been attested by engineers (Continued On Page Seven)

Five Voters Mark Ballots On Bank Of Flooded Draw

Judge Davidson Nearly Missed Five Votes When He And Family Became Water Bound

County Judge Charles E. Davidson nearly lost five votes in his unopposed candidacy for re-election in Saturday's primary. The five voters were on one side of a flood- swollen draw and the voting place was on the other side, and but for an intrepid election 83rd Birthday official the two might not have been brought together.

It was Judge and Mrs. Davidson, and Mr. and Mrs. Charley Davidson, Jr., who started to town to vote Saturday. They found the Gurley draw out of bank and impossible to cross. They called A. J. Sparks, water works employe, who went with his truck to attempt to drag the Davidson car across. But the water was too high for the truck also and it took the help of several residents of the Mexican sector to get the truck out-on the other side. And there not voted.

They attempted to make it across the fair grounds and to the highway east of town and thence in over the bridge. Scott Peters, cashier of the Ozona National Bank and an avowed supporter of Ernest Thompson in the recent campaign, bowed gracefully to the will of a half million Texans who put W. Lee O'Daniel, Fort Worth flour man, in the governor's office by the greatest land slide in the state's history. Now one of the most prominent displays in the bank lobby is a 48pound sack of Hillbilly Flour, product of the FortWorth man's mill, with the name of W. Lee O'Daniel on the label and the slogan which caught the ear of well over half the voters of Texas - "Please Pass the Biscuits, Pappy.

The banker came by the sack of Hillbilly flour by "trading horses" on his own terms. Early in the campaign he was instrumental in erecting a big Thompson- For- Governor sign on a downtown building. Monday morning, after the unprecedented vote had lifted O'Daniel from a field of twelve candidates for a clear majority to the nomination, Mr. Peters telephoned Mike Couch, local Hillbilly flour deal er, with a proposition to trade the big sign for a sack of Hill-

Mr. Couch snappel up the trade without hesitation and within a few minutes appeared at the bank with the sack of flour. The two then took down the sign and it was tendered in payment for the sack of flour.

Mr. Peters says the only difficulty he now faces is learning to dance to Hillbilly music but supposes it won't take him long to get the hang of it.

The popularity of each of the the legislative post is attested by the substantial vote each received in his own county. In Rocksprings Mr. Gilmer swept the field with 653 votes to 35 for Blackburn and 15 for Taylor. In Kerr county, Mr. Taylor polled 1,353 to 1,088 fo Gilmer and 424 for Blackburn And in Kimble County, Blackburn came through with a vote of 1,141 to 264 for Gilmer and 25 for Tay-

On the basis of nearly complete returns from counties in the district, Mr. Gilmer is shown to have carried five, Mr. Blackburn four and Mr. Taylor one. Blackburn's heaviest vote was in his own coun ty. Kimble, and in Mason and Menard. He carried Bandera by one vote in the incomplete returns 200 to 199 for Gilmer. Gilmer' lead was piled up with his lead in his home county, Edwards, in Real, Sutton, Schleicher and Crockett. In Kerr county, which went for Taylor, Gilmer's vote was more than double that for Black-

RAIN RECORDS SHATTERED BY 7-INCH FALL

Week- End Downpours Estimated Some Areas Up To 15 Inches

Flood Damage Heavy In Many Sections; None Here

Rain records for mid-summer were shattered by unprecedented rains here and throughout most of Texas the past week-end, rains which will mean millions of dollars in the pockets of ranchmen and residents of the range coun-

From a mere seven inches recorded at the Joe Oberkampf rain gauge in Ozona to upwards of fifteen inches reported in many sections of the county, the rains extended in all directions and resulted in the most damaging floods in history at Brady, San Saba, and Menard, halted highway traffic through the area and washed out many bridges and damaged highways.

Starting the middle of last week the rains rode in on fall-like temperatures. Falling slowly, the moisture had amounted to more than an inch by last Thursday morning. Employment Up, But Payrolls Down In June Texas Survey

Austin, July 27-Total employment in 2,791 Texas establishments during June was up 0.2 per cent from May but down 8.0 per cent from June last year; while pay rolls were down 2.2 per cent from May and 5.8 per cent from June a year ago, according to the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research.

Employment in 679 manufactur ing establishments was up 0.6 per cent from May but down 11.5 per cent from June last year; while pay rolls in these establishments were down 2.9 per cent from May and 8.4 per cent from June a year

It is the establishment of fenced areas which offer the birds abundant food and cover in which to build their nests and hide from their enemies.

As described in a bulletin by Valgene W. Lehmann, field biologist, and just published by the Game Department, the plots should be about a half acre in size and properly planted so they will be well stocked with food. They may be square or rectangular in

"There are many quail ranges n Texas that produce few quail because they are overgrazed by cattle, sheep and goats, or cultivated so intensely that little food er cover is left for birds," Lehmann writes.

He added that experiments with the fenced shelters had been made in Wharton county. They did not, interfere with normal farm and ranch operations, and resulted in an increase of the quail popula tion. Fourteen of the 16 plots established, he said, held coveys of quail the following fall and winter. In some instances the shelters vere located on the or fully two miles from territory where quail had been known to winter before and Lehmann found they attracted and held coveys.

The fenced shelters, Lehmann found, can be established at little cost, and can be made to produce quick results.

Two types of shelters are recommended, one for regions having native cover, and the other for regions where no native cover is present and must be created artificially by brush piles. Crops planted in the shelters should be rotated.

In his bulletin Lehmann inclules a diagram showing how the two types of shelters should be constructed.

Full instructions for establishment of the shelters are included in the leaflet, which may be secured free upon request from the Texas Game, Fish and Oyster Com mission, Walton Building, Austin.

Evidence that Texas sportsmen are living up to the name was found in the June fine and arrest report of the Game Department. Only 46 of the state's 254 counties reported game and fish law violations.

There is an old law on the statute books providing that fish ladders shall be constructed at all dams in Texas. The law, said Will J. Tucker, Game Department secretary, was passed about 50 years ago, when the U.S. Bureau of Fisheries stocked Texas' warmwater streams with salmon, rainbow trout and shad, all of which are cold- water fish and which expired almost as soon as they were planted in Texas. These fish are 'climbers." In the spawning season they go upstream to bring on their young. Hence the fish ladder law.

There are still fishermen who believe fish ladders should be erected for bass and crappie. But these fish, it has been determined. are not climbers, Tucker said. A bass won't climb over two feet.



But there has been more mystery concerning fish, and albeit more faith. We have fondly clug to the idea that some day we will find a better fishing place, when the signs are right, and then we shall clean up.

We have accepted the fact of seining, netting, trot- lining, snag lining, and commercialization of our inland fish resources. We have been content to pass beneficial laws for a few localities, which are paragons of virture in comparison to the general laws. We have gone to the extreme of providing a different law for each side of a stream. We have accepted a few fish conservation crumbs when we were starving for a full meal. We have been timid indeed, or we lack the ability to act concertedly, or we have been profligate. The Legislature, you may be sure, is anxious to do what the people want done.

I believe that we should understand that a few decades ago there were more fish for every person in Texas, who desired to fish, than there could be at this time, even if the fish were protected by regulations that are now urged. For mer inaccessibility of fishing places was the reason there was some good fishing left, even for this generation. There is yet no such guarantee given for the fu-






defeit. A seven inch crappie is not yet a fish of a size for food purposes, when tail and head are gone. Eight inch minimum for crappie would be better. Catfish. except bullheads, should not be taken until they are at least 12 inches in length. They are usually somewhat larger before they spaw. Bluegill, other bream, goggle-eye and yellow bass should be at least five inches long before being retained. The white bass size minimum should be nine in-

There should be no commercialization of minnows and other forage foods taken from our public waters. We can't have fish if we rob them of their food supply. Let the fisherman take his own supply of bait. Let the dealer raise those he wants to sell. That is cheaper than capturing, anyhow.

At present time there is such a diversity of fish laws found in the statutes of Texas that it is difficult for the best informed law-
