
The P.-T. A. sponsored carnial is scheduled to open its doors or an evening's entertainment or the entire community at 6 o'clock this evening under the rees in the city park,

Valuable Collection Added To Library of University of Texas

AUSTIN, Oct. 12 .- The University of Texas library has announced the acquisition of the famous Garcia Icazbalceta collection of Mexican historical documents and books, which, added to the already imposing Garcia library at that institution, affords that school the most extensive and complete assemblage of Mexicana in the world, outside of Mexico, it was stated.


The Ic composed of 160 volumes. rare in its own right, and 50,000 pages of manuscript, including the original of one of four letters written by the explorer Hernando Cortez to Emperor Charles V of Spain, dated October 15, 1524. It is a beautiful document and in an excellent state of preservation. In the opinion of collectors. "there is no measuring stick by which to appraise its spiritual value." "To have acquired such a library will be of incalculable credit to the University for all time," Donald Coney, university librarian said. "Garcia Icazbalceta's reputation as an historian and collector of the sixteenth century of Mexico is such that the acquisition of his collection from his grandson would be comparable to obtaining the collection of such well known historians of the past as Gibbon or the great Chilean historian and bibliophile Jose Torobio Medina." In discussing the printed works in the collection, Dr. Carlos E. Castaneda, Latin-American librarian at the university declared: "The most valuable portion of the printed items are the Mexican imprints of the sixteenth century. comprising 48 works, Although there is conclusive evidence that a printing press was in operation in Mexixco by 1539, the earliest production known is the famous

The Federal Housing Administration, in a bulletin that deals with suggestions for the planning of small houses, makes the following recommendations for paint-

Exterior trim should be back-

Exterior of house proper should be given three coats of oil paint coat paint, following the manufacturer's instructions in either case. Painted masonry should receive two coats, preferably of a cementbase paint.


Interior woodwork should have, at least three coats (either three) coats of flat paint or two coats of fat and one of enamel).


