



Pneumonia Season Is At Hand, Warns Health Officer

AUSTIN, Nev. 9. - Though pneumonia may and does occur at all seasons of the year, the winter months see the highest incidence of this disease. With relatively few cases during the summer, an increase in pneumonia is observed with the advent of fall, usually quite noticeable in November. which continues through December, January, February and March; before the number of cases again declines to the "warm weather" level. The time is therefore quite short before the beginning of the so called "pneumonia season," states Dr. Geo. W. Cox. state health officer.

"Lobar pneumonia is an infections disease. In well over 90 per cent of the cases it is caused by one of the 32 types of the pneumoccus germ. Against some but by no means all of these varieties of the pneumovous, serums have been developed which have proven extremely beenficial in the treatment of preumonia cases caused by these particular types. The primary causes of fire cumlate within the home. losses in homes are four: Improperly built flues, defective wiring, READ THE ADS -SAVE MONEY careless handling of matches and cigarettes, and spontaneous com-

Control may be exerted over the first cause by never allowing a furnace fire to stay too hot for a long period, and by examining flues and cleaning them before putting the furnace into duty for

The chances of fire breaking out because of defective wiring can be minimized by seeing that there is no overloading and that cords of all accessories are in good condi-

The third cause mentioned is altogether controllable by the exercise of ordinary care. Fire should be kept away from curtains, cigarettes should not be left burning in ash trays or on mantles, matches should not be thrown in waste baskets and should be kept in safe places.

The matter of spontaneous combustion is controllable when its cause is understood. Oily rags or
