General Rains **Relieve Drouth On Range Lands**

Fall of 2-Inch Average Thought in Time to Make Winter Feed

Following on the heels of heavy showers which covered most of the surrounding country Saturday and Sunday, general rains, falling slowly, gave Crockett county and a large area of West Texas ranch ands a long awaited soaking, wetting at long last many spotted areas which were suffering from serious drouth.

The week-end falls, from Saturday through Tuesday, brought a total of approximately two inches of moisture over most of Crockett county, some sections receiving more and some less. Drouth areas, some receiving the first moisture of any consequence since Spring, were soaked and ranchmen were jubilant over the falls which came early enough to produce feed on livestock ranges for the winter months.

The general rains, too, were expected to bolster sagging livestock prices. Although there were no reports of sales of lambs this week, it is believed that buyers will raise their ante before many days for the lambs remaining on West Texas ranges.

A total of 2.1 inches of moisture was registered at the Joe Oberkampf gauge for the week-end, the heaviest fall, a torrential shower Saturday afternoon acounting for 1.33 inches of the total. Sunday, the slow-falling genl inneh cmfw Low hanging clouds continued to ties of the state.



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
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A Pock-Marked Jap Seaplane







In another cave Japanese soltiers made a suicide stand. A lame thrower was brought up and the flame directed into the mouth of the cave. An estimated 200 bodies were taken out. One very deep cave which was known to have several Japs in it was approached by a Japanese language interpreter who urged them to surrender. When they refused, smoke grenades were thrown in. When this failed, the mouth of the cave was blasted shut with explosives.

In many of the caves the Japanese had installed electric lights. Quantities of food and supplies were stored inside and they offered excellent positions for machineguns. Saipan's own battle of "Bloody Ridge" was fought






