## Sgt. Sanchez Wins Silver Star For Gallantry

### Ozonan, Tank Driver In Famed 4th Armored Div., Decorated

With the Fourth Armored Division. — Sergeant Enrique E. Sanchez, 28, nephew of Mr. and Mrs. Eugenio Arellano, Box 255, Ozona, Texas, medium tank driver with the 8th Tank Battalion, has been cited for gallantry in action and awarded the Silver Star by order of Brigadier General William M. Hoge, commanding the Fourth Armored Division.

The citation reads in part: "The Silver Star Medal is awarded to Sergeant Enrique E. Sanchez, 38-974200, Company 'A', 8th Tank Battalion, U. S. Army, for gallantry in action against the enemy at Voellerdingen, France, on December 4, 1944. Driving the first tank into Voellerdingen, Sergeant Sanchez drove through the mined underpass with such care that he avoided the charges and marked the safest route for the rest of the column. When enemy fire knocked out his tank and injured Sergeant Sanchez, he coolly administered first aid to himself and refused to be evacuated. The courage and devotion to duty displayed by Sergeant Sanchez reflect great credit upon himself and the armed forces of the United States."

Sgt. Sanchez has recovered from his injuries and returned to duty with his organization.

Inducted January 16, 1942, Sgt. Sanchez has been overseas more than a year with the Fourth Armored Division. He participated in the crack tank division's race across France after the Normandy breakthrough, the relief of the encircled American garrison at Bastogne, Belgium, and the Fourth Armored's spectacular drive into central Germany.

## High Wind Damages Fair Park Grandstand In Last Night's Blow

High winds which lashed Ozona last night, to the accompaniment of intermittent rain and hail and a violent electrical display, resulted in several hundred dollars worth of damage to the Crockett County Fair Association's grandstand at the fair park.

The wind, screeching down from the northeast, lifted the grandstand top, shattering supporting timbers and scattering sheet iron in a tangle of wreckage. Fair officials this morning had not made a survey to determine the extent of the damage.

The wind whipped leaves and small branches from trees, and did slight damage in other sections of the city. For a few minutes large hail stones peppered down, but the fall was not heavy enough to do much damage. Only a light shower of rain accompanied the disturbance.

These matadors will fight to death four ferocious bulls from the famous "Las Playas" herd, and bull fight fans are promised plenty of excitement and thrills in Sunday's exhibition.

Macarena, the new bull ring in Villa Acuna, is one of the newest and best constructed arenas on the Mexican border, and will seat 4,000 people.

Sunday's fight will start promptly at 4 p.m., the promoters announce.

## Swimming Pool To Open for New Season Sunday

### Wading Pool, Improved Bath House New Features This Year

Ozona's swimming pool atop the water works hill, made available to Ozonans for the first time last summer, will open for the summer season at 2 o'clock next Sunday afternoon. Bill Cooper, water department manager, announced this week.

Carlton Smith, Junior in Ozona High School, has accepted the position as pool manager and life saver. Mr. Cooper announced and will be in charge of its operation this summer.

Extensive improvements have been made on the pool during the summer. A new feature this year will be a wading pool for small children. The wading pool was built up on the northeast side of the pool to provide a depth of from 20 to 24 inches. It will be roped off for the safety of small children.

The bath house, which was only partly completed last year, has been finished and painted, Mr. Cooper said. Holes in the bottom of the pool have been filled to facilitate cleaning and all equipment made ready for the opening Sunday afternoon.

Admission charges this year will be 15 cents for children through grade school age and 30 cents for high school students and adults. A reduction of approximately 17 percent from this admission charge for each swim, however, may be earned through a season ticket system to be offered this year. Tickets good for 40 swims for grade school and younger children or 20 swims for high school students and adults, a \$6 value, will be sold for \$5, the pool manager to punch each ticket with each swim. These tickets will be available for purchase when the pool opens Sunday afternoon.

## Gulf to Drill Deep Wilcat Test In Western Crockett

Gulf Oil Corp. filed application Tuesday for a permit to drill a proposed 10,000-foot rotary wildcat in western Crockett County 10 miles east of Sheffield.

The test, due to start May 5, will be 660 feet out of the northeast corner of section 12-29-U, about six miles southeast of the Clara Couch field. The lease is the north half of the section.

The deep exploration will be in fulfillment of an obligation assumed by Frank G. Montague of Tyler in purchasing leases on a block of 4,160 acres for a cash bonus of \$9,000 at the University Lands auction at Austin Feb. 16. The deal provides starting of a test within 180 days.

The block consists of the east half of section 2, the east half of section 9, all sections 10 and 11, of section 4, southwest quarter of section 9, all sections 10 and 11, north half of 12, north half of 13 and all sections 14 and 15 in University block 29.

## Crockett's 7th War Loan Quota Set at \$310,000

### \$120,000 Goal for Individual Buyers of Series E Bonds

Crockett county has been assigned an over-all quota of \$310,000 in the Seventh War Loan drive, which officially opens May 14 and continues through the month of June, Scott Peters, Crockett County War Finance Chairman, was notified in a letter received this week from Nathan Adams, state chairman of the War Finance Committee for Texas.

It had previously been announced that this county had been given a quota of \$120,000 for sale of Series E bonds to individual buyers, the balance of \$190,000 to be taken in sales to corporations and large individual buyers.

"Even with the success of our armies in Europe, the country's need for money remains extremely high," Mr. Adams wrote the local chairman in announcing the county's quota. "The Pacific War will be costly and probably long. Since there will be only two War Loan Drives this year, we must exert every effort on sales to individuals, particularly in E bonds. Those communities in which War Bonds are widely held will be fortified in the post war adjustment period."

## Schneemann Tells Experiences with Midway Garrison

### Ozonan Stationed with Marines on Island For 21 Months

An account of his 21 months as stationed on Midway Island in the Pacific was given by Marine Philip Schneemann before members of Ozona Rotary Club and their guests at the regular luncheon of the club Tuesday at noon.

Young Schneemann, after brief training in the United States, sailed on one of the pre-war luxury liners, in war-time use as a troop transport, to Honolulu. After a few weeks there, he was transferred to Midway, and except for a brief period of special training in Hawaii, was stationed there until a few weeks ago when he started on the return trip to the States.

The Marine garrison was always on the alert on the "lonely island," Schneemann said, every man assigned his battle station and required to man his station at the sound of gun fire.

"It got pretty lonesome sometimes standing watch on the beaches," Philip said. "But it was not hard to get some company if it got too lonesome — just fire a couple of rounds and your buddies would all come out of their beds."

Several Jap subs were sighted at times off shore of the island, attempting to sneak in to shell the Marines, the speaker said, but none ever got a chance. Young Schneemann is back in the States for a period of special college training after which he will be given opportunity to attend officer candidate school. Sgt. Max Schneemann, Jr., also here for a visit with his parents, and Max Schneemann, Sr., father of the boys, were club guests. H. L. ## Crockett-Val Verde Officials Ask Highway Aid

### Delegations Meet with State Commission on Paving of 163

Assuring post war consideration of federal and state highway officials of the need for paving of the final 33-mile gap of unpaved road on Highway 163 south from Ozona to Comstock, where it connects with paving into Del Rio, county officials from Crockett and Val Verde counties placed their brief for closing the gap before the Texas Highway Commission in Austin the first of this week.

County Judge Houston Smith and Commissioners Rob Miller, J. W. Owens and E. R. Kinser joined with Judge Poole and members of the Vel Verde county Commissioners Court in an appearance before the Commission in Austin to put in the two-county bid for completion of the paving as a part of the federal government's post-war farm-to-market highway building program.

At present, there is only the 20-mile stretch of paving south from Ozona which was surfaced a few years ago under an issue of \$104,000 in Crockett county bonds, an unused portion of the 1930 paving issue in this county, which issue later was assumed by the state for payment. Work is in progress now, however, on the paving of an additional 30 miles of the highway from Comstock north to the Devil's River springs. This paving work is being done by the Del Rio maintenance division of the State Highway Department, the department having failed to secure bids on the work when advertised.

When this 30-mile stretch is completed there will remain a 33-mile section unpaved, 21 miles of it in Vel Verde county and 12 miles in Crockett county.

It was this section which the Crockett and Val Verde officials called to attention of the State Highway Commission, presenting full information on the condition of the road and its importance to traffic in this area, particularly as a farm-to-market road. The federal government had laid plans for an extensive highway construction program after the war as a means of cushioning the shock of reconversion. It is under this program, in which the state will be required to match federal dollars, that officials of the two counties and the Highway Commission hope to complete the paving between Ozona and Del Rio as a postwar project.

Approved by Commissioners Courts of each county and by the district highway engineer of the district, the project was apparently in order for favorable consideration when the time comes. It was accepted and filed by the Highway Commission and is expected to be among the first projects to be considered when such work is again possible.

## Give Demonstration In Preparing Foods For Freeze Lockers

Miss Eudora Hawkins, home economist for the West Texas Utilities Co., will give a lecture and demonstration in the proper preparation of fruits and vegetables for storing in frozen foods lockers here next Monday afternoon, May 7, from 3 to 5 o'clock, it has been announced by Hubert Baker, proprietor, of Baker's Food Store and Frozen Foods Locker plant.

The demonstration will be given in the Methodist Center building and all women of Ozona are cordially invited to attend. Miss Hawkins will advise housewives on the best methods of preparing fruits and vegetables for freezing and storing to retain the best flavor and will also suggest many new uses for the frozen foods lockers.

While representatives of almost 50 United Nations are meeting in San Francisco, the real peace is being made by the men fighting abroad. Spear-headed by the "Texas Army" . . . the famed 36th Division, American troops are fast convincing the Nazis of the virtues of peace and the penalties of war. And on the other side of the world, where tens of thousands of Texans are fighting the Japs, our "peace" program also is being enforced to the tune of roaring guns.

And wherever there is fighting, Texans continue to be in the midst of it.

The Nazis learned something of Texas ingenuity recently when a group of 32 German soldiers, heavily armed, captured Corp. Worth Modesett of Thrall and two companions. Taken to a Nazi prison camp deep in Germany, the Texas trio dug out their German dictionaries and quickly learned a few phrases of the enemy tongue. Then they convinced their captors of the futility of continuing the fight against onrushing Allied troops. . . and ended up by capturing the town and 16 German

soldiers, without firing a shot. Even in the WAC, Texans lead. In one WAC platoon stationed at Advanced Allied Force Headquarters in Italy, more than half the unit's strength is made up of girls from the Lone Star state.

Among Texans in the group are Corp. Ivah Knight of Lubbock, Sgt. Eva Brown of Apple Springs, Sgt. Marion McKee of Austin and Fort Worth, Corp. Edith Legg of Dallas, and Corp. Ethel Keigwin of Galveston. The girls are doing a full share of winning the war, handling telephone switch-boards, radio communications and general office work.

Deep in the heart of Germany, two fighting men from Llano, staged a reunion last week. They were Granville Smith and Amos Underwood, Texas cousins.

In a letter to relatives, in which he told of the meeting, Underwood also told of the destruction heaped upon German cities by Allied airmen.

"I have seen Cologne," he wrote, "and I have never seen such total destruction in all my eight months of battle through France, Belgium, Luxembourg and Holland."

And back home in Texas, one of the airmen who helped pound Germany into submission this week told one of the most remarkable stories of the war . . . the story of his escape from behind enemy lines after being shot down over Austria. The flyer, S/Sgt. Joe Prikrly of Taylor, walked and crawled for 48 days through enemy territory, after being injured when

he parachuted from his flak-riddled plane. He is at home now for a rest, but soon will be back in the fight.

And on the home front, Texans are now organizing war chest units in all counties, in preparation for the annual drive "for our own and our allies" which will start on October 1. Field representatives of the state war chest are enrolling county chairmen, special gifts chairmen, treasurers and publicity chairmen, to direct the campaign in each county. If you are called on, accept! It is your chance to help win the war and serve our fighting men!
