## Waldrop Resigns Pastorate First Baptist Church

### Minister Here Since January Accepts Ballinger Post

At the close of the preaching hour last Sunday evening, Rev. Wm. B. Waldrop, who has served as pastor of the First Baptist Church here since the first of January, has submitted his resignation, effective August 1st. His last work with the church is being done this week at the Powell Field where he is conducting a series of evangelistic services.

He with Mrs. Waldrop and "Little Bill," plans to attend Paisano Encampment which begins July 30. They will leave Paisano in time to reach Ballinger, Texas, Sunday evening, August 5, at which time he will begin work there as pastor of the Park Avenue Baptist Church. He will begin a revival meeting for that church on August 19.

During the time Rev. Waldrop has served the local pastorate, twenty-seven have been added to the church membership, eight of whom were added upon profession of faith and baptism. One Sunday school campaign and one revival were conducted.

In presenting his resignation last Sunday night, Rev. Waldrop said, "I am truly grateful to you for every expression of kindness toward me during the brief time I have endeavored to serve you. Such expressions have been too few, I am also grateful to God for the spiritual results that obtain by virtue of His blessings upon us as church and pastor. My heart has continually yearned for larger blessings for church and community; nevertheless, it is my unwavering and unyielding conviction that any one of the souls saved during the brief time I have been with you, and any soul anywhere, is worth the ministry of a whole lifetime. As I submit my resignation, I commend you to the grace and guidance of Christ Jesus, the Lord, under whose will I have earnestly sought to lead you."

## Ozonan Aboard 'Hornet' Busy Stinging Japs

### Jesus Perez Crewman On Carrier Striking at Heart of Japan

Aboard the USS Hornet in the Pacific (Delayed) — Jesus G. Perez, seaman, first class, USNR, Ozona, Texas, shared in the crew's victory when planes from this carrier returned from attacks which crumpled a huge Jap aircraft plant in Kyushu.

Scoring their fourth strike against the enemy's home islands, HORNET planes formed the vanguard for other carrier aircraft in the poundings that knocked out the prize target.

Eight man-o'-war to bear the Hornet name, she supported the Palau Island operations and added to her reputation during the actions in the Marianas, Philippines, at Iwo Jima, Okinawa and against the shores of Japan, China and Formosa.

In a special strike against the Jap fleet in the South China Sea, Hornet planes struck the first blows, resulting in the sinking of the Jap battleship Yamato, one of the largest in the world. Aircraft from this carrier scored four torpedo hits against the vessel and also helped sink a cruiser and four destroyers.

The Hornet fliers staged one of their biggest victories in the Campaign Bay-Saigon section of French Indo-China, sinking a Katori class cruiser, a large oiler, a destroyer escort and two medium freighters. They damaged, beached or set afloat seven destroyer escorts and one freighter.

Hornet fliers and crew members have led the trail for aircraft carrier attacks on Tokyo — route blazed three years ago by Lt. Gen. Doolittle from the decks of another Hornet.

## Ozona Pilot Lands Flak-Battered Ship After Bombing Mission

A Ninth Air Force Bomber Base, France. — Knee-deep in hydraulic fluid which washed the interior of his flak-battered A-26 Invader medium bomber following an attack upon a road junction at Alten birchen, Germany, First Lieutenant James K. Colquitt, 23, of Ozona, returned his plane to a safe landing in the closing stages of the European invasion and won a Distinguished Flying Cross for his efforts.

Over the target, Lt. Colquitt's aircraft received numerous flak hits. One burst tore through a gunner's turret, cutting the gunner's shoe and flying boot. The hydraulic system was shot out. The right wing and bomb-bay received several direct hits but Lt. Colquitt kept his plane in formation, bombed the target, and returned to base to make an emergency landing by using the emergency hydraulic system. Neither he nor his crew were injured.

Lt. Colquitt returned to the U. S. on combat leave in April, 1945. While a member of the 416th Bombardment Group, he flew more than 65 missions over German targets. He also holds the Air Medal with 11 Oak Leaf Clusters. Lt. Colquitt is the step-son of Lee Wilson of Ozona.

## Mac McWilliams Barry Receives Commission As Lieutenant in WAC

FORT DES MOINES, Iowa. — Members of the 58th Class of Officer Candidate School, First Women's Army Corps Training Center, Fort Des Moines, Iowa, received commissions in the Army of the United States at Fort Des Moines, July 21. Brig. Gen. P. X. English, Chief of Staff for the Seventh Service Command, addressed the graduation class. Diplomas were presented by Col. Frank U. McCoskrie, Commandant of Fort Des Moines.

The graduation coincides with the third anniversary of the opening of Fort Des Moines as a Women's Auxiliary Corps Training Center on July 20, 1942.

Class 58 is the second OC class to be commissioned since the return of the Women's Army Corps Officer Candidate School to Des Moines in February, 1945 from Fort Oglethorpe, Georgia.

One of the newly commissioned officers, Lt. Mae V. Barry, is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. R. E. McWilliams, 3102 Lafayette, Austin, Tex. Her husband, Capt. John Barry, the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. Barry, 18 Fort Hill Terrace, Rochester, N. Y., is stationed in England with the Army.

One of 10 children, Lieutenant Barry has three brothers in the service of their country and one who was killed in action in Italy, February, 1944.

She enlisted in the WAC in September, 1942 and after basic training and a short assignment at Fort Des Moines she was transferred to Washington, D. C., for recruiting duty where she remained until returning to Des Moines for Officer Candidate School in April of this year.

Her three brothers in service are T/Sgt. Dalton, an AAF instructor at Sheppard Field, Wichita Falls, Tex., Ptm. Mate 1/c Ronald, now in Navy V 12 school at Corpus Christi, Tex., after three years in the Pacific and Cpl. Donald Garrett with the Marines on Okinawa, who has been overseas for two and a half years.

Elwood, who was a first sergeant, was killed in action while serving with the Army.

## Alejos Lara, Wounded at St. Lo, Is Visitor Here

### Brother, Reynaldo, Also Wounded Same Action, Uncle Killed

Pvt. Alejos Lara, who was seriously wounded in the battle for France, and who has been under treatment of Army doctors since, is a visitor here this week, on leave from Fort Sam Houston general hospital.

Pvt. Lara was wounded in the stomach and arm, his arm being badly shattered when an enemy artillery shell exploded nearby. He has undergone three operations in an effort to repair the shattered arm, and for a period of three months was nourished by intravenous injections because of the stomach wound.

Pvt. Lara's brother, Reynaldo Lara, also wounded at St. Lo, has been discharged from the army and is at his home here. Reynaldo, who received a slug in his spine, is confined to a wheel chair. The brothers' uncle, Arturo Ramirez, was killed in action in the same area.

## Julian Pastor Returns To Acuna Bull Ring in Exhibition August 5

Big event of the bull fight season is the return of Julian Pastor to the Villa Acuna Bull Ring, across from Del Rio, Sunday August 5.

Pastor, who has fought throughout Mexico, Central and South America, and in Spain, is the idol of Mexico's bull fight enthusiasts. His return engagement to the border meets with popular approval of bull fight fans.

In competition with Pastor will be Javier Gomez Terremoto, young courageous, skillful and artistic bull fighter, who has made an enviable record in Mexico City and other points in the republic the past season. Terremoto promises Pastor keen competition in the Aug. 5 fight, and bull fight fans are assured of excitement and thrills when these two artists appear in the Villa Acuna Arena.

They will fight to death four pure Spanish blooded bulls. The fight will start promptly at 5 P. M., the promoters announce.

## Former Ozonan with Army Railroaders in Germany Promoted

With U.S. Forces in Germany — Fourteen soldier railroaders of the Transportation Corps 707th Railway Grand Division recently were promoted in Germany. The unit is presently stationed at Herne, Germany.

The 707th was one of the first railway units to land in Normandy last summer. While in Normandy it participated in the Normandy campaign and the Northern France campaign. During the winter, the unit moved to Belgium, and it participated in the Rhineland campaign. Later it crossed the Rhine River, and supported the Ninth Army during the Central Europe campaign.

The men who were promoted include Private Robert C. Moore of Ozona, who was promoted to private first class.

## B-26 Pilot Who Flew 62 Missions Visits

Capt. Logan Ritchie, B-26 bomber pilot who flew 62 missions against the Germans from a 12th Air Force base in Sardinia in 13 months of overseas service, was a visitor here last week. Capt. Ritchie, whose home is in Comanche, is a nephew of Mrs. Coralie Meinecke.

Capt. Ritchie holds the D. F. C. with clusters, the Air Medal, the Purple Heart and the French Croix de Guerre. He is now stationed at Pampa, Texas, but is scheduled to receive his discharge from the service in August. He left Monday for Comanche and was accompanied by three of the Meinecke children, Bud, Sue and William, who will visit relatives there for several days.

## Fast Roping Matches Reeled Off Here Sunday

### Montgomery-Riley Match Is Thriller with 2.9 Seconds Margin

Some top roping talent was on tap at the fair grounds arena here Sunday afternoon in one of the summer series of Sunday afternoon matches sponsored by the Ozona Roping Club, a group of enthusiasts who have purchased a string of Brahma calves for the weekly entertainments.

Sgt. Lanham Riley, Goodfellow Field, San Angelo, the soldier cowboy who has held his own against some of West Texas best in roping events throughout the area, set a fast pace for local loopers in Sunday's matches here.

Soldier Riley copped first place in the first three jack-pot ropings of the afternoon, the first with a time of 14.2 seconds, the second in 13.3 and the third again in 14.2. Riley also took second place in the calf helling event with a time of 18.6 and second money in the day's last jack-pot roping, time 18.6.

The day's thriller match, however, was a matched roping contest between Vic Montgomery and Sgt. Riley. Roping four calves, the contestants stood nip and tuck throughout the match, Montgomery shading the soldier roper to win by a margin of only 2.9 seconds. Riley had previously dropped a match to Hollis Pace of Tankersley by a wide margin. The soldier's first loop in that match snagged the calf but flipped off the saddle horn when it tightened. By the time Riley had secured a second rope from the judges' stand and roped again he had spent 85.2 seconds.

In other matched events of the afternoon, Kay Black beat P. C. Perner 73.4 to 131.8 on four calves and then lost to Vic Montgomery 64.7 to 87.9.

Bailey, local board chairman, was advised by Ralph Kaye, district OPA miscellaneous products rationing officer. Airplane Stamps Nos. 1, 2 and 3 are good indefinitely, Mr. Kaye said.

The last shoe stamp was validated November 1, 1944. The intervals between validation of stamps depend on the available supply of shoes.

## Drawing Proposed Methodist Church On Display Here

### Members Study Design of New Building They Hope to Erect

## Narrow Escape From Nazis Told By Former Ozonan

### Walter Phillips Out-ran Germans in Jeep In Ardenne Bulge

A story of a narrow escape from advancing Germans in the Ardenne break-through where he and a companion, aboard an Army jeep, suddenly found themselves surrounded by a tank-led Nazi spearhead, the target of a machine gunning tank, is told by Pvt. Walter Phillips, former Ozonan, here on a visit last week.

Pvt. Phillips, son of Mrs. Charlie Phillips of Sonora, formerly of Ozona, returned to the States July 10 after nearly two years overseas and twelve months of action in France, Belgium and Germany.

Pvt. Phillips was attached to the V Corps Artillery with the First Army. He and the companion left their artillery position in the Ardenne to repair a broken communication line between two batteries. They made several repairs but failed on every attempt to communicate with their own battery. Unknown to them, the Germans had advanced behind them and had cut the lines.

"We noticed there was lots of activity in the area," he recounted "but we didn't know what it was about. We heard tanks behind us but thought they were ours."

They soon found out that the tanks were enemy, however, when one of them opened up on them with a machine gun, Phillips said. Taking cover in a ditch beside the road, the pair abandoned their jeep to its fate in the road, he said. While machine gun bullets spewed over and around them, their jeep was miraculously unharmed, and when the fire lifted as the tank moved on, they jumped into it and began back-tracking.

When they finally met an MP directing traffic, they found that the road over which they had come had been overrun by the advancing German spearhead and they were directed along a road which took them in a roundabout route back to their battery. When they arrived there they found their outfit had moved back, only three trucks left at the position and their crews were busy loading the last of ammunition and supplies for the withdrawal.

"We fell in behind those trucks and moved back," Phillips said. "We could hear the German tanks rumbling behind us for several miles."

Pvt. Phillips, who wears five battle stars, went ashore on the Normandy beach eight days after D-Day. The landing craft on which his outfit waited a favorable time to land, was in the original invasion armada, but stood off-shore for eight days before a favorable spot was found to unload the heavy vehicles and guns. The five battle stars which the former Ozonan wears are for the battles of Normandy, Northern France, the Ardenne, Rhineland and Central Germany.

A brother, Leo Phillips, U. S. Marine corps, was wounded on Iwo Jima and is now in a hospital in San Francisco.
