Methodist Youth Leader to Meet With Local Group

Rev. and Mrs. C. A. Greenwaldt Here Sunday, Mon. and Tues.

Rev. C. A. Greenwaldt, Secretary of Youth Work in the Southwest Texas Methodist Conference, will be in Ozona Sunday, Monday and Tuesday to lead local Methodist youth fellowship groups in a program of worship, study, organization and recreation. It was announced this week by the Rev. A. Carter, Methodist pastor. Mrs. Greenwaldt will accompany her husband and will participate in the leadership of the local three-meeting series.

Rev. and Mrs. Greenwaldt will be in charge of the Church School worship and class programs Sunday morning. At the morning worship hour, 11 a. m., Rev. Greenwaldt will preach on the theme, "The Power of the Majority."

The Sunday evening service will be at the Methodist Center at 8 o'clock for a worship and Pledge service, after which the group will go to some selected place for a period of recreation, refreshments and closing devotional. This will be the only services of the church Sunday evening, Rev. Carter announced.

Monday evening will be devoted to the Committee and Devotion meetings, the pastor said, and the Monday evening program will include a visit to the Latin-American Community house.

Toots Mansfield of Big Spring, champion calf roper, will be seen in action again in the Ozona fair park arena Sunday afternoon in a matched roping.

It will be Mansfield against Sonny Edwards, also from Big Spring and Mansfield's brother-in-law, for the featured matched roping of next Sunday afternoon's special roping show arranged by the Ozona Roping Club.

Edwards was originally scheduled to meet James Kinney of Marathon in the Sunday matches, but when Kinney sent word that he would be unable to make the show, the champ was contacted and agreed to meet Edwards.

It will be an eight-calf match between Mansfield and Edwards and local fans are looking forward to some keen competition when these two lariat experts tangle for the match honors. At the recent Labor Day program in Midland, Mansfield defeated Edwards in a 12-calf match but it was a close contests and a thriller from the viewpoint of the spectators.

Another matched roping event already scheduled for the Sunday show here will be between Vic Montgomery of Ozona and Ted Powers of San Angelo. Six calves are to be roped by Montgomery and Powers. In addition to these and other matches which may be arranged, there will be one jack pot roping for all comers. The afternoon's program will begin at 2 o'clock.

Judge Jackson Dies from Heart Attack in Sonora

Funeral Services for 112th Court Judge In Fort Stockton

Funeral services were held Monday in Fort Stockton for Judge W. C. Jackson, of the 112th District Court, who died in a Sonora hotel Saturday afternoon 40 minutes after suffering a heart attack in the district courtroom in that city.

Judge Jackson had been hearing divorce cases during the day. He had complained of feeling badly during the court term and was taken to his hotel room when he was stricken in the court room Saturday afternoon. Attendants said that he lost consciousness soon after being taken to his room. Medical aid was summoned but the jurist died a few minutes later.

The body was taken to Fort Stockton Saturday night where burial rites were read Monday afternoon.

Judge Jackson was appointed to the 112th District Court bench on January 25, 1939 — his birthday to fill the unexpired term of Judge Joe Montague, resigned, and had held the post since. He twice served as district attorney and had also served as county attorney of Pecos county.

Judge Jackson had practiced law in Fort Stockton since 1909. He came to Texas in 1876, his family settling in Comanche. He served as county judge of Comanche county from 1902 to 1906.

Judge Jackson is survived by four sons, O. K. Jackson of Montebello, Calif.; Barney Jackson of San Saba, H. L. and William Jackson of Fort Stockton, and one daughter, Mrs. Young Bell of Pecos. His wife died in 1940.

Enlistment Drive For Regular Army Launched by 8th S. C.

The Guardian of Victory Campaign, a program for enlisting 70,000 men from the Eighth Service Command, for the Regular Army, was launched last week by General Walker, Commanding General of the Eighth Service Command, according to an announcement received here today.

In order to carry out this recruitment, 60 recruiting stations will be opened in the command immediately. Original enlistments and reenlistments will be limited to enlisted men who are serving honorably in the Army of the United States, or who have served honorably, and whose ages are from 18 to 34 inclusively; those now holding a regular Army status; and young men who have not yet served in a military capacity.

Men enlisting may select the arm or branch of service that they desire. They may choose their overseas theatre, and they may keep the present temporary rating that they now hold.

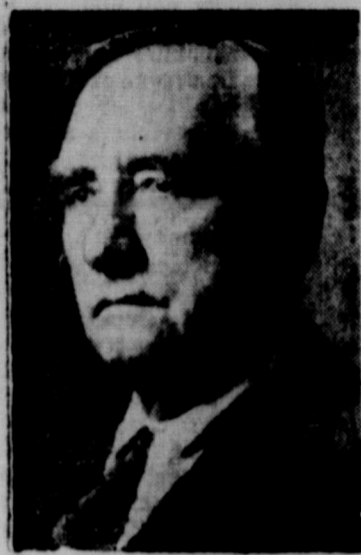

Boys Protected by Insurance Policy in Athletic Contests

Twenty-eight boys composing the 1945 football squad of Ozona High School have been insured against injury as a result of participation in athletic activities during the school year, it was announced this week by C. S. Denham, superintendent.

The insurance policy covers injuries suffered by the boys either in games or during practice, benefits ranging from \$5 for minor dislocations or other injuries to \$100 for a fractured skull. The policy covers the boys in all sports for the entire year at a cost of \$3 per boy. Additional benefits are carried this year in three riders, one providing a \$500 death benefit in case of accidental death, another covering injuries suffered in transportation to and from athletic contests or practice, and hospitalization benefits of \$4 a day for one month and \$2 a day for an additional five months, these additional benefits being provided at a cost of \$1.25 per boy.

Scrapping of War Time Will Avoid Local Confusion

Although such action has not yet been taken officially by the federal government, news reports from Washington indicate that it is fairly certain that War Time which has been in effect since the start of the war as a daylight saving measure will be abolished beginning October 1.

Such action on the part of the government will prevent a great deal of wintertime confusion which has been the lot of Ozonans during the war. Because this area is almost on the border of the Mountain time zone, the advancement of clocks one hour, in the winter months, put the regular opening time for business houses, schools, etc. so far ahead of the sun that artificial lighting was necessary.

Local school buildings not being properly lighted for class work under artificial lighting, school authorities found it necessary to set up the school schedule one hour during the winter months. Some business houses continued regular opening and lunch hours, and conflicts thus resulted in the schedules of families having children in school. This confusion will be avoided this year if the time change is made as indicated by officials. Clocks are due to be set back at 2 a. m. the night of September 30, reports indicate.

Red Cross Volunteer Workers to Receive Service Insignia

WASHINGTON — Active wartime volunteers in American Red Cross chapters will be presented with special insignia for "meritorious personal service," it was announced here today by National Chairman Basil O'Connor.

Red ribbon bars will be given to volunteers with 12 months' service. To the bars will be added silver stripes denoting one or more units of 500 hours' service, and gold stripes denoting 5000 hours. Volunteers with a minimum of 200 hours will receive certificates signed in facsimile by President Truman and Chairman O'Connor. All certificate holders may wear the new insignia, in the form of pins for women and buttons for men, which bear the inscription "World War II" below the familiar red cross.

Addressing upwards of four million volunteers enrolled during the course of the war, Chairman O'Connor said: "Because of the inherent intangible factors constituting Red Cross service, medals and other decorations are not awarded except to those who died in service. But volunteers whose contributions added so much to American morale may be proud to accept these insignia as their form of service pins."

112th District Court to Open Here Monday

Death of Judge Jackson Will Necessitate Appointment

With a new judge on the bench, either the governor's appointee to fill the unexpired term of the late W. C. Jackson or a temporary appointment for the court term, made by selection of attorneys practicing before the court, the 112th district court will open for the regular fall term here Monday morning.

Death of Judge Jackson as the result of a heart attack in Sonora last Saturday, leaves the 112th bench temporarily vacant. Attorneys of the district were conferring this week and it was thought possible that Governor Coke Stevenson would name a successor to Judge Jackson before the end of the week.

However, in the event the governor has not made an appointment by the time of the scheduled court opening here Monday morning, the court will be presided over by some lawyer selected by agreement among the attorneys practicing before the court, such an appointment being made for the term only.

The court will be convened at 10 o'clock Monday morning. The grand jury will be impaneled and charged at that hour and the court will take up non-jury cases on its docket, including divorce hearings and civil matters not requiring a jury.

The petit jury will not be required to report until 9 o'clock Tuesday morning.

Signal Lights to Be Installed at Intersections

Traffic Control System to Be Tried out as Safety Measure

As a means of avoiding a possible fatal accident in the downtown section of Ozona in the post war period of increased traffic, the Commissioners Court in session this week authorized an investigation into the advisability and cost of installing traffic lights at downtown intersections.

A signal light controlling traffic will be installed at the intersection of highways 163 and 290 in the business section. This is considered one of the most dangerous corners in the city, through traffic speeding along highway 290, with ordinary local traffic creating a hazard.

Possible installation of other lights at intersections east and west of this corner and in the vicinity of the high school are also under consideration. Installation of the signal lights is inexpensive, members of the court pointed out, and it was decided to try the signal light system first on an experimental basis, the plan being to remove them if they prove unsatisfactory.

DDT Soon to Become Available to Public

AUSTIN, Texas. — Good news for the thousands of families in Texas, is the information that DDT, the almost miraculous insecticide developed during the war, is now available for civilian use, and if not now already on the market in every community, the time is approaching when it may be purchased wherever insecticides are sold.

Formerly restricted to military

use for the suppression and control of malaria and other insect-borne diseases among the armed forces at home and abroad, civilians have awaited with interest the opportunity to use DDT in homes and business buildings, to rid them of flies, fleas, roaches and other common pests.

"If every householder in the state will spray his home and out-buildings with DDT," Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer declared recently, "there is a definite possibility of bringing the incidence of insect-borne diseases down to an absolute minimum. Such insects as fleas, lice, flies, mosquitoes, and roaches have been recognized as vectors of diseases for many years, but heretofore there has been no satisfactory method whereby they could all be controlled by a single poison. That is why DDT is referred to as a 'miracle insecticide.' It is as fatal to one of these pests as to another, and homes, business buildings, outhouses and premises can be rid of such insects through the use of DDT."

Dr. Cox urges that in commun-

ities where DDT is already available, every home and every business building be sprayed, as well as outbuildings, privies, and the outside surfaces of closed garbage cans. Even though garbage containers are kept closed, flies are sometimes attracted by the smell of food, and if they alight on a surface that has been treated with DDT, they are killed.
