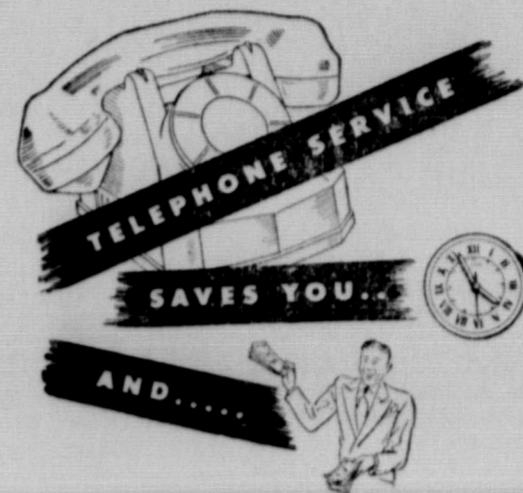
**FOOTBALL FROM THE INSIDE**

**2 Percent Discount If Paid In November**

**1 Percent Discount If Paid In December**

Taxes paid during the month of January earn no discount and become delinquent after February 1, 1944.
