Eldorado Scores In Final Minutes

Nose out Lions

Eagles Outplayed 3 Quarters but Cashed In on Breaks

Coach Al Vance's Eldorado Eagles took the inside track in the District 4-B gridiron championship last Saturday when they took advantage of the breaks in the final minutes of play to push over a lone touchdown to a 6-0 over the defending champion Lions of Coach L. E. T. Sikes. The Lions had outplayed the Eagles through three quarters of the tightly contested game, holding an average of one penetration and 4 to first downs. But late in the fourth quarter, Mund of Eldorado intercepted Word's pass on about the Eldorado 40 to stop a Lion drive and the Eagles then unleashed an attack that demoralized the defense until the Eagles penetrated the Ozona 20-yard zone and built up a one first down lead over the locals.

The locals stayed off that touchdown threat however, after throwing the Eagles back from the 18 to the 25. Three plays had gained eight yards and the Lions, needing just downs desperately, elected to go for the necessary yardage on the final down. A 5-yard penalty for delaying the game, however, was levied before the play was run and Yancy was downed a few yards short of the objective. The Eagles took over and started on the march that paid off with the deciding touchdown, Spurgers bringing over from the two. The try point was smeared, but the Eagles didn't need it.

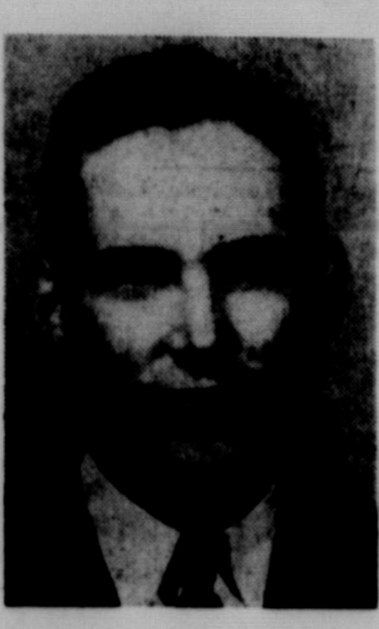
The Lions started off in their usual pattern at the opening of the game with what appeared a determined touchdown march. They drove to the Eldorado 18 yard line from their own 30 but here the attack bogged down and Humphrey, Eagle substitute back, pulled in one of Lemmons' forwards to put an end to that threat. Although the victory puts the Eagles in line for the district consolation, the coming week-end is fraught with a lot of possibilities, and one of these is that the Lions of Ozona still have a chance at adding the season's schedule in a tie with the Eldorado crew for a championship or a chance at a play-off.

The Eagles still have the Junction Eagles to reckon with and Ozona is to face the by-no-means weak Sonora Bronchos. Although we hope strongly favors the Eldorado lads in the Junction arena, the Kimble team is no push-over for any team in the district, and could stumble the undefeated Eagles. If the Lions come through as they should in Saturday's fracas with Sonora and that long chance at Junction comes to pass, it could be a split. On the other hand Sonora, too, still keeps a finger in the pie and the same chance that Ozona has—should they win here Saturday. The Bronchos have been defeated only once in district competition, that by the Eldorado lads.

Rev. Tension New Pastor of Baptist Church

Former Pastor at Shamrock, Wichita Falls Leads Church

Rev. Clifton R. Tension arrived this week to assume his work as pastor of the First Baptist Church in Ozona. Rev. Tension was pastor of the First Baptist Church in Shamrock, Texas, a church with a membership of 714, before he resigned to accept the local charge. Previously he had served as pastor of the Cashion Baptist Church and the Central Baptist Church in turn at Wichita Falls, Texas, serving a total of five years in these two churches. Before that assignment, he had served as part time pastor of several churches in the Lubbock area.

Rev. Tension finished high school in Crosbyton, Texas, and was graduated from Wayland Junior College at Plainview. He received his bachelor degree from Howard Payne in Brownwood and his master of theology from Southwestern Baptist Seminary at Fort Worth. He has been invited by the faculty of the Southwestern Seminary to begin work toward his doctor's degree in September of next year, work which is done only by faculty invitation from that institution.

Rev. and Mrs. Tension and their two - months - old daughter, Carol Ann, are living at the old Baptist parsonage at present but in the next few days will move into the new parsonage, the former home of Dr. and Mrs. G. I. Nesrsta, which the Baptist church has purchased for its parsonage. The Tensions will be welcomed by the church membership and the people of Ozona next Sunday evening at a reception at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Ira Carson, following the evening church services.

Dog Owners Urged To Keep Pets at Home

A recent outbreak of rabies among dogs in Brady, with several persons under treatment for bites, has prompted local law enforcement officers and school officials to issue a warning to dog owners of Ozona to keep their pets under close surveillance. Too many dogs are running at large, especially in the vicinity of the schools, officials pointed out, and an outbreak of rabies would endanger large numbers of school children as well as grown ups. Dog owners are urged to keep their pets on their own premises, thus eliminating the chance of destruction of such pets and a disastrous outbreak of rabies.

Enraged GI Erases Smile Of Captured German Officer Viewing With Satisfaction Bodies Of American Dead On Normandy Beach

A high ranking German officer, captured by American troops soon after they had stormed ashore on the Normandy beaches to attack Hitler's fortress Europe, was being marched back by GIs to that beach still littered with the bodies of American dead and shattered invasion equipment.

Topping the last rise and looking down on the sprawled bodies of the dead Americans, the captured German straightened and his face lighted with a smirking smile of satisfaction. An exhausted American paratrooper, sprawled on the sand nearby for a minute of rest, saw that smile and leaping to his feet planted himself in front of the smirking German, swung a mighty arc with a captured razor-sharp German sabre and amputated that smile of satisfaction, along with the German's head, and planted it in the sands of the Normandy beachhead.

"Now, laugh, you so-and-so," was the berserk paratrooper's comment as the German's head rolled. An eye-witness account of the above incident is among the stories brought back from the European battlefield by Eusebio Ramirez, Ozonan who spent 39 months in overseas service attached to the Ninth Air Force, and who recently received his discharge from service.

Ramirez, who held the rank of sergeant, followed American invasion forces ashore in Normandy on D Day plus three. His unit set up the first fighter landing strip on the continent a half mile inland,

the first American fighter plane landing on the strip the following day.

Ramirez recounted an experience in which he unwittingly drove a jeep inside the German lines on the fluid beachhead front, narrowly escaping capture, but instead captured a German medic and made it safely back to his own lines.

He and three companions were sent inland to pick out favorable terrain for a new landing strip. After a short drive they found the road blocked by the carcasses of dead cattle, Ramirez said, and they alighted to drag the dead animals aside. One of his companions walked ahead down the road a short distance and stepped on a land mine which blew up and killed him. Ramirez and the other GIs, finding they could do nothing for their companion, drove ahead on their mission. They met a German medic walking down the road and thought him a prisoner on his way to the American rear. One of the men with Ramirez could speak German and they stopped to question the medic. To their amazement, they found they were square in the middle of the German lines.

"I wheeled that jeep around in a hurry," Ramirez recounted, "and we loaded the German in and took him back with us." The new air strip had to wait until the Germans could be driven back a mile farther.

Stores to Close For Full Half-Day Holiday Saturday

Since Armistice Day falls on Sunday this year, Ozona merchants have agreed to combine the regular afternoon closing on occasions when the Ozona High School football team is playing on the home field and close for a full half-day holiday next Saturday afternoon.

Stores will close at 1 o'clock Saturday afternoon and remain closed for the rest of the day, it was announced.

Stuart Assumes Duties as Agent, Service Officer

New Official to Serve Crockett County In Dual Capacity

Tommie Stuart, recently employed by Crockett county as county agent and county service officer, has arrived and assumed his duties.

Mr. Stuart is occupying temporary quarters in the office of County Attorney N. W. Graham until a reshuffle of offices in the courthouse can be made to provide him with office space.

Mr. Stuart comes to Ozona from Menard where he has acted as county agent for more than a year. He is a graduate of A & M College and was in soil conservation work at Big Spring before joining the Extension Service staff as county agent at Menard.

In addition to acting as county agent, Mr. Stuart, himself a veteran of World War II, will serve this county as service officer, assisting returning veterans obtain employment, handling their claims and any other matters that might arise in connection with the readjustment of service men.

Schools to Observe Thanksgiving Nov. 22

Thursday, November 22, will be observed as Thanksgiving Day in Ozona Schools, Supt. C. S. Denham announced this week. A double holiday, Thursday and Friday, will be given pupils and teachers for the Thanksgiving observance. The fourth Thursday in November has been proclaimed both by the President and by the governor of Texas as Thanksgiving day this year.

McCamey Assault Case to Be Tried Here November 12

Athey Case Transferred Here on Change Of Venue

Transferred here on a change of venue, the trial of W. B. Athey, charged with assault and rape on a 3-year-old girl in McCamey on Sunday, October 21, has been set for trial in the 112th District Court here Monday, November 12.

A special venire of 36 men has been summoned by Sheriff Frank James to report at the courthouse Monday morning, November 12. From this group the court hopes to obtain a jury to hear the case.

Athey was arraigned in district court in Rankin on November 1. He pleaded not guilty to the charge and requested a change of venue, which was granted, and Judge J. E. Randolph, district judge, transferred the case to this county for trial. It is understood here that Athey is to be defended by D. I. Durham, Dallas attorney. Athey is being held at an undisclosed point pending trial. The child involved in the alleged attack has been dismissed from a San Angelo hospital.

The new vehicles are presented in three lines, including the Stylemaster, offering unusual refinements in the lowest price bracket; the Fleetmaster, still further advanced in finish and appointments, and the Fleetline, most attractively styled model that Chevrolet has ever offered.

Aviation Future Discussed in Meet Local Enthusiasts

Don Seevers, NAA, Urges Community to Go after Air Service

More than 20 Ozona men, ranchers and business and professional men, interested in the future of aviation and in obtaining adequate air service for this community in the post-war period of expansion in the industry, met at the Hotel Ozona Monday night to hear a discussion of the subject by Don V. Seevers of Washington, D. C., manager of the Southwest division of the National Aeronautical Association.

Mr. Seevers has been interested in aviation for a number of years and until his recent connection with the N. A. A. was Washington representative for a group of feeder air line operators. He is well versed in the progress of present legislation and trends in the national capital in the matter of aviation and included a survey of Washington thinking on the subject in his talk to the local group.

Mr. Seevers praised the Crockett county airport 5 miles west of Ozona as ideal for development into a first class airport. Legislation is now pending in Congress, he said, appropriating government funds to match local funds expended in the creation and improvement of airports in the nation. He urged a modest program of improvement and expansion of the local port under this legislation when it is finally passed, the government matching local funds in such a program.

A picture of post-war aviation development which will give passenger, mail, express and freight service to every community that has an airport was drawn by Mr. Seevers. However, such service will depend on demands from the people, thus bringing pressure on powers that be in Washington to combat pressure from the trunk airlines, who are opposing establishment of feeder lines.

Organization of a local chapter of the National Aeronautical Association is being considered by the group and considerable sentiment has been expressed in favor of such an organization to promote development of aviation locally and to be in position to work for air service for the community.

War-Closed WTU Retail Store to Be Re-Opened

Local Branch again to Offer Merchandise And Appliances

Another step in the local business march back to pre-war standards of service will be the re-opening of the local branch of the West Texas Utilities Co. as a retail store, offering electrical appliances for the home and a general line of electrical supplies and merchandise sold by the branch.

The company closed its branch offices as retail stores when such merchandise was not available during the war years. With manufacturing concerns on the way back to reconversion despite the wave of strikes, the utilities company is re-opening stores in the larger towns it serves for the convenience of its customers.

Two new Frigidaires were received here early in the week, the first to make an appearance since shortly after the war's opening. Merchandise is not expected to be plentiful for some time, yet, T. J. Bailey, local manager, said, but as it comes off the assembly lines, Ozona customers will receive their quotas on an equal basis with other towns served by the concern.

Don't get the idea that it was a lull, however. Far from it. It was hard, rough-and-tumble football at its best.

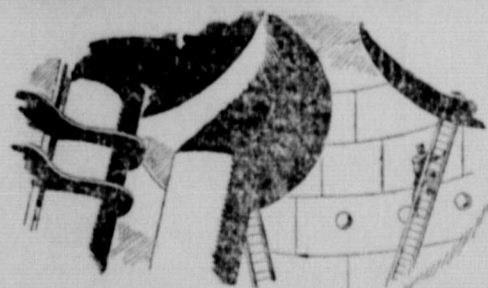

istance principally according to a statewide formula applicable to each farm in order to get practices carried out on a broad scale.

The 1946 program has been planned to provide about the same assistance that farmers received under the 1945 program. However, more soil practices are expected to be carried out under the new program since the farmer will bear more of the conservation cost than under the 1945 program.

The 1946 program will vary by states and by counties according to the climate, topography, type of farming, and the conservation needs. The approved practices for each county will be developed by local AAA farmer-committeemen, representatives of state agricultural Stations, and other agricultural agencies. Each county will select only the most needed practices for which assistance will be offered so as to be able to keep the program within the funds allocated to the county.

Machine Type of Firearms Must Be Registered with U. S.

To acquaint people with the provisions of the National Firearms Act which requires the registration of certain types of firearms and forbids the possession of other types, Ralph Bratcher, investigator of the Alcohol Tax Division, Bureau of Internal Revenue, included Ozona in a tour of this section of Texas now under way by agents of the bureau.

The campaign of information is being carried out to avoid unwitting violation of law by returning service men bringing back war trophies. The law requires that firearms of the automatic type, such as machine guns, sub-machine guns or any type of gun from which a number of shots or bullets may be discharged with one continuous pull of the trigger must be registered with the Internal Revenue department. These guns may be registered with the department tax free only if they are rendered unserviceable by department agents.

It is illegal to transfer firearms of the types described except by payment of the \$200 tax provided by law. However, if firearms are rendered unserviceable, they may be transferred tax-free as war trophies upon submission of the proper form to the Commissioner of Internal Revenue.

"We want the veterans to have the guns as war trophies, but they must comply with the law, which is designed to prevent such firearms from falling into the hands of the criminal element," Mr. Bratcher said.
