Mexican Dies Of Knife Wound Through Chest

Rafael Cardenas Stabbed; Jose Flores Held on Murder Count

Rafael Cardenas, about 50, died within a few minutes after suffering a stab wound from a long ket and home in the Latin-American settlement here.

Jose Flores, about 37, is held in the Crockett county jail on a charge of murder in connection with Cardenas' death. No motive for the slaying had been determined by investigating officers.

Flores, who is said to have fled the scene of the killing, taking off on foot over the hill south of the settlement. He was lated captured by Basiliso Ramirez and Jose Leal, who brought him back to town and turned him over to the sherif's department.
