Red Cross Fund **Drive** Postponed **To Next Week**

Campaign Delayed Because of Holiday Week-End

Because of the holiday week-end here and the San Angelo rodeo and stock show the end of this week. the annual Red Cross Fund drive, scheduled to begin March 1, will be postponed to near the end of next week, Lee Wilson, chairman of the Ozona Chapter, American

Decision to delay the drive until next week was reached after a conference of the chatper chairman and Ira Carson, fund drive chairman, and Bill Cooper, vice chairman of the drive. It was expected that many Ozonans will be out of town the end of this week and campaign workers would be handicapped in soliciting persons on their lists. Therefore, the decision to postpone the drive.

The day on which the drive will start had not been definitely determined this week, Mr. Wilson said, but Thursday or Friday of next week were suggested. A meeting of drive heads and workers will be called early next week and complete plans outlined.

Because of the fact that the local chapter has a considerable fund on hand, this year's Fund Drive quota of the local chapter will be considerably reduced from that of the war years. The national quota, too, will be somewhat smaller and local workers anticipate little difficulty in over-subscribing the Ozona quota. 

License tags are now on sale at the office of Frank James, Tax Assessor and Collector.


It is unlawful to put 1946 license tags on your car before March 1.




