Bean Growers Plan Meeting For Dimmitt



Six Funnels, Tornadoes Reported In Afternoon

Wild, wet and wicked weather slammed through Bailey County Wednesday afternoon, prompting the National Weather Service to issue warnings repeatedly for Muleshoe and Bailey County residents to 'take coverimmediately.

Prompting the NWS warnings to local residents were at least six and possibly seven sightings of funnel clouds and tornadoes within striking distance of Muleshoe and surrounding communities.

First sighting was around 1:45 p.m., when sheriff's deputies and city police, along with fire department weather spotters watched a possible tornado bouncing around on the ground some six-seven miles west of Muleshoe.

This was immediately followed by the spotting of another funnel, at the same time as the first one, and slightly to the south of the first one. Although at least one of the funnels to the west touched ground and bounced around for several minutes, no damage was found.

At 2:07, sheriff's officers and spotters found a second tornado on the ground and threatening the city, just to the west of the city limits of Muleshoe.

As warnings were repeatedly being given, numbers of local citizens went outside, while many more sought shelter in some of the designated shelter areas in the city.

Electric Co-op Presents Four Scholarships

Four scholarships were awarded to area graduating seniors by Bailey County Electric Cooperative Association. The four scholarships were made available through the Cooperative by the Muleshoe State Bank of Muleshoe. Receiving this year's \$400

Bailey County Electric Cooperative said these scholarships may be used in any college or university of the student's choice. They are paid in four checks of \$100 for each semester, for the first four semesters the students are in college. The scholarships can be used only if the student is enrolled in college, trade school or technical training institutes.

Cars were found parked and abandoned in the streets, as some citizens panicked, abandoned their cars, running for shelter in pelting hailstones and heavy rain.

At about the time the third funnel menaced Muleshoe, a fourth funnel was being watched to the north of Muleshoe, dangling and teasing before going back into the clouds.

Very heavy rain fell in a deluge, dropping 1.5 in less than 45 minutes and 1.7 was recorded before the end of the afternoon. In the city, hailstones pelted down for a time, but were about marble sized, and did not do any major damage to vegetation.

FM1760 was forced closed after a low area just west of Tillema Dairy became a raging river, and water rose to more than three feet deep on the pavement, prompting barricading of the road for several hours.

As the cloud split, with some going to the north, and some to the south workers from the

Sales-Use Tax Shows Decrease For This County

Bailey County has shown a drastic drop in sales for the fourth quarter of 1985 as compared for the fourth quarter of 1984, according to a report released this week.

A total of 253 reporting outlets had sales of \$52,560,958 for the fourth quarter of 1985, down by 18.3 percent from the \$64,355,884 reported from the fourth quarter in 1984.

In Cochran County, a whopping 88.5 percent increase in sales for the fourth quarter of 1985 were reported by the 110 reporting outlets. Sales for the fourth quarter of 1984 were \$9,188,576, and had increased to \$17,322,297 for the fourth quarter of 1985.

The 504 reporting outlets in Lamb County had sales of \$62,780,147 for the fourth quarter of 1985, up some 26.6 percent from the fourth quarter sales in 1984 of \$49,592,257.


Parmer County's 272 reporting outlets had sales of \$58,947,005 for the fourth quarter of 1985, down 0.2 percent from the fourth quarter 1984 sales reported at \$59,076,728.





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

The hand tags and labels on clothing and household fabrics can help you make decisions about the quality of a potential purchase. Ignoring this information means you may wind up paying more than you should for an item that won't last or that

you can't care for properly.

Laws designed to protect both consumers and producers have been on the books for over 25 years. Basically, the regulations require that textile products (with a few exceptions) be labeled with fiber content identified by generic name, the actual percentage of each fiber used in descending order of the amount present, the manufacturer's name or other identification and the name of the country of origin if it's import-

The generic name of the fiber is the commonly accepted name for natural fibers. These are names like cotton and wool. Generic names for man-made fibers includes nylon, polyester, and acrylic among others. Many producers also provide other information about the fiber likea trade name such as "orlon" or "fortrel," "polyster", or the fiber variety, such as Pima cotton or Merino wool.

If more than fiber is used percentage by weight of each fiber must appear on the label. So, for example, a blouse may be 60% cotton and 40% polyester. The label must also identify the manufacturer by name or a number that allows the consumer to find out who made the product.

Selected textile products such as children's sleepwear and some home furnishing must also have labels indicating whether or not they meet the flammability standard.

Care labels permanently attached to textile products were first required in 1972 and then amended in 1984 to clarify the terminology and make the labels more accurate. These labels tell the consumer what kind of laundering or dry cleaning is necessary to keep the item in good condition.





The first of the six flags to fly over Texas, or the territory that the indians called Tejas, was the French flag. Although the French reign was short, her colonists were here to stay. The early French settlers helped to shape the style of cooking our native foodstuffs.

One of the most popular french dishes is the souffle. It is an elegant and versatile dish, that can range in taste from a hearty main dish to a light and delicate dessert. A souffle uses eggs as its main ingredient base. Since eggs are an important part of a nutritional diet, the souffle can be a healthful dish as well.

Eggs supply high-quality protein, iron, vitamin A and is one of the few toods that contain natural vitamin D. A serving of two large eggs provides 30 percent of the U.S. recommended daily allowance of protein, yet contains only 160 calories.

The basic ingredient of most souffles are eggs. The eggs are separated and the whites are beaten to form the fluffy batter. Correctly beaten egg whites will stand in snowy peaks when the beater is removed, but will not slip easily from the bowl.

The volume of beaten egg bubbly. Stir in milk all at once. whites depends greatly on cleanly separating the whites from the volks and using utensils that are free from fat traces. According to Carol Ware, Texas Department of Agriculture Home Economist, the tiniest bit of egg yolk will prevent the white from frothing at all. And just the suggestion of grease or water in the bowl will cause a decrease in volume. Ware warns against using plastic bowls, as they tend to

other credit is available may also receive these loans at a highter interest rate.

To be eligible for an emergency loan, an applicant must have suffered lossed from the disaster.

As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30-percent loss of production to be eligible for an FmHA emergency loan, Taylor said. Farmers participating in the PIK or federal crop insurance program will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until January 15, 1987, but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in'processing and possibly carry over into the new farming season, he added.

F.HA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U.S. citizens, and to farming partnerships, corporations or coopcratives in which U.S. citizens hold a majority interest.

New Restrictions Affect Charity Bingo Returns

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday issued three rule changes affecting charity bingo

games in Texas. The Charites should getting the money from these bingo games. We just want to make sure they do," Bullock

Bullock now required an officer of the organization applying for a license to appear in person at the Comptroller's office in Austin to be briefed on the requirements for holding a bingo license. License suspensions in past months resulted because bingo operations failed to fully understand what the law requires for holding a bingo

Another rule change prohibits landlords, distributors and manufacturers from being involved in the operation of a bingo game and also prevents them from paying expenses or lending money to bingo organi-

"We're just spelling out what the spirit of the law intended-that bingo games are to be run by the organization holding the bingo license'', Bullock said. The third rule change re-

quires licensed charity landlords to place money from bingo rental proceeds in the bingo account, not in their general account to make sure bingo proceeds money isn't mingled with other funds.

Bullock said these changes were implemented to insure the charities get the benefits from bingo games.







at the cuff is then recorded. That reading, the systolic pressure, indicates the pressure the heart exerts each time it pumps blood into the large blood, vessels.

As the pressure in the cuff continues to decrease, the pumping sound disappears completely. The gauge reading then represents the resting, or diastolic, pressure. The diastolic pressure is the pressure remaining in the artery when the heart is relaxed.

A person's blood pressure is expressed as two numbers, the systolic (pumping) pressure, over the diastolic (relaxed) pressure, such as 118 over 74 or 118/74, which is considered
