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Butane Dealer Assn. To Promote Safety Schools Over State

Taking one of the most forward steps in the history of the butane industry in the United States, the Texas Butane Dealers Association has begun fulfilling plans for a safety training school for dealers throughout Texas.

The Association's program is designed to train butane company employees in better and safer installation and servicing of appliances using butane gas for fuel.

The University of Texas in Austin has accepted a \$2000 grant from the Association with which to operate safety training schools. Two training directors have been hired to conduct the night schools over the State. The courses will cover approximately ten hours, and employees completing the training school satisfactorily will be awarded a certificate of proficiency.

The two directors are at present completing a six weeks course in the art of teaching at the University. Their traveling itinerary will soon be announced through the Association office in Austin and all dealers will be invited to have their employees attend these schools.

The directors are Voyle Tipton of Burnet and Carl Bewick of Big Lake. They will be assigned to their training programs under the auspices of a Butane Industry Committee, the University of Texas, and the State Board for Vocational Education.

The Texas Butane Dealers Association is the first in the nation to promote such a program for safety and safe practices in their industry.

DDT New Weapon In Nationwide Drive To Kill Fly Pests

COLLEGE STATION. — A nation-wide drive is underway to kill out millions of pests that have been hampering health since Adam and Eve. Flies are the pests, and DDT is the weapon.

Launched by the U. S. Department of Agriculture, the drive is being taken up in the Lone Star State by the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service. Extension entomologists state that the people of Texas, both rural and urban, have never had the chance they have this spring to make war on flies. DDT has proved itself as a fly-killer.

Most recent research has shown that the worst of the disease-carrying flies can be killed by spraying DDT around the places where the flies rest. The entomologists are not only asking farmers to use the DDT around sheds, barns, pig pens and cow lots, but are also urging city officials to spray garbage cans, curbs and gutters, stock yards and other places where flies swarm. In the home, 2 1-2 to 5 per cent DDT is very effective against houseflies.

"The more people that get in the fight against flies early in the season, the less bother we'll have with flies this summer", the entomologist says.

Memorial Stadium Expansion Plans May Up Capacity to 62,000

AUSTIN. — Memorial Stadium at the University of Texas will be enlarged from a seating capacity of 43,000 to 62,000 if plans suggested by the board of regents materialize.

The board has given authority for plan preparation of three possible expansion units: 23 additional rows to the west stands with added capacity of 6,000 seats; 23 additional rows to the east stands with added capacity of 6,000 seats; and 23 additional rows to the north stands (end zone) with added capacity of slightly more than 7,000 seats. Any one or a combination of the expansion units may be contracted for when plans are completed.

Use of temporary stands in the south end zone and box seats on playing field level could make possible a maximum seating capacity of about 66,000.

Meetings Provide Information On War Dead Reburial Plan

SAN ANTONIO. — To familiarize citizens of West Texas and the Panhandle with the program for the return and the reburial of the dead of World War II, officials of the American Graves Registration Division will conduct a series of interviews with next of kin and will conduct schools for service officers in key cities May 12 to 24. Lt. Col. H. G. McDougall, chief of the division announced. He will be accompanied by V. H. Torrance, public information man for the AGRD.

The interviews will provide friends and relatives of the war dead opportunities to solve personal problems and to acquaint themselves with the general aspects of the project.

The itinerary of the AGRD officials is:

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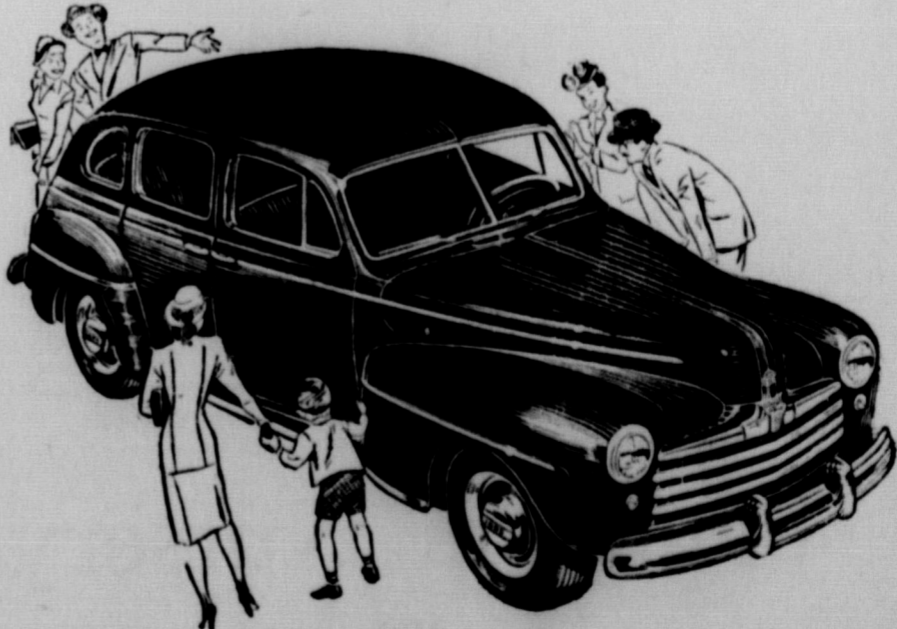

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Early Day Ozona Publisher Visits

A man who 43 years ago went into the publishing business in Ozona by buying out one of two operating weekly newspapers in business in the pioneer West Texas town of that day, paused briefly here this week to visit the modern city that is now Ozona and to recall some of his experiences in the days of hand-set type and hand-operated presses.

He is Ed P. Eason of Laguna Beach, Calif., who is possessed of keenly sharpened faculties and in fine physical condition despite the fact that he has been in the newspaper business more than 43 years. Mr. Eason stopped off to visit

the Stockman office on his way back to California after a tour of his native state of Texas. He is still in the publishing business, operating a commercial printing shop at the present time in the California beach town.

It was in 1904 that Eason came to Ozona and bought out D. M. West's "Southwest Texan," a weekly newspaper that had been established a short time before in competition with the better known "Ozona Kicker," established by the late Congressman Claude Hudspeth. Austin Callan, known to many old timers and still active in the writing game, was Mr. Eason's compositor and editorial assistant and the two of them now live neighbors in California. "Austin and I do a lot of reminiscing about old times 'n Texas," Mr. Eason said. "Our wives leave us to ourselves when we get together and we tell the same stories over and over."

Mr. Eason now lives at 386 Holly St. in Laguna Beach. His all-too-brief visit was thoroughly enjoyed by the Stockman crew.

March Livestock Shipments Jump

AUSTIN, TEAS — March shipments of livestock in Texas soared 70 per cent above February shipments to halt abruptly the decline which began in December, according to The University of Texas Bureau of Business Research.

Carloads shipped numbered 10,022 in March, an impressive gain over the 5,509 carloads going out in February. More significant is the 37 per cent hike in shipments over the March 1946 level when loadings totaled 7,319 cars.

Cattle shipments more than doubled during the month to ac-

count for a major portion of the increase. Shipments of calves rose 17 per cent and of sheep 22 per cent, with the only loss being shipments of hogs, down 12 per cent. Cattle shipments totaled 7,914 in March, calves shipped numbered 624 carloads, hogs 766 carloads and sheep 718 carloads.
